This summer my family had a very small vegetable garden in our front yard. We didn't produce all that much, but there were some lovely tomatoes and sweet peppers, two things I love to eat. The plot sits empty now, covered in leaves. With Advent and cold weather finally here, most of us probably are turning away from an outdoorsy lifestyle and hunkering down to cozy pursuits like baking cookies and doing jigsaw puzzles. But of course this is also the time of year when we tend to shop a lot, eat a lot, and drive around to the million different places we seem to need to be. The pace drives us crazy, but without all the busy-ness we might feel like we were missing out while everyone else was having fun.

So why do I still have gardening on my mind, in the midst of a season where I rarely step outside except to hop in my car and get on to the next pressing appointment? It's because of something Peter Raven said when he spoke at Emmanuel last month. "The Earth is a garden," he told us, "and we are all gardeners." He was talking about biodiversity and our sacred duty to the planet and to one another to be responsible citizens of it. But at another level, he was talking about Creation, and our place within it. His remarks reminded me that during Advent we are not only waiting for the birth of the infant Jesus, for the arrival of the Incarnate Christ—we are also waiting for the Second Coming, for a time when all Creation will be renewed and redeemed.

Too often Christians forget to see the Earth as a garden, and think of it more as the *Titanic*. She's hit an iceberg of pollution and over-consumption, and there's no denying that she's sinking under the weight of our irresponsible choices. And yet somehow we think that the Second Coming will be like a lifeboat that will let us abandon this doomed vessel; once we are "saved" we'll have no need for her anymore. But the New Creation spoken of in the Bible is not the supernatural equivalent of blasting off in a space ship to another planet; it's all about *this* heaven and *this* earth being transformed so thoroughly that the only equivalent we can find to it is the Resurrection itself. Christ's resurrection did not undo the incarnation: it defeated death. In the same way, the Second Coming will not undo creation, but will be the final victory over sin, death, and decay. Our fervent hope for the future God has in store for us in no way decreases our responsibility to the present. (If you're wondering where I'm getting all these ideas, I recommend N.T. Wright's book *Surprised by Hope: Rethinking Heaven, the Resurrection, and the Mission of the Church*.)

Perhaps this Advent we can take seriously the call to consume less and to waste less, not out of a spirit of self-denial or penitence, but out of a faithful desire to be good stewards of God's creation. We are the people who can usher in a new world, a world where "enough" is really enough, and where we are so filled with joy and gratitude that we no longer succumb to a false sense of insatiable needs and unmet desires. Let's start today. The garden is waiting.

People of the Book

Have you ever heard Episcopalians referred to as “*People of the Book*”? A bishop of this Church once explained what it means to be a “*People of the Book*” by suggesting that we really have four books of great import in the Episcopal Church and across the Anglican Communion. What books do think the bishop had on his list?

If you said, **The Book of Common Prayer** you would be one quarter of the way to the right answer. Number two is, of course, **The Holy Bible**, and number three is the Hymnal. The fourth book is the real test. What is the fourth book that is so important to Episcopalians? How many of you guessed *the pocket book*? You got it!

The Bible, our number two book **only** because the Book of Common Prayer defines us, even to ourselves, tells our story. The most frequently repeated phrase in the Bible is “*Do not be afraid*”. When you read the Bible you find a significant number of stories about a violent and vengeful God. If God—whom I will refer to as YHWH - Elohai—is truly so violent and vengeful, how can we not be afraid?

I would offer two explanations for your consideration.

First, YHWH – Elohai has promised to be present with us always and YHWH - Elohai is faithful to this covenant. To promise to be always with us does not mean that we will never face difficulties, horrors, whatever. Our relationship with YHWH - Elohai – *our God* - is one of great intimacy and trust. He will be with us every step of the journey.

Think of the Incarnation. YHWH - Elohai comes among us, becomes one of us, becomes one with us and comes as a helpless, totally dependant newborn baby. There is no more helpless newborn in all the creation than a human baby. YHWH - Elohai trusts us. The real question is do we trust her?

The second part of my attempt at explanation has to do with the Biblical story itself. Many people believe that YHWH - Elohai dictated these stories to scribes who wrote them down and passed them on to us. Frankly, I don't believe that. Rather, I believe human beings, who believed in YHWH - Elohai, wrote their portions of our story trying to explain how and why things beyond explanation happened.

My hope here is to try to explore one of the great gifts provided for us, and to bring to life the great intimacy we share in our own lives, here and now, with YHWH - Elohai. The gift we have been given is known as **The Liturgical Year**: Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, EASTER, and Pentecost. How can we make these seasons become more vivid experiences in our personal daily lives and in our communal worship experience? For me, our number one book, **The Book of Common Prayer** is our map. Let me hear from you about your willingness to be a partner in this journey using this map to explore our magnificent gift.

The Christmas Eve Family Service

The 3:00 o'clock Family Service on Christmas Eve has become a real favorite at Emmanuel. It's the perfect way to worship with young children in a relaxed and joyful environment and still have time to get the kids fed, bathed, and in bed before Santa comes!

