From the Curate

Pentecost is when we celebrate the origins of the Church. It's hard to pinpoint exactly when the Church began, but that moment when the disciples experienced the Holy Spirit descending on them was certainly a key point in its development. And so, during the season of Pentecost we are called to remember what it means to "be" church and, in another sense, to be a part of the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic church.

It is tempting to idealize the early church, to romanticize those times when the followers of Jesus "devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers," those days when "all who believed were together and had all things in common" (Acts 2: 42, 44). But we must not forget that Paul wrote most of his letters to address issues of conflict and dissension within the various Christian communities that were springing up; not only that, but when Christians weren't too busy beating each other up over theological and ritual disagreements, they were often being persecuted by governments that considered them atheists and rabble-rousers. It was hard being church then, and it's still hard being church today.

One of the great news stories of the past few years was the story of the Chilean miners who were safely rescued after being trapped for 52 days underground. Many of us watched on live television as they rose up out of the ground, one by one. It seemed nothing short of a miracle. The CNN Belief Blog reported that "faith was a key part of surviving the ordeal." Jose Henriquez, one of the miners, said this:

"We were different creeds and churches. So I got them in a circle and made sure everyone could pray in a participatory fashion. And as we prayed we began to know the presence and blessing among us of God in the mine. We were strengthened, our spirits were revived."

There were tensions in the collapsed mine, including fist fights among the miners. Henriquez did not speak about those fights but talked about how the miners resolved tensions. "This democratic community was not a secular democracy but a praying, democratic community," he said. "God began to reconcile us together and so we'd get one with the other and force them to shake their hands. We maintained the peace and community spirit that way."

That, to me, is the true miracle of these miners. Rather than being torn apart by this extreme and life-threatening situation, they used it as an opportunity to create a community bound together by prayer and self-sacrificial, mutual caring. In other words, they were being church. By our usual definitions, they weren't *in* church--and yet, they *were* church. They were a praying community, a reconciling community, formed around their shared trust that God was present and active in their lives. What an example for all of us to ponder in our hearts during this season of Pentecost.



Clean Air Saint Louis

No Idling Initiative

It's summer time in St Louis and you know what that means. The weather is hot and humid and we start hearing the Air Quality Ratings and Alerts.



The downtown "No Idling" initiative has as its purpose to improve health and air quality in the St. Louis region.

Allowing vehicle engines to idle unnecessarily greatly contributes to poor air quality. Vehicle emissions have been linked to cancer, asthma, stroke, heart attack, and reduced learning capacity in children. Pollution from vehicles also contributes to the continued decline of the polar ice caps, reduced agricultural production, and damage to regional flora and fauna and cultural assets such as buildings and sculptures.

Vehicle emission reduction can be accomplished with the installation of "No Idling" signage throughout the area in order to remind motorists to shut off their vehicles while not in use. Such an initiative is very visible and will promote St. Louis as a "green" city to encourage tourism and new business development within the area while helping us to reach attainment of acceptable air quality standards as set by the Clean Air Act. Everyone at Emmanuel is encouraged to participate to this effort and avoid idling your car whenever possible.

Where are they now?

Do you remember **Joy & Charles**? They are the two trainees we supported during their agricultural training at the Yei Center through the Mission Committee. They are back home now. Bishop-elect Docolo reports that their first assignment is the restoration of the Lozoh Church Garden. This is one of several church gardens that were destroyed during the periods of the First War (1955 –72) and the Second War (1983—2005). The purpose of the garden is to provide training opportunities for other farmers, demonstrate modern techniques of farming, introduce new crops and fruit trees, feed the poor, and provide fresh produce for Lui Hospital. Supporting agricultural training was a far-sighted investment, don't you think?


