Vestry Vitals

I also said in last month's "Vestry Vitals" that I would publish the goals set by this year's Vestry and report, throughout the year, on what progress was being made. Goals identified by the Vestry during its retreat, just to refresh your memory, are divided into two categories, "Growth and Vitality" and "Enhance Financial Health," both under the broad banner of "Faith, Love, and Mission." Last month, I conveyed the goals under "Enhance Financial Health." This month, the goals under "Growth and Vitality," are reported by Richard Keyes, who is overseeing this Vestry subcommittee.

These are the goals identified under "Growth & Vitality".

Please keep in mind that many goals have specificity but less concrete ways of attacking and, in many cases, groups or committees at Emmanuel are already trying to address these problems.

Attendance There has been a decline in weekly attendance at Emmanuel the last few years. No one is quite certain why. However, we do already have the A.I.R. committee looking into attracting, integrating and retaining new members. There has been a brunch for new members where we found out that the best way to get newcomers to attend is to actually call and ask them. New members have also been invited to Trivia Night.

We also need to look into how we retain long-time members. We cannot just take them for granted. We need to reach out and ask all members to participate in the activities of the parish and also let it be known that people are welcome to participate. We all need to be evangelists for our faith and Emmanuel.

Adult Education and Forum For a number of years, there has been a 10:30 Adult Education and also a 10:30 service. This is an inherit conflict for members who wish to attend both. Do we look at changing the times of the worship services or the times of the adult education or expand the number of times adult education is offered on Sunday? We already have an Adult Education committee. This goal is also tied into

Expand Faith Quest Involvement Some parents wish to attend worship services with their children and others wish to have their children attend Faith Quest while they attend services. For the parents who attend the 9:00 a.m. service, how do we get them to either participate in Faith Quest after the service or attend Adult Education and Forum? How do we get all parishioners interested in Faith Quest involvement? A meeting of these two committees is needed as to how to get more people involved and to explore the cross purposes of their charges.

Communication This is a broad area as to communication within the parish and to reaching those outside the parish. No longer do parishioners wait for the Angelus to come in the mail. Communication is now electronic with different methods of having it sent and received. Does Emmanuel need a Facebook page? If so, who will we have run it? Should we be on Twitter? Who updates our website? How are events included on our web site? We did have a previous Communication Committee that was an offshoot of A.I.R. However, that committee has disbanded, having concluded its charge. We have yet to decide if we need a new committee or ask for suggestions from all the parish committees as to how to better improve communications.

Parish Ministry Discernment How do we know what is offered by Emmanuel and how can we get that to the parishioners? How do we know what is needed by the parishioners but is not provided by Emmanuel. The offerings of Emmanuel evolve over time. Groups and organizations come and go. There has been a survey of these organizations which needs to be reviewed by our committee. (Cont'd on pg 6)

Redevelop Parish Family Life The All Parish Conference (or All Parish Weekend) just concluded. This is the second year that we have had it at Emmanuel after having it numerous years at Trout Lodge. This is just one of the examples of the offerings for families and individuals to participate in the life of the parish.

However, does the parish life that we have result in participation by all members? What can we do for greater participation? Members of the Vestry will be meeting with the committee and discuss these issues.

Arts Program With a new organist and a new choir master, are there music opportunities in addition to those offered on Sunday? There have been new art pieces installed at Emmanuel. Is there a need to do a building wide assessment for all the works of art. What other offerings in the arts can Emmanuel offer to its parishioners? We currently have two parishioners interested in heading up such a review and hope to get a meeting scheduled shortly. If you have not been to Emmanuel recently, photographs of the new artwork have been in the Angelus.

Race and Diversity How do we get people of all ages and backgrounds to participate in the life of Emmanuel? Are we doing anything that pushes people away from activities with Emmanuel? This may also be tied into the area of concern on Attendance. What do we need to do more and what do we need to do less?

