From the Rector's Desk

By the time you receive this edition of the Angelus, you will have received a letter and pledge card and we will be fast approaching the culmination of our Season of Stewardship with our In-Gathering Sunday, on October 23, 2011. So, it seemed appropriate to share my perspective about financially supporting the church and other charitable groups.

In my own spiritual life, some of the most crucial decisions I make have to do with my attitude towards money. This is not a new idea. The Scriptures speak again and again of the love of money and the power of money to destroy us. Money may be neutral, to be used for good or bad. Money can be used for much good, but it seems to also have the power to corrupt us if we cannot learn to be free of its control. In our affluent society, money acts as a God, demanding obedience, promising the good life, but in the end betraying its worshipers. For us who live in this kind of world, learning to be free of the drawing power of money is an absolutely essential stage through which we must pass. "You cannot worship God and Mammon," Jesus says. And in this culture of consumption, mammon - our material possessions - is worshipped by many people.

A wonderful metaphor for this can be seen in an article I recently read about a species of jellyfish found in the Italian Mediterranean that feeds on tiny snails of the nudibranch variety. Those snails, however, are protected by their shell -the jellyfish cannot digest them. So once the jellyfish eats one of these snails, a bizarre reversal of roles takes place: the diner becomes the dinner. Attaching itself to the wall of the jellyfish's digestive tract, the snail begins to eat the jellyfish. By the time the snail grows to maturity, it has completely consumed the jellyfish. The poor jellyfish is eventually consumed by what it has consumed.

Our culture has in subtle and not so subtle ways taught us to hunger for things that do not truly satisfy us. What we consume can consume us! We can be swallowed up in the pursuit of wealth, prestige, and power, becoming immune to the joy of human experience. Jesus' warning to the rich, young man (Lk. 12:13ff) is a warning to all of us to be careful – careful that the "snails" we consume can consume us, displacing the timeless things of God with the immediate, momentary things of this world.

Some time ago, I was a part of a seminar about the Christian life and how we focused our material possessions and money. It posed the question, "How much is enough?" Such a question asks us, as individuals and as a community, to assess what is truly important to us. In this Season of Stewardship that subject can be an important one for us to wrestle with, whether at our dinner tables or at our church meetings tables.

Day of the Dead Celebration

Have you ever bitten into a skull...made of sugar? Or decorated an altar with candles and *offrenda*? Or strewn a pathway from the graveyard to your home with marigold petals? If you've done any of those things, you've probably participated in the Mexican holiday known as *Dia de los Muertos*, or Day of the Dead.

There's a lot of local variation on these practices, but generally speaking the Day of the Dead is a celebration of life as well as a way to embrace the reality of death. It is a time to remember and honor loved ones who have died, and a

time for families to come together and celebrate the year that has passed. It began in the pre-Hispanic era, among the Aztecs and other indigenous peoples of Mexico, but eventually was incorporated into the Christian traditions of All Saints Day and All Souls Day. The *Dia de los Muertos* practices survived this blending of cultures and religious traditions and remain popular today in Mexico and in many parts of the United States.



During FaithQuest and the Adult Forum time on **Sunday**, **October 30**, the 2nd-5th graders and Adult Forum participants will come together to learn about and take part in a Day of the Dead Festival. The Festival will be part educational, part hands-on activities, and will be a great opportunity for intergenerational learning and fun.

We invite everyone 2nd grade and older, including parents of FaithQuest children, to join us as we create an "altar" with its traditional items as a way to honor the deceased. Please consider bringing along a picture of a deceased loved one to include as part of the tradition.


SAJE Senior Living Options Fair and Fine Arts Show

City Streets Update

At the Adult Forum on Sunday, October 1, our Senior High group talked about their service to the homeless in Chicago during their summer mission trip. Here at Emmanuel we are blessed to have three great ways to help the homeless in St Louis – City Streets, Miss Carol's Breakfast and Lydia's House. Help is always needed in these three programs, but I am going to focus here on City Streets.

With the first season's experience under our belt, we have developed ways of better serving our guests and increasing our efficiency. Our cook-ins this year will only take place on Sunday afternoons - November 6, December 11 and 18. There will be a head cook and six helpers. Cook-in sign-up sheets will be posted by the kitchen door. In addition to the Sunday cook-ins, we will start a new monthly baking program that Kathy from AmeriCorps has requested. The bakers will meet once a month, most likely on a Tuesday afternoon, to make desserts to go along with our meals.

More information will be forthcoming as we get into the colder weather. When the program is underway, we will need volunteers to help deliver food from Emmanuel to the shelter in Soulard. We would also like to interface more with the guests this year by helping to serve the meals and talking with the guests.

Our funding efforts continue. The grant proposal we mentioned in the last Angelus is in the final deliberation stage. And we will be raffling a quilt to fit a full or queen sized bed. The quilt was made by the Native Americans we serve during our mission trips to South Dakota. The quilt will be on display and tickets will be sold every Sunday at coffee hour from October 30 until the drawing date on November 20. Tickets are \$5 or 6 for \$20.
