The Renewal of Ministry with the Welcoming of a New Rector by Clark Hotaling

Six months of parish efforts searching, praying and interviewing, followed by a calling, followed by eighteen months of 'checking each other out', followed by a formal call and acceptance, followed by a formal Letter of Agreement and announcement to the Parish, followed by 2 months of parish planning finally culminated in a wonderful Monday evening on March 7th with a service and Emmanuel-style reception formally welcoming the 18th Rector of Emmanuel Episcopal Church, the Reverend Daniel Scott Appleyard.

Bishop Smith, family, parishioners, friends and clergy joined Dan in renewing their commitments to minister in the church and the world. During the service gifts from the congregation included a Bible, Prayer Book, Stole (belonging to Dan's father when he became a priest) and of course, Bread and Wine. Baptismal Vows were renewed by everyone present. Prayers, intercessions and thanksgivings were given to God. The Feast was kept at the Holy Table. A combined choir of children and adults performed a wonderful version of "Go into the world". Perhaps the highlight of the service was the inspiring homily given by The Rev. Dr. Harold Lewis from Calvary Episcopal Church, Pittsburgh, PA.

Following the service, Dan was crowned 'King of Emmanuel Krewe' by The Rt. Rev. George Wayne Smith, Bishop of Missouri in the dining room. Then Dan was showered with love, poems, food (rumor has it Dan forgot to eat) and gifts from the Parish. Gifts included several rounds of golf (and assorted accessories) with special dignitaries, 70's Jazz CDs, an explore St. Louis package, cookies and desserts, Staff and Clergy Lunch, Clergy Icon, an iPad, a donation in Dan's name to the Episcopal Habitat for Humanity House, a special gift from the FaithQuest children and many more.

A large cast of Emmanuelites and staff made the evening possible, elegant and a huge success. Lenten Power Outage: Self Sacrifice Challenge Part 2 Week of March 20-March 26



During Lent, a season in which we prepare ourselves spiritually for the death and resurrection of Jesus, The Environmental Stewardship Committee and the Missions Committee invite you to spend a week practicing a simpler lifestyle, using as little electricity as you can manage. We suggest that you start your week long “Power Outage” on Sunday March 20 and finish it in conjunction with the world wide Earth Hour on Saturday, March 26 from 8:30 to 9:30 pm Central Standard Time.

Below are some suggestions and opportunities for reducing your use of electricity in your household for this Lenten Challenge. By exercising even a few of the following steps, you can cut your annual carbon dioxide emissions by thousands of pounds and your energy bills by a significant amount! We are asking you to try it for an hour, a day or a week. Perhaps you will turn this Lenten challenge into lifetime habits.

Replace incandescent light bulbs for more energy efficient ones, such as compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs) or light-emitting diodes (LEDs).

Turn off the lights when leaving a room for more than five minutes.

Make sure your dishwasher is full when you run it.

Wash only full loads of laundry in cold water.

Air dry clothes.

Install and then switch off power strips and unplug device chargers and appliances when they are not in use.

“Phantom loads” are created by appliances that are considered “turned off”: laptop chargers, microwaves, cell phone chargers, printers, and stereo systems to name a few. In fact, in the United States, 5% of residential power use is due to “phantom loads.” (Source: Lebot, Meier, and Anglade, 2000).

Set your computer and monitor to sleep when not in use, and I turn off your monitor, PC, copier and printer at the end of the day.

Use less hot water by taking 3-5 minute showers and installing low-flow showerheads.

Set your water heater thermostat to 120 degrees F.

Use a thermometer to set your refrigerator temperature as close to 37 degrees and your freezer as close to 3 degrees as possible. Make sure that its energy saver switch is turned on.

Check the gaskets around your refrigerator/freezer doors to make sure they are clean and sealed tightly.



Finally, we challenge you to compare this year’s March electric bill with 2010’s March electric bill. How much electricity did you save during this Lenten Challenge? Activities from previous Earth Hours have reported savings of electricity.

The United Nations headquarters in New York City conservatively estimates that its participation in 2009 saved \$102 in energy (for 1 hour’s conservation!).

The Canadian province of Ontario, excluding the city of Toronto, saw a decrease of 6% in electricity usage during the 2010 Earth Hour.

Toronto saw a decrease of 15.1%.

A Swedish electricity operator recorded a 5% decrease in power consumption from its projected figure between 9 p.m. and 10 p.m.

According to Vietnam Electricity Company, Vietnam's electricity demand fell 140,000 kWh during Earth Hour.

The Phillipines was able to save 611 MWh of electricity during the time period, which is said to be equivalent to shutting down a dozen coal-fired power plants for an hour.

