In the Aftermath, How will we go forward? By the Rev. Martie Metzler

In the aftermath of the death of Michael Brown, we have witnessed a crisis of racial distrust and outrage in our city. We have seen the pain of those who grieve or who fear similar ends for their loved ones. We have seen peaceful demonstrators, braving teargas to make their voices heard, and we have seen antisocial rioters, hurling missles and insults at police, and leaving distraught business owners



in piles of charred rubble. Local public officials and police have struggled, sometimes heroically and sometimes ineptly, to keep control, and some citizens, including clergy have trained to place themselves in the hotspots as de-escalators. Whose heart is not breaking to realize the devastating distrust, and resentment that divides our community, and, in fact, communities throughout our nation?

How are we to respond? We Christians avow that the ministry of each baptized person is to "represent Christ" and "to carry on Christ's work of reconciliation in the world" (BCP p. 855). Mike Kinman, Dean of Christ Church Cathedral, recently reflected:

"This is only the next stage in an ongoing journey that began well before August 9 and will continue for years after... We can approach this journey as tourists -- consuming the experience as it comes to us on TV and social media. We can approach this journey as missioners -- and have as our goal to make the world a better place. But I want to suggest Christ calls to approach this journey as a pilgrimage... the real gift of a band of pilgrims is that even though everyone is walking the same steps, they are all in very different places and as long as none expects the other to be exactly where they are, they can push and prod one another, challenge and chide one another, love and share with one another, and they will all go deeper into the journey together. They will all be changed."

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Watching events unfold, I have thought of another journey that Christians have taken through the centuries: the **Crusade**. This is not such a holy journey, though always taken in the name of God.

A mission journey is taken to accomplish and end. It is prayerful, faithful, collaborative, obedient, humble, powered by love of God and neighbor. Often requiring self-sacrifice, it can be a creative force for God's Kingdom, and if successful, will incarnate God's love in the world. Sometimes, if ungrounded and unchecked by faith, the missional journey crosses over to become a crusade.

A crusade is also a means to an end, but quite different in nature. A crusade is self righteous, proud, judgmental, powered by anger and entitlement. It leaves a trail of destruction, physical, emotional, and spiritual in its wake. Crusaders sacrifice others, not self. Most of us today abhor the idea of crusade, but whenever we set off on a mission to make things better, we are vulnerable to slip into crusading mode if we listen only to ourselves and likeminded friends. We have seen this happen before our eyes recently.

A pilgrimage is a different journey, altogether. Pilgrimage has a direction toward God. The point is to travel towards the holy with others, and to let ourselves be lead and transformed according to God's desires. Pilgrimage often leads us in unexpected paths with unlikely partners, and breaks us open to new revelations.

Each of us must choose how we will journey with our neighbors in this time of crisis and the in long journey before us. Will we be tourists, risking nothing, watching from a safe distance, retreating to the comfort of complacency? Will we arm ourselves only with preconceived notions and crusade to enforce our own point of view? Or will we be pilgrims, pushing away from our home base to walk with others, whether or not we are of the same mind, with the possibility of being transformed by God, and those with whom we walk? Will we take on a mission to build something positive, more like the Kingdom that Jesus came on earth to initiate, the Beloved Community of Jesus that the Rev. Martin Luther King envisioned?

For myself, the remote stance of a tourist makes me feel powerless and disconnected from God and my neighbors. I also abhor my occasional crusader impulses, when momentarily

Founded in 1982, Webster-Rock Hill Ministries is a cooperative effort of member churches to fulfill their calling to serve people of need in our community. It works to promote and sustain community by providing opportunities and alternatives for those in need whether it's the physical necessities of life, emotional support or spiritual counseling.

Emmanuel is one of the founding members of the Ministries and our food pantry is an important resource for fulfilling its mission. Approximately 80 - 85% of our clients are Ministry referrals for emergency food. The Ministries is more than just a neighborhood resource for emergency needs like food, fans and heaters, utility assistance, or medicine.

It supports the youth of client families through Summer Camp, school supplies, the William Yandell Tutoring Program for elementary students, the Martin Luther King, Jr Essay Contest for grades K thru 12, the Rose Walls Scholarship Fund for college students and now sponsorship of a 4-H club. It offers consultations about family financial matters and legal issues as well as home repairs for elderly clients.

The Mission Committee has decided to provide a different offering for Christmas.



It distresses me that I also have had moments of being both tourist and crusader at once, pontificating about what those on the front line are doing wrong while sitting securely in front of my TV.

On the evening of the Grand Jury announcement and again last week at our Adult Forum, we have gathered at Emmanuel to voice our fears and hopes through the Collects in the Book of Common Prayer. We chose prayers for peace, for justice, for times of conflict, for guidance, for those oppressed, and those who suffer for conscience sake, for those bereaved and for courts of law, and others. So many perspectives, all humbly lifted up to God!

