VESTRY VITALS

The vestry met on Monday, September 19th at 7:00 p.m. and had a full agenda. As usual, we began with a reflection by a vestry member. Karl Reif read a very moving tribute to our dear friend Andy Ruhlin. Karl talked about Andy's many gifts, his devotion to the church, his service in so many capacities over the years, and the joy and inspiration Andy brought to so many lives. "If there were an Emmanuel Hall of Fame," Karl wrote, "Andy would be in on the first ballot." With Karl speaking, you knew a baseball metaphor was not far behind. Dan Appleyard asked that Karl's tribute be amended to the vestry minutes to be made a part of the permanent record.

With some difficulty, we moved on to other matters. Bill Florent updated us on the church's financial situation, which is that we are remain basically on budget for the year. He also reviewed the status of the Behold campaign, which is also doing quite well, with 92% of pledges having been received. Efforts continue to collect the outstanding pledges. Based on a recommendation from the Behold and Finance Committees, Bill reported that we are exploring paying down some of the loan from the Diocese and investigating the possibility of restructuring the loan balance for better terms.

Clark Hotaling, who, along with Jerre Birdsong and Allison Williams, is heading up the upcoming Fall Campaign, reported on their progress. The Fall Campaign will be a season of stewardship, with an Adult Forum on September 25th, a dinner you won't want to miss on October 8th, sermons by some lay people, as well as by Pamela and Dan, culminating with the in-gathering of our pledges on October 23rd at a joint 10:00 a.m. service. The vestry is deeply committed to this campaign and hopes everyone can participate as fully as possible in this time of stewardship as we reflect on the many ways God blesses each one of us abundantly and every day.

We also discussed subjects like the new Community Time between the 9:00 o'clock service and the 10:30 service, which has been very well received. Don't forget to come spend twenty minutes or so each Sunday catching up with old friends and meeting new ones. We also discussed potential new revenue sources, upcoming relief efforts in Joplin, and the best ways to do announcements on Sunday. We heard from our delegates on what's going on at Metro III, and the Junior Warden updated the vestry on the upcoming nomination process. We also discussed how to make good use of our facilities for outside groups, welcoming those from outside our Emmanuel community while protecting what has been entrusted to us.

Following reports on plans by the Facilities Management Committee to have our steeple painted, we accepted reports by title, and adjourned with prayer. As always, it's a powerful experience to watch so many dedicated, capable people share so openly and willingly of their time and talents.

St Francis Blessing of the Animals

We don't believe in reincarnation, but my husband and I often joke that when we die we want to come back as one of his sister's dogs. She just treats them so well--they ride in her car, sleep on her couch, get long walks every day and tons of affection (not to mention a regular diet of yummy treats). What a life! In return, of course, her pets (she currently has two cats and an aquarium full of fish as well as a dog) provide steadfast love, unwavering loyalty, and companionship without preconditions. Oh, and a few sloppy kisses now and then.

On Sunday, October 2, we will celebrate the feast of St. Francis by including an Animal Blessing in the 5:30 service. If the weather cooperates, we'll meet outside in the memorial garden and hold the entire service there. You are invited to bring your furry (or feathered or scaly) friends to receive a blessing, as long as they are appropriately restrained. We will have a few dog and cat treats on hand to help keep everyone on their best behavior.

The parenting formation event (appropriately, a viewing and discussion of the film Mother Nature's Child) is taking place after the service, so if you want to do both things that night just be sure to plan ahead in terms of getting your pet home.

The life of St. Francis is just too rich and complex to delve into in any detail here, and many of the stories about him are already well-known, such as the tales about him preaching to the birds and taming a ferocious wolf. The online version of the Catholic Encyclopedia has a long article that might interest church history buffs. It also makes a truly important point, a kind of tonic to those who tire of the way Francis is sentimentalized up to and beyond the point of absurdity: he was a mystic, and a person of strict spiritual discipline, not just some simpleminded tree hugger (not that I have anything against tree huggers!). Or, as they put it:

"Francis's love of creatures was not simply the offspring of a soft or sentimental disposition; it arose rather from that deep and abiding sense of the presence of God, which underlay all he said and did. Even so, Francis's habitual cheerfulness was not that of a careless nature, or of one untouched by sorrow. [...] Francis's lightsomeness had its source in that entire surrender of everything present and passing, in which he had found the interior liberty of the children of God; it drew its strength from his intimate union with Jesus in the Holy Communion."

It's interesting to think that a person who was able to "surrender everything present and passing" was also so deeply drawn to and in tune with the wonders of Creation. Not only that, but how many of us think of mystics as being notable for their cheerfulness? In Francis' case, it makes one wonder if there's something about surrender and a pure focus on God that frees a person from unnecessary anxiety. "Consider the lilies of the field," indeed.

I hope that during this beautiful season of autumn will we all find some time to appreciate the beauty and wonder of creation, whether in our pets, in the falling leaves, or in one another.

This year we are a bit more organized and not flying by the seat of our pants. We have been asked to provide meals for 50 people this year, up from 35. As you can see, the demands are greater this year. The number of homeless is rising. We have the opportunity to help our less fortunate friends during two weekends each month from December through March.

AmeriCorps director Kathleen Bechere has asked if there might be someone who would like to work with a trained AmeriCorps volunteer to stay overnight with their guests when the shelter is open. You can help us by supporting our fundraisers and cook-ins here at Emmanuel, and by delivering and serving meals at the center at 13th Street and Ann in Soulard.

We ask you to pray about what you can do and how you can help address homelessness in the St. Louis area. There will be more to come in the Sunday bulletins and in the Angelus as we approach the kickoff dates for the program. November 6 will be the first cook-in for City Streets.

New on Second Tuesdays – Contemplative Prayer

Beginning October 11, 6 to 6:30 PM.

Contemplative prayer is a spiritual discipline which frees us to experience God's love—Setting aside a time and space to be open to the presence for God. In such a place, the Spirit of God can invite us to come and to sit before God, to quiet our exterior and interior life, and to simply be with God. As we sit in the quiet of God's presence we become like the tree planted by streams of water; our roots grow down deeply into God's love for us.

In God's presence our life and identity become rooted in the unconditional love of God, rather than in the roles we play (jobs, family, income level, education, successes, failures, possessions), or in the measures of our society. God invites us to remain in the stillness of his presence, letting our heart roots drink deeply from the water, then we, like the tree, will yield fruit in the appointed season.

One of the significant fruits of contemplative prayer is love and genuine compassion for others. "The root of Christian love is not the will to love, but the faith that one is loved...by God" (Thomas Merton in New Seeds of Contemplation, p. 75). Out of the awareness that we are loved by God we are enabled to love as we are loved (Lk 6:27-38).

The call to love our enemies sounds difficult, if not impossible. This is especially true when we continually view our enemy as "other" than ourselves. As we allow ourselves to wait in the presence of God, we begin to experience healing of those things which hinder our interior and relational freedom: insecurities, fears, prejudices, false images of God and self--and others. Our sight is cleared to see our commonality with all people in the love of God: we all stand in need of grace, love, and mercy.

In contemplative prayer we finally know that "We love because God first loved us" (1 Jn 4:19), and we become free to love as Christ loved.

Join us in setting aside 30 minutes on the second Tuesday of each month at 6:00 p.m. in the Chapel of Emmanuel Church.

We Believe: A Creative Look at the Nicene Creed

The Arts Committee of Trinity Church in Central West End of St. Louis will open the parish's next art exhibit on Sunday, September 25 with a reception at noon.