Spiritual Scrapbooking as One Form of Kinesthetic Prayer

Is writing in your spiritual journal getting stale? Do you have trouble articulating your spiritual experiences?

Scrapbooking has been around since at least the Middle Ages. From John Locke's "common-place books" to anti-slavery documentation, to the "friendship books" of the Nineteenth Century, scraps have been used for many purposes.

We will review the different types and uses for albums, learn techniques for deciding on themes, and discuss scrapbooking as a caring ministry. We will MAKE some pages with our own hands. A follow-up session will focus on techniques to improve the appearance of your work and an opportunity to share a page with a small group. No materials needed the first time. Deacon Burnell and Sue Smith will provide lots of "stuff."

More Good Conservation Habits to Consider

Home appliances

Turn your refrigerator down. Refrigerators account for about 20% of household electricity use. Use a thermometer to set your refrigerator temperature as close to 37 degrees and your freezer as close to 3 degrees as possible. Make sure that its energy saver switch is turned on. Also, check the gaskets around your refrigerator/freezer doors to make sure they are clean and sealed tightly.

Set your clothes washer to the cold water setting, You don't need hot or even warm water to get your clothes clean.

Turn down your water heater thermostat. Thermostats are often set to 140 degrees F when 120 is usually fine. Each 10 degree reduction saves 600 pounds of CO₂ per year for an electric water heater, or 440 pounds for a gas heater. If every household turned its water heater thermostat down 20 degrees, we could prevent more than 45 million tons of annual CO₂ emissions - the same amount emitted by the entire nation of Kuwait.

Home heating and cooling

Be careful not to overheat or overcool rooms. In the winter, set your thermostat at 68 degrees in daytime, and 55 degrees at night. In the summer, keep it at 78 degrees. Lowering your thermostat just two degrees during winter saves 6 percent of heating-related CO₂ emissions. That's a reduction of 420 pounds of CO₂ per year for a typical home.

Clean or replace air filters as recommended. Energy is lost when air conditioners and hot-air furnaces have to work harder to draw air through dirty filters. Cleaning a dirty air conditioner filter can save 5 percent of the energy used. That could save 175 pounds of CO₂ per year.

Small investments that pay off

Buy energy-efficient compact fluorescent bulbs for your most-used lights. Although they cost more initially, they save money in the long run by using only 1/4 the energy of an ordinary incandescent bulb and lasting 8-12 times longer. They provide an equivalent amount of bright, attractive light. Only 10% of the energy consumed by a normal light bulb generates light. The rest just makes the bulb hot. If every American household replaced one of its standard light bulbs with an energy efficient compact fluorescent bulb, we would save the same amount of energy as a large nuclear power plant produces in one year. In a typical home, one compact fluorescent bulb can save 260 pounds of CO₂ per year.

Wrap your water heater in an insulating jacket, which costs just \$10 to \$20. It can save 1100 lbs. of CO₂ per year for an electric water heater, or 220 pounds for a gas heater.

Use less hot water by installing low-flow shower heads. They cost just \$10 to \$20 each, deliver an invigorating shower, and save 300 pounds of CO₂ per year for electrically heated water, or 80 pounds for gas-heated water.

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Vestry Vitals

“Vestry Vitals” is a feature we will continue this year. It will appear once a month following each Vestry meeting, and its purpose is to convey a high altitude view of these meetings.

On Friday, February 25th and Saturday, February 26th, the annual Vestry retreat took place. In a new tradition, retiring Vestry members provided hospitality for the new and returning members. On Friday evening, dessert was provided. And on Saturday, a full breakfast was served, followed by box lunches. What a wonderful treat this was.

Fortified with all this good food, the Vestry began by reviewing last year’s goals and the progress made on each. This led to a very thorough, in-depth discussion, spanning both sessions, of issues the Vestry believes should be addressed and how best to approach them. Ultimately, we divided issues into two broad categories, each under the banner of “Faith, Love, and Mission.”

The two categories were “Growth and Vitality” and “Enhance Financial Health.” We then formed two subcommittees to continue to examine the specific issues within each category and how to create clearly defined, tangible, workable goals for each. These groups will be meeting before next month’s Vestry meeting, and their task is to bring specific goals to the Vestry and to identify who will be involved in each activity.

At 11:00 a.m. on Saturday, delegates and alternates joined the group for the February Vestry meeting. After taking care of the business typically associated with a new Vestry (signing forms, updating records, etc.), the meeting focused primarily on a review of the issues discussed at the retreat. There was a lot of thoughtful and very good conversation around the various issues.

Next month, I will report on the specific recommendations of the subcommittees and the Vestry’s goals for the coming year.




