From the Priest-in-Charge Lent: A Rich Meal to Digest

During the last week of January, about twenty of us gathered in our dining for two days of lectures and conversation during the Trinity Institute. The focus was **Building an Ethical Economy, Theology and the Marketplace.** During our time together, we listened to the Archbishop of Canterbury, economists and theologians and took breaks for what is called Theological Reflection. During one of those breaks, someone ask me, "Why do Theological Reflection?" I have thinking about it ever since. "Why do Theological Reflection?"

My first response to the question was that such times of reflection after each lecture is like our digestive system. We don't eat all three meals for the day and then begin to digest them; it is possible to do that, I guess, but at best it would be mighty uncomfortable. Instead, like digestion, reflection is a process that is always taking place to some degree, and it is best done incrementally. Reflection is how we digest the information—intellectual, emotional, and spiritual—that we sense and receive. And, curiously, like digestion, it improves and is enjoyed more when done in the company of other friends. Eating alone creates isolation. Reflecting alone leads to narcissism. By and large, we are communal animals. We eat best, live best and reflect best in the company of others.

As I thought about this more, I realized that this is what Lent is all about. Lent may be a time to give up things. Lent may be a time to take on things. Lent, as the Book of Common Prayer states, may be a Holy time of "self-examination and repentance . . . of prayer, fasting and self denial . . . and of reading and reflecting on God's holy Word." But, Lent is not to be done in isolation. Lent is meant to be done in the company of others! In fact, Lent can be a feast of reflection with each other in community!

As you have seen in our various publications, Lent 2010 is offering to you and to me some wonderful opportunities – a rich meal to digest, to reflect upon together. In a number of different settings, we are being offered intellectual, emotional, and spiritual feasts that can enrich our lives as a community and as individuals. I hope you create a Lent for yourselves that will be challenging and satisfying!

Sunday mornings: Spirituality for the New Millennium

During Lent, Adult Forum is exploring some of the ways that people in our church and community are returning to ancient practices and finding new life in them. We'll consider how it really is possible to be both spiritual *and* religious, and we hope to hear from you about whether any of these practices resonate in your own life. You might even come away with an idea for a new habit you'd like to develop, in Lent and beyond. Join us in the dining room at 10:15 a.m. for coffee & refreshments, followed by great presentations and time for discussion.

Upcoming topics include:

March 7: Ignatian Spirituality

The "Spiritual Exercises" of St. Ignatius of Loyola were composed with the intention of helping a person discern God's will in his life and leading to a personal commitment to follow it. They are a brief set of meditations, prayers and mental exercises divided in four thematic "weeks" designed to be carried out over a period of 28-30 days. Given Emmanuel's core value to be "Bold in Mission" and with 4 weeks remaining in Lent, now is the perfect time to join Fr. John Craig, S.J. in learning about Ignatian spirituality at Adult Forum.

March 14: Labyrinths: A Walking Meditation

People of many faiths are rediscovering the power of the labyrinth to serve as a meditation tool and even a mystical, transformative prayer experience. Labyrinths have deep roots in medieval Christianity and yet they can reach people today even in the midst of our busy, complex, postmodern lives. Penny Allen will lead us in a consideration of the history of labyrinths as spiritual tools, some of their current uses in our society (including in churches) and some different ways to experience the labyrinth.

March 21: Eucharistic Living

We welcome the Rev. Ralph McMichael for a presentation about the spirituality of the Eucharist and how it can shape your everyday life. Fr. McMichael is the Dean of the Episcopal School for Ministry and has taught at Nashotah House and the Aquinas Institute. His upcoming book, entitled *Eucharist: A Guide for the Perplexed*, will be published this summer; it analyses the complexities and perplexities raised by asking the question: What is the Eucharist?

Tuesday evenings: "Creative Christianity—Faith and the Arts"

Join us in the dining room for a potluck supper at 6:00, followed by great presentations and time for discussion.

Upcoming topics include:

March 9: Poetry and Music: Expressions of the Soul Ludwig van Beethoven wrote that, "Music is the mediator between the spiritual and the sensual life." Music can lift our spirits, provide consolation and is our companion in joy or in grief. Author Berthold Auerbach said that, "Music washes away from the soul the dust of everyday life." Poetry does much the same thing; it sparks imagination, inspires moments of joy or sadness, and informs our intellect and sensibilities. Robert Penn Warren wrote, "The poem is not a thing we see; it is, rather, a light by which we may see - and what we see is life." On March 9, members of the Emmanuel community will gather to share an evening of instrumental and vocal music, poetry and meditation designed to let creativity shine its light on our lives: our joys, sorrows, challenges, frivolities and, of course, God's profound love for each of us.

March 16: Theatre: The forge, Fr. John Craig, S.J. Fr. Jack Warner, SJ founded Teatro la fragua in Honduras in 1979. Drawing on his belief that "art and religion spring from the same human roots . . . our need to be in touch with something beyond the littleness we feel as human beings," Fr. Warner wanted to awaken the creativity of the people of this impoverished and oppressed area by means of the theatre. Using stories from the Bible and local folklore, La Fragua (the forge) both entertained its audiences and inspired them to "forge" these solutions and contribute to the development of a Honduran and Central American culture. From early performances in both urban and rural areas, sometimes surrounded by armed Contras, Teatro has grown to offer workshops in Honduras, El Salvador, Nicaragua, Guatemala, Costa Rica, Aruba and Belize, as well as running a school that includes theatre and dance training. Fr. John Craig, SJ, head of the Fine Arts Department at DeSmet Jesuit High School and long-time friend and associate of Fr. Warner, will join us to view the film "Teatro" and help us discuss theatre as a force for spiritual and community empowerment.

Preparing for Baptism at Emmanuel

Wednesday, March 24, will be Emmanuel's next baptismal preparation session. There won't be another session until May 18, so if you'd like your child baptized before then, be sure to register for the March class. At least one parent must attend an evening session before their child can be baptized at Emmanuel.

Grandparents are also invited, and Godparents are strongly encouraged to attend. You do not have to set a baptismal date to come to a session. If you are pregnant or still deciding about baptizing your child here, please come to one of these sessions. They are a wonderful opportunity to learn more about baptism and to explore raising your child as a Christian, as well as a chance to get to know other parents in the parish.

The preparation sessions begin with dinner at 6:00 p.m. Childcare will be available. Sessions run about $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours. You need not attend the session closest to your child's baptismal date, just choose one that works with your schedule and is prior to the day you want to have your child baptized. 