Integrate Core Communities This last area is what I see to be "Don't have the same people on all the committees!" All our committees should work together. We need to examine the previously mentioned survey and see how the committees can work together.

News from Sudan and the Lui Diocese

Sending notice by phone text message from the election in Juba, Stephen Dokolo shared the news that he has been elected the next Bishop of the Diocese of Lui, Episcopal Church of South Sudan. He sent the text message to Debra Smith, member of the Diocese of Missouri's Companion Relationship Committee and the person who coordinates missioners' travel to and logistics in Sudan. Hearing the news, Bishop Wayne dialed Dokolo's cell number. Connection was impossible and after repeated attempts, called him using Skype, a way of sending voice through the internet. They connected--the reception was not at all good-- but the bishop could make out Dokolo's joy, and communicate his and our diocese's happiness. While the connection crackled, Bishop Wayne understood that Dokolo had been elected on the first or second ballot.

Dokolo's consecration as the next Bishop of Lui is scheduled for June 26, 2011. Dokolo is widely known in the Missouri Diocese from his years preaching and evangelizing while attending Eden Seminary in Webster Groves. Some of his classmates nicknamed him "Bishop." In his travels around Missouri, he spoke with such love for his diocese, and compellingly about the urgency of their needs. He touched many hearts and inspired diocesan members to travel to Sudan, and to care about Sudan.



The previous Bishop of Lui, the Rt. Rev. Bullen Dolli, died December 11,

2010, at a hospital in Nairobi, Kenya, where he was being treated for cancer. He did not live to see the historic referendum that created the new country of Southern Sudan, or the Episcopal Church of Sudan's decision to remain united. On December 17th, Bishop Bullen's body was flown back to Juba, Sudan. Robin Denney, Episcopal missionary working as the Agriculture Consultant for ECS, reported that there was a large crowd to receive the bishop's body from the plane at Juba airport, and a convoy as he was transported to Juba All Saints' Cathedral for prayers. He was then driven to Lui, and buried at Fraser Memorial Cathedral next to the first Diocesan Bishop of Lui, the Rt. Rev. Ephraim A. Natana. The burial service was attended by many mourners. Plans for the funeral to celebrate the life and service of the bishop were planned for after the upcoming election. The funeral mass for the late Bishop Bullen is scheduled for June 10, 2011. Bishop Wayne and Debra Smith will be attending from Missouri. Bishop Wayne explained that, following their custom, Bishop Bullen was buried after services in Juba and Lui. Now they are building the intricate stone piles which form Bullen's grave. When the last stone is put in place, then the funeral happens..

The end of December into January was a time of waiting and hope, with eyes and hearts watching for the outcome of the referendum, and prayers for peace during this time. Bishop Bismark of Mundri Diocese was appointed caretaker of Lui Diocese during the interim period until the election and installation of the next bishop. With the referendum results in, and the birth of a new country, Archbishop Daniel Deng Bul called an emergency synod and the Diocese of Lui met February 23-25 to lift up three names as candidates for the next bishop: Stephen Dokolo from Lui, Ramzy Volle from Nairobi, and Yohana Wajo from Khartoum.

After Dokolo graduated from Eden, he returned to Lui Diocese and has been diocesan Secretary for these past two years. Volle was the former diocesan Youth Pastor, and a preist in Lui, who had recently moved to Nairobi, Wajo is an ECS priest, of Moru descent, working in Khartoum.

The election happened at a provincial meeting, when all of the dioceses of the Episcopal Church of Sudan sent a delegation to Juba. Dokolo explained the voting procedure, "At the moment we have 32 dioceses in the ECS Province and a deputation from each will travel to Juba for elections at All Saints' Cathedral in Juba." Each diocese sends three people: bishop, clergy, lay.

The Diocese of Missouri is a mission partner of the Diocese of Lui. Smith wrote minutes after receiving the message on the mission team's blog, <u>Luinetwork.ning.com</u>, where members and missioners write with breaking news and reflections.
