From the Curate: Giving Freely, Willingly, & with Rejoicing

"For all things come from you, and of your own have we given you."

1 Chron 29:14

First the Scriptural context for that phrase: King David spoke those words soon after the people of Israel had responded enthusiastically to his call to them to provide the materials that were needed to complete the Temple plans. The leaders of the tribes brought gold, silver, bronze, and iron in abundance. After the offering, "the people rejoiced because these had given willingly, for with single mind they had offered freely to the Lord; King David also rejoiced greatly" (1 Chron 29:9).

Most of us are probably more familiar with the phrase in its liturgical context: at many celebrations of the Eucharist, the priest accepts the offering plates with the words, "All things come of thee, O Lord," to which the congregation replies, "And of thine own have we given thee." This exchange is not found in the Prayer Book, but is derived from a traditional offertory sentence that can be found in the 1928 and 1892 Books of Common Prayer.

What is it about this phrase that it survives through oral tradition, like a pentimento on a canvas or a footprint in the sand, when so much else has not? I am not a cradle Episcopalian, which is perhaps why I am so fascinated by quirky little things like this, and I certainly don't have an authoritative answer. For myself, I like to think that we've retained that phrase because it speaks to a profound truth that we cannot hear often enough: **everything we have comes from God. Everything we** give we are really giving back to the one who is the creator and giver of all that is, seen and unseen.

Everything: every nickel and dime; every ounce of sweat equity; every sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; every offering of gold and silver. In Eucharistic Prayer I, we offer "our selves, our souls and our bodies" to God. Why would it be easier to make that offering than to make an annual financial pledge?

The best part of tracing this phrase back to its scriptural origin is the sense I have that, in the story of David's preparations for the building of the Temple, *how* people give is as important as *how much* they give.

The words that recur in the text are **freely, willingly, and with rejoicing**. That's the spirit of giving that so often takes hold of us during the Eucharist, and sometimes even during stewardship season as well! Please know that your example in giving inspires me, and that a gift it is to see and learn from people who are freely, willingly, and joyfully returning to God some of what God has so freely, willingly, and joyfully given to us.

What Happened to my Alms?

Remember last Lent? That's when we called our financial contributions to the needy "alms." Actually, donations to the needy are alms all year long. Contributions designated to clergy discretionary funds, fundraisers by MOE, alternative giving cards at the holidays, many of our Advent and other activities support year round service to the poor.

As your Deacon, I have the responsibility and pleasure of distributing some of these funds. They are given to persons in need on an individual basis. I know that many of you have brought a person to me, probably unknown to us, who



comes in from the street, asking for help. I sit and talk with these folks in an attempt to discover what their real needs are. The majority of those who come to us are seeking food. They have heard of or been referred to our Food Center. You have heard, from those who work there, that the number of Food Center clients has been growing.

This last month I met a man from Texas. He had driven here in hopes of getting a job. He was laid off from his work almost a year ago, and was willing to go anywhere there might be a job opening. Unfortunately he couldn't pass the required physical, and he was stuck in St. Louis without money to get home. What could we do? Clearly, we can't "solve" his problem. We filled his near-empty gas tank and gave him a bag of food, a word of encouragement and our prayers, and sent him on the first leg of his trip, hoping that there would be other friends or a job along the way.

A single, educated woman, who supports herself with a seasonal job, got behind in her modest lifestyle when she had medical bills. She was behind in her rent and even her sympathetic landlord was going to evict her. After talking with the landlord, we paid one-half of her monthly rent and he gave her an extension until her employment started again. Such bills are paid directly to the creditor by an Emmanuel check.

Have you ever tried to entertain two pre-schoolers in the dark? Feed them without a refrigerator? When a young woman's husband deserted her, this young woman had no immediate source of income. Her electricity was turned off. Emmanuel turned the power back on until she could apply for other assistance.

As you can see, these are emergency, one-time interventions. They are not intended to provide long-term solutions to societal problems. They do, however, provide a key element of recovery and success – HOPE. We treat all our clients in a way that upholds their dignity, as we promise in our Baptismal Covenant. It's not always clear when and where and to whom to give. That's one reason you pray, by name, each week for...our Deacon, Burnell.

UTO is a ministry of the Episcopal Church that provides a way for **All of us to give daily thanks to God.** Everyone can become part of UTO by offering thanks to God for their many blessings, and by dropping a coin in their Blue Box. The power of the Blue Box is unlimited. It can be used at home on the table, by the bed, or in the car. If you do not have a Blue Box they are available in the tract racks located at the back of the church and in the dining room.

We give thanks to God for a warm house on a cold day, for healing of a sick friend or family member, for the look of love in the eyes of a child or grandchild. The list goes on and on because we are so blessed.

Every coin from every Blue Box is given away through grants made around the world. Special attention is given to disadvantaged persons, places and organizations. Our money has built churches, fed the hungry, clothed the poor and provided shelter for the homeless.

Lui, Sudan – Again in 2010

It has been four years since I went to Lui to consult on building techniques, and I have been asked by Bishop George Wayne Smith to return to Lui in the hopes of seeing and/or planning the building of the new Lui Diocese Headquarters Building. I feel blessed to be able to go back and will travel the first two weeks of November. And while the need was great four years ago as people returned home to destroyed villages after 20 years away to avoid the conflicts of the civil war, the need has not disappeared.

In the past four years the CDC (Companion Diocese Committee), of which I am a member, has helped with the digging of nine deep bore wells for water with a tenth planned. We have aided the people of Lui in the start of a grist mill with **United Thank Offering grants** and a poultry farm has been started. Life and health in Lui are slowly improving thanks to you and many others. For more information please visit: http://www.diocesemo.org/ministries/dioceseoflui/

Five years ago the Comprehensive Peace Agreement was signed between Northern and Southern Sudan. It was for a six year interim period, with the end coming soon. Elections were held in April of this year, the first elections in twenty four years. In less than four months there will be a referendum on Southern Sudan to become a separate country. There are a lot of fears that the country will go back to war after the referendum, whatever the result, making travel to Lui too difficult and challenging. Who Are Those EEC Visitors?

One of Emmanuel's most significant ministries is so low-profile that you may not even be aware of it. A recent letter from the Episcopal Recovery Ministry reminded me that we are showing hospitality to many people who are engaged in a daily struggle to recover from addictions.

We have hosted 12-Step Recovery groups for many years, beginning with Alcoholics Anonymous. It is said that all that is required for an AA meeting is two people and a coffee pot. In reality, it also takes an accessible, safe location with heat and lights and parking. We have been providing such a place, even with the crowded conditions of the last few years. Now that our new space is available, we will be able to welcome more groups, if needed. A fifth group was added this month.

Not all of these groups are for recovering alcoholics. Gambling is the fastest growing addiction in St. Louis. There are 12-Step groups such as Overeaters Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, and Debtors Anonymous. Al-anon is intended for family members of alcoholics, and there are groups for the Adult Children of Alcoholics.



To receive information about the nature and time of any of the groups mentioned here, please call AA at 314-647-3677. Their office is staffed during normal business hours by experienced people who can aid in referrals or respond to questions that you may have. The address for AA is 14 Sunnen Drive, St. Louis, MO 63143. They will send you a brochure with all current groups in the region if you are interested.

What can you do to help? First of all, please be especially kind and hospitable to strangers who may be looking for the right entrance or room. Make sure that parties, in your home, follow the guidelines of the Diocese and display equally attractive non-alcoholic beverages whenever you serve alcohol. Of course, we don't serve alcohol to minors in our homes. Please remember to pray for the persons in these groups and those in our parish who are healing.


