# Celebrating Our Ministry in the Diocese of Lui: From Deep-Water Wells to Education

For the last four years, the money raised from the Little White Churches passed among you by our children at the 9:00 a.m. service on Sunday morning has been used to fund deep-water wells in our companion Diocese of Lui. By the end of 2009, Emmanuel and other parishes in the Diocese had funded nine fresh-water wells. Prior to this, women in Lui had to walk as much as seven miles to get water – in the dry season often literally scooping water from a trench dug fifteen feet down in the riverbed, cup by cup. These fresh water wells have brought many, many benefits to our friends in Lui, greatly improving the quality of life and making an enormous difference to the people of Lui – so much of a difference that we are now able to focus our efforts on a new goal: education.

On Easter Sunday we celebrated the accomplishment of providing fresh water for our brothers and sisters in Lui. At both the 9:00 and 11:00 a.m. services during the Offertory, a number of our children brought to the altar containers of fresh water representing the fruit of their labors and the commitment of the parish over the past four years; and our wardens read a celebratory statement. It was also announced that going forward, the money collected in the Little White Churches passed by our children at the 9:00 service will help fund educational needs in Lui, including agricultural training. This effort will tie in with our own parish's effort to have a community garden that serves our Food Center clients.

The first endeavor of this new focus on education will be to provide funds for two people from Lui to travel to the town of Yei to receive training in more advanced agricultural methods. Funds will then be used to gather people from around the Diocese of Lui so that they can receive training from those who went to Yei. So as you see our children each Sunday passing the Little White Churches, remember our brothers and sisters in Lui and the bonds that unite us.

# From the Priest-in-Charge: Stewardship of Creation

Dear Friends.

I remember the first time that I went to a church conference in the mid-eighties that focused on ecology. When I mentioned it to a parishioner at the time, he said the Church had no business getting into ecology and environmentalism. Instead, he thought that there was more than enough for the Church to do if it just stuck to "saving souls."

As I write this, the smell of Easter morning's flowers are in the air, and the 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Earth Day just a few weeks away. Contrary to my parishioner's opinion, over the past 30 years ecology and our stewardship of the environment has taken on significant meaning for the church, through the lens of Jesus' resurrection.

In earliest Christian literature resurrection remained a mystery. It wasn't understood simply literally. Yes, the risen Jesus eats fish, but then he also goes through a closed door with no difficulty. All the descriptions in scripture point to a mystery whose reality lies beyond the reach of language, even metaphorical language. Jesus' resurrection did not catapult his followers out of this world into some remote spiritual realm. Instead, it catapulted them directly into this world, for it is here within God's creation that the power of the resurrection was at work. Some of this is articulated by Paul in his letter to the Romans (8:18-39), when he says that the power of the resurrection is not only know among us but also throughout the whole creation. The One who died and was raised not only "intercedes for us," but also permeates the cosmos with "the love of God" -- so much so, that separation from God's love has become impossible for all of creation.

In the 1997 Episcopal Hymnal "Wonder, Love and Praise," (one of our four official Hymnals, with more to come), Hymn #739 contains the following words:

"Walk on, O people of God!

A new law; God's new alliance,

The creation is reborn!

Christ takes into his body all our sin, enslavement and pain;

As he destroys them, he brings us life abundance, life's new joy.

Christ brings reconciliation to all things and people with God.

Nature bursts into new flowering; all creation is reborn.

Walk on, O people of God!"

Christian environmental ethics is not a dispensable extracurricular activity for "saved" Christians. Instead, the lifestyles we chose affect not only us, but all the creatures we share this planet with; and how we live within the environment is a sign of whether or not we are on a "pilgrimage to new life," or not. Even the root of the word "ecology," which means "household" in English (and, curiously, is also the root for ecumenical), embraces this Christian perspective about our household's relationship with creation. And not surprisingly, more and more, churches throughout the expanse of theological perspectives are realizing that the resurrected life that Jesus called us to is not a private Christian possession, but a household responsibility that is at work throughout the cosmos, including the Church. What happened at the crucifixion and at the first Easter was cosmic in scope. "The Christ event" binds us to the creation, for which the resurrection took place.

This Easter season take the time to look at your life and how you are living out your relationship to the household of our planet, Earth. For the resurrection influences the entire spectrum of our ethical decision-making, including environmental ethics and has far reaching effects for our ministries. "Christ brings reconciliation to all things and people with God. Nature bursts into new flowering; all creation is reborn! Walk on, O people of God; Walk on, O people of God!"