Much like last year, we're going to have a special Liturgy of the Word that is told primarily by the children. While this is not as involved as the Christmas Play (no costumes!), it does require a little bit of preparation. We're looking for several children (ages five and up) to help us with bringing forward Nativity Scene figures during the service. We also need two or three older children who are very good readers to serve as narrators.

If your child or children would like to participate in the 3:00 p.m. Christmas Eve service, please contact me as soon as possible. What is a “Carbon Footprint?”

Follow up from Peter Raven’s presentation


“A **carbon footprint** is a measure of the impact our activities have on the environment, and in particular climate change. It relates to the amount of greenhouse gases produced in our day-to-day lives through burning fossil fuels for electricity, heating and transportation etc.

The carbon footprint is a measurement of all greenhouse gases we individually produce and has units of tons (or kg) of carbon dioxide equivalent.

The pie chart below shows the main elements which make up the total of a typical person's carbon footprint in the developed world.

A carbon footprint is made up of the sum of two parts, the primary footprint (shown by the slices on the right side of the pie chart) and the secondary footprint (shown as the slices on the left side).

1. The **primary footprint** is a measure of our direct emissions of CO₂ from the burning of fossil fuels including domestic energy consumption and transportation (e.g. car and plane). We have direct control of these.



2. The **secondary footprint** is a measure of the indirect CO₂ emissions from the whole lifecycle of products we use - those associated with their manufacture and eventual breakdown. To put it very simply – the more we buy the more emissions will be caused on our behalf.”

From the Deacon's Bench

“ The temperature has dropped again, and it's not even dark yet. The wind is bitter cold and there is no lining in my coat. I'm not getting any younger, and it hurts to walk very far. St. Vincent's shelter is probably already full by now. I knew a guy who froze to death on a night like this.”

Emmanuel got the call—the phone call, that is, from a young Americorps volunteer. They have a large room at 13th St and Ann in the City, and they want to open it as an emergency shelter which can hold up to thirty homeless people on nights when there is a winter weather advisory. It will not be a full-service facility. There will be shelter from the weather, a cot, bathroom facilities and good people staffing the shelter. And there will be meals, breakfast and supper, with the help of Emmanuel.

We have been asked to provide the food for a designated weekend (three consecutive days) on short notice, depending on the weather. There are no kitchen facilities at the shelter. We are being asked to bring boxes of cereal and juice, already packed for distribution. We will also bring containers of hearty, homemade soups (from Emmanuel's kitchen and freezer) and large casserole meals in aluminum pans.

Emmanuel will be assigned a specific weekend, and this project will require several people to hustle to the kitchen and pull things together when we get the call. We'll need access to a couple of four-wheel drive vehicles and a team of four to six parishioners who are not afraid to venture out when the weather is bad. They

will deliver the food to the shelter and help serve the guests there. We'll need enough money set aside to stop and buy milk, bananas and eggs to hard boil. We will need two to three teams so that no one person is doing this work for three days in a row.

We will be asked to serve three to four times at most this winter, and it will always be on a weekend. Other large “resource” parishes have also been asked to take their turns in this work.


Can we do it? Do we want to do it? We are hearing some affirmative answers. The Caring Committee has been discussing this weather-related idea for a while. The first people to give a definite “we're in” are the children and parents of Emmanuel Preschool. There is interest from the Senior High Youth group, and other brown bag folks.

We would need a planning committee to coordinate this project. We would definitely need someone who cooks better than the Deacon. We have alms from MOE to get started. Clergy and staff are on board.

This is a first effort at a coordinated plan for the homeless in winter weather. The City of St. Louis, the College Church of SLU and Metro Community Churches are joining with us. We would have to be BOLD and COLD in Mission. The roads might be bad, or the weather just might be very cold. We would have to have enough determination to see that no one goes hungry at the shelter on Emmanuel's watch.

Co-chairs Rudy Walz and Jim Groetsch will be holding an informational meeting very soon.

There is much to be thankful for in this group of dedicated youth as they serve and form future relationships under the spiritual foundation of Emmanuel.

Two Deacons, four Postulants and soon a new Rector later, thanks to my brothers and sisters who accompanied me on this journey at Emmanuel, nothing is more fulfilling than attending a Sunday worship service with my four, soon to be five, granddaughters and giving thanks for God’s many blessings.

Whooping in St. Louis

On Nov. 18, St. Louis County Dept. of Health issued an alert for Whooping Cough (Pertussis) due to the increased incidence.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW: Pertussis is a bacterial infection. Both children and adults are susceptible, even in children who have been immunized. There is an adult immunization for people aged 19-59. Symptoms start with a runny nose, sneezing, mild cough and may include a low-grade fever. The cough becomes quite severe and is worse at night. Cough medicine doesn't affect it. Treatment is with antibiotics. This disease is spread by coughing, sneezing, and talking. If left untreated, people may spread Pertussis for weeks. If you or your child has any of these symptoms, it is **VERY** important to **CALL YOUR DOCTOR**. If you are ill, you will be asked to **STAY HOME** until the 6th day after starting antibiotics.
