The Wisdom of Godly Play

In First Grade FaithQuest class last week, I was presenting the story of Second Creation: The Falling Apart (what we adults call "The Fall"). Here is a paraphrased version of the lesson, using the language of Godly Play (you'll have to imagine the wooden props and felt pieces in your own mind's eye).

The story opens in God's wonderful garden, in the midst of all of the creation. Here, everything was so close it was All-Together. All the people were together in one person called "Adam" which meant "Everyone" in their language. Eve was there too, for she came from Adam. She and Adam were a kind of Adam-Eve. In the middle of the garden grew two trees. God told Adam-Eve that they should not eat the fruit from two trees in the middle of the garden. One of the trees was about differences and the other was about forever. The serpent, which was cleverer than any other creature that God made, suggested that Adam-Eve taste the fruit from the tree of differences. Adam-Eve did and things fell apart for them. They became Adam and Eve. The difference between them and God also came apart, as did the difference between good and evil. God called for them, and they hid. They did not know how to be with God anymore, because of all the differences. But God found them. The differences also did something wonderful. Now Adam and Eve could take things apart and put them back together again. They could be creators, almost like God. They couldn't make something out of nothing, but they could make something out of differences. After the differences, Adam and Eve could not go back to when everything was All-Together. They could only go forward. God sent Adam and Eve out of the Garden. God went with them on their journey to help them be the best creators they could be, and to be with God in this new way, and to stay one with God.

After the story, we have a "wondering time" to share our wonders about the story. I wondered if God was playing with Adam and Eve when God called and they hid. I wanted to add "or was God angrily calling their names and they hid in fear?" Before I could form the words, one girl enthusiastically cried, "God is always "it" and will always find me no matter what." (AMEN). There was a cacophony of voices and a hearty discussion of hide-and-seek. remembrance that Jonah tried to hide, and God found him. The idea of anger and fear were absent from all of their responses. Then one of the boys said, "but I am touching God right now so I AM 'it' " (AMEN). While I am having an "uhh" moment, the kids seemed to intuitively know what I take much longer to process. Because of the differences, we will always know presence and absence, yet God left the garden with us to create a relationship with us in this new way. Because we can only create from differences, we take turns being the seeker and the one sought--we take turns being "it." We are "it" whenever we are searching for God, and the only way we can lose is to not play, to stop searching. And if we aren't searching, we are in some manner, hiding. Then God is "it" and, the first graders assure me, we will be found.

As class was dismissed to the new cozy corner, one boy declared, "this is the boys' bench" followed immediately by a girl's response, "and the girls' bench is here." It is a Falling Apart.

Dear Friends,

This Angelus should arrive on your doorsteps and computers as we celebrate what has been called the Octave of All the Saints – the eight days of the Feast of All Saints. During this Feast, Christians gather throughout the world to celebrate the community that we share with one another. As we do so, we also celebrate the lives of those Christians who have gone before us and those Christians who are yet to come. It is a day of remembrance; a day of recollection; and a day of calling together. We call together the past, and the present and the future and re-collect it together into one great unity - all eternity gathered into the present moment, and celebrated.

It is in the context of community, and specifically in the context of this Christian community of Emmanuel, that we daily and weekly discover and rediscover our wholeness, our salvation in Christ. If there's one thing that I believe about Christianity, it is something that I remember my father teaching me when I was young: "You can't be Christian alone." Salvation and wholeness are something that are always sought and always found in the context of a community.

That can be important to stress today, because in many ways we live in a culture that has lost its sense of what it means to be a community. The culture in which we in live and move and have our being is a Christian community culture of individualism - a culture which seems to have no understanding of the need that we humans have to belong to some group that is larger than our selves.

This absence of knowing the importance of belonging to a sustained, long-lived

community makes our vocation as Christians very difficult to practice in our time. It makes it difficult because what we have to offer is precisely what is missing from our society to a people who have lost their own awareness of their need. It's kind of like offering food to someone who is starving but who has never tasted food. It's like offering to turn on the lights in the home of a person born blind. Sometimes, it feels

like what we Christians have to offer to our world no longer makes any sense. But, when community is experienced, its value is apparent!

But I am not ready to give up hope. I'm not ready to give up hope because even in a world that has lost its sense of community, there still are ways to engender it. And, contrary to popular opinion, I would like to suggest that the way we begin is not by "working on others." No, the way we begin is by working on ourselves. We begin by acknowledging that even we need to be reminded of and experience anew the importance of community in our lives. We belong to each other. And, each of us is asked to commit ourselves, once again, to this thing that we celebrate this communion of Saints.

In essence, the Feast of the Octave of All Saints is an invitation to a "community reunion," like a family reunion. At this gathering, we can recommit ourselves to living out the characteristics that the community of the saints of God have embodied over the ages characteristics like those articulated by Barbara Brown Taylor: "What makes a saint? Extravagance. Excessive love, flagrant mercy, radical affection, exorbitant charity, immoderate faith, intemperate hope, inordinate love. None of which is an achievement, a badge to be

earned or a trophy to be sought; all is in the context of are secondary by-products of the one specifically thing that truly makes a saint, which is the love of God, which is membership in the community of the of body of Christ, which is what all of us, living and dead, remembered and forgotten, great souls and small, have in common.

> Some of us may do more with that love than others and may find

ourselves able to reflect it in a way that causes others to call us saints, but the title is one that has been given to us all by virtue of our baptisms. The moment we rose dripping from the holy water we joined the communion of saints, and we cannot go back any more than we can give back our names or the blood in our veins."

As this month of November opens, come celebrate the gift of community in the Feast of All Saints!

Communication News

Yes, there is a Communications Committee. As directed by Vestry, we did an exhaustive review of Emmanuel's external and internal communications. After the review was finished, the first priority was to update



the church's logo. We had over 300 parishioners voting on their preference for a new logo, and you will soon see it on all of our publications. Listed below is the mission of the committee and how it can assist groups and committees within the parish to get information out to the parish and sources outside the church about what's going on at Emmanuel.

The mission of the Communications Committee is (1) to evaluate the external and internal communications of Emmanuel; (2) to identify areas where improvements could be made; and (3) to offer assistance to committees and others in the church to implement these changes.

The services that we can offer:

<u>Informing the external community about the life of Emmanuel</u>. This is usually done by press releases, but is increasingly accomplished through our web page and various social media.

If you want publicity about a particular church event, contact the chair of the Communications Committee (Jim Groetsch) to get it on our work schedule. This should be done at least four weeks prior to the event. (Any shorter time frame than this means a less effective communication with external media.) Please provide information about the Event: Who/what/when/where/ and why. Don't worry about developing final copy. There are professionals on the committee who will rework the details. Any graphics related to the event, current photos or something from the preceding year will enhance the chances that the media may use it.

Internal Communications

Internal ad hoc materials, such as flyers to post or distribute to parishioners or perhaps to post on business bulletin boards in the community, will need a six week time line. You certainly can develop these yourselves, and this would be great. Contact Jim to give the Communications Committee an opportunity to see that your flyer fits with the branding criteria that we are trying to establish for the church, e.g., the appropriate usage of the church logo. (cont'd on page 7)

Development of brochures for continuing events or activities. Again, for example, a FaithQuest brochure. A six to eight week lead-in will allow the committee to assist in its development.

For internal ad hoc material and for brochures, a rough draft of content is requested, and existing photographs are requested. In some cases, to update the materials, the committee may initiate some new photo sessions.