In those moments, offering and hearing the yearnings of all our hearts, we held each other's deep concerns and hopes sacred. We let others touch and change our own hearts. We opened to transformation by God and one another.

The more thoroughly we are transformed to listen and understand the yearnings of all God's children, the more urgent it will be for us to become God's reconciling people. We will need the faithful endurance of pilgrims, the strategy of seasoned missioners, the company of one another to keep us from falling away into complacency or crusade. That is a long term journey and may seem impossible, but as the angel said to Mary, "With God, all things are possible."

Christmas When you are Bereaved

Christmas is often difficult for us when we are missing someone who has died. There is no way around grief, and sadness is part of that, but isolation need not be. It is possible to both grieve and find some joy in celebration. Here are a few suggestions to consider if you are grieving this Christmas.

- 1. **Do what is right for you** and let your heart and head decide what is right.
- Eliminate unnecessary stress. Let your family and friends know if you are not up to all the usual preparations, and let others carry some of the work for you this year.
- 3. **Spend time with supportive, comforting people.** Don't be obligated to be with those who want you to "just get over it".

- 4. **Keep the person you love with you in your celebration** as it feels right to you. Feel free to talk about the person you miss, to do something special in memory of that person; to talk about the things your loved one loved about the holiday or would particularly have liked about your celebration this year.
- 5. Find hope and comfort in services at church, where nothing will be expected of you. Feel free to let your grief be seen and even shared by our community of faith. You may want to consider attending the Blue Christmas Eucharist at 5:30 on December 21.

Most of all, reach out to friends and clergy. Your community of faith is here for you.

5th Annual Ms. Carol's Brunch for the Homeless, Dec. 14th.

Carol Bledsoe was one of a kind. She was the friendly face at church on Sunday that always made you feel welcome. She believed the best in people, and this was evident in her work. Carol was a parish administrator at the Episcopal Cathedral in Downtown St. Louis. Through her work, Carol constantly saw the many needs of the homeless that sought shelter and help at the cathedral. Whether it was buying gloves, finding a resource, or just listening to their stories, she would do her best to meet their needs. Eventually, Carol convinced a local doughnut shop to donate their day old product and a daily breakfast club for the homeless was created. It was called "Club Cathedral." She soon became "Miss Carol," a trusted friend of the homeless.

On December 19th, 2002 Carol was tragically killed outside of her office by a homeless man she had once helped.

The next year, "Ms. Carol's Christmas Brunch for the Homeless" was created. Originally, this brunch was served at the Cathedral for the homeless that Carol cared so deeply for. It was a way to remember Carol and continue her important mission. For 6 years, the youth group of Emmanuel and members of Christ Church helped to serve the homeless in honor of

Carol. 12 years later, we continue to honor Carol by having our own brunch to raise money for the homeless programs of the Cathedral and also Emmanuel's own City Streets Mission.

The 5th annual Miss Carol's Brunch for the Homeless will be held Sunday, December 14th. A family style meal will be served after the 10am service. While it is a free meal, donations of any amount are requested in honor of Carol to support our programs. The meal consists of casseroles, fruit, and sweets and is meant to represent the meal that was traditionally served at the brunches for the homeless at the Cathedral. If you cannot make it to the breakfast, but would still like to donate, you can send a check to the church office made out to Emmanuel Episcopal with "Ms. Carol's" in the memo line.

This brunch is a great reminder of what is truly important around Christmas time. It brings together the Emmanuel family and truly makes a difference to the St. Louis community.

Soles help Souls -turning used shoes into water for those in need

During Advent the **Mission Committee** is having a collection of shoes as part of the **Shoeman Water Projects.** This organization based in Fenton gathers shoes not wore anymore and turns them into water!

The collected shoes are exported to street vendors in South America, Haiti, India, Kenya and other places where people need affordable shoes. The shoes are given to street vendors who sell them to those individuals who have no shoes for pennies on the dollar. The vendor has a job! And the money generated from exporting the shoes is used to purchase well drilling rigs, water purification systems, and other supplies to bring clean, fresh water to those who thirst!.

So bring the shoes you don't wear anymore, shoes that no longer fit, shoes you should have never

bought and sit in the back of your closet as well as children's shoes. If the shoes have shoe strings tie them together and if there are no shoestrings use a rubber band to keep them together, Bring them to church and place them in the **Shoeman box** in the dining room anytime during Advent.



Christmas Play News!



Adults (Grade 7 and older) – If you read or learn music quickly, you may attend only the Saturday morning rehearsal. You are also welcome to attend the Emmanuel Choir rehearsals on Wednesdays, December 3 and 10, 7:30-9:00 pm; the music for the play will be rehearsed at the end.

UPCOMING BAPTISMAL DATES


