#### ABUNDANCE IN A CULTURE OF CONSUMERISM

What does abundance look like to you? I recently saw a commercial for HGTV's show "Million Dollar Rooms." This show features some of the world's most exclusive and expensive spaces. One of the homes featured on the show housed a three-story indoor climbing wall, a 20,000 gallon aquarium and a \$10 million indoor pool! This show illustrates abundance at its most material—the affluence is all at once awe-inspiring and humorous.

We live in a culture that is saturated with images of abundance. While it is easy to point fingers at the rich and famous, we could just as easily find these images of abundance in our own neighborhood, maybe even in our own home. Many of us are more in danger of having too much rather than having too little. Even if we are not the most prosperous, the majority of us certainly have enough for our needs and many of our wants. Yet, we never seem to have enough. Where is God's abundance in the midst of this prosperity?

At the recent Rethinking Stewardship conference, William Cavanaugh defined consumerism not so much as having something but as restlessness for having the next best thing. We are driven by the pleasure of pursuing new things, rather than an honest desire to have something new.

Consumerism, in its restlessness, becomes a kind of spirituality in its pursuit of transcendence and meaning. Instead of this restlessness leading us back to God, it leads us to more and more things. We begin to see abundance not so much in quality as in quantity. Where do we see God's abundance in a culture dominated by consumerism?

One place that we see God's abundance is in Holy Communion. Cavanaugh suggested that we learn how to be consumers at the table. During communion, we all come to the table setting aside our material wealth and all of the things that seek to divide us.

We consume the body of the Christ as it consumes us, transforming us into the body of Christ for the world. Through the Eucharist, the act of consumption is turned inside out. The free gift of Christ's sacrifice breaks down the barriers between what is mine and what is yours, uniting us with Christ and with one another. What's more, even just for a moment, communion stills our restless pursuit, brings us peace and allows us to focus our attention on God rather than stuff.

Maybe God's abundance is nothing like the opulent homes featured on "Million Dollar Rooms." Maybe it is more like a giant potluck dinner where each person brings what they have and each person eats their fill. Or it is like a candle lit vigil where the light from one candle awakens a dark room through the simple process of sharing the light.

#### STEWARDSHIP IN ACTION

The Permanent Stewardship Committee was formed this year with the idea that its task would be to increase the parish's awareness of how our financial and spiritual lives interact. One of the ideas the Committee developed was to have regular articles in *The Angelus* that reflect the many, many ways in which our dollars go to work here at Emmanuel—to show, in essence, the many ways in which God's work gets done. This month's article is by Ann Bain and focuses on the Food Center.

The Emmanuel Food Center gives a three day emergency food supply to clients who are referred by Webster-Rock Hill Ministries, Mercy JFK Clinic, other social workers, clergy and an occasional walk-in.

We are staffed by volunteers from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday and are funded by donations from parishioners, organizations and individuals in the community.

There are many people in our community in need of food and sometimes a walk-in from outside our area comes to us for help. One time a family was sent to us by a motel owner on Watson. The family consisted of a father, mother and a baby. The father lost his job in Texas, unsuccessfully searched for work and the young family was on their way to Ohio to be with the mother's family. They had enough money for gasoline but ran out of money for food. We were able to give them items such as applesauce, peaches, pears, peanut butter, jelly, baked beans, Spaghettios and an essential item to them – a can opener.

#### THOUGHTS ON THE JUNIOR HIGH MISSION TRIP

As we boarded our rental vehicles to leave on our Mission Trip to the Arkansas Heifer Ranch we gave a prayer of thanksgiving for everyone who had made this possible – all the jam and jelly buyers, all those who came to our Spaghetti Dinner, all the parents who got the youth to and from all their activities and all those who just gave so that the kids could have this wonderful experience.

For those of you who aren't familiar with Heifer Ranch - it provides programs that teach about hunger and poverty plus inspires and challenges participants to become the change that creates a better world. It's experiential, hands-on, interactive and fun. Heifer Ranch is also a farm complete with gardens and animals including water buffalo, camels and traditional farm animals such as pigs, goats and more.

Our 5-day program puts primary emphasis on education programs, such as the Global Village and team-building exercises that explore the issues surrounding hunger and poverty and sustainable solutions. Also we participated in service activities such as helping with the daily chores on the ranch including gardening, composting, working with livestock and helping with barn and fence maintenance.

The Global Village was by far the thing we most looked forward to and dreaded because we knew that we'd be sleeping, for one night, in rudimentary housing and that we would be given very little to eat – just some rice, vegetables and oil and must find a way to build a fire and cook our meal. Plus part of our group was put the Urban Slums so we had to learn quickly how to get along with the other 20+ people who shared the slums with us so we could pool our resources to feed everyone as well and as efficiently as possible. Leaders could not be relied on to help they role-played as either 2 year olds or an addled old people.

For most of the kids, the Global Village turned out to be the most memorable part of the trip. Some of our kid's comments were:

"I really enjoyed the Global Village. That for me really taught me the things I wanted to learn. It showed me how much food others get and where they live but it also showed me how important sharing and teamwork are, in the real world."



"It taught me how hard hunger and exhaustion are and how difficult it is day after day."

"I'm not going to complain about a bathroom after using the squatty potty."

"I realize that sometimes the Scary things are the Best things."

Our Junior Highers understood one of the most important lessons Heifer was trying to teach - that everyone can do something to help the bigger picture.

Rumi was born on the Eastern shores of the Persian Empire on September 30, 1207, in the city of Balkh in what is now Afghanistan and finally settled in the town of Konya, in what is now Turkey.

Today three countries claim him as their national poet: Iran, Turkey and Afghanistan. However none of these countries as they are today actually existed back then. Iran was called the Persian Empire, a monarchy, and it was quite larger than it is today. It included all of today's Iran and Afghanistan; also parts of Pakistan, Turkmenistan, Tajikistan, Uzbekistan, Turkey and Iraq. Turkey had not yet formed then and Afghanistan was part of the Khorasan Province in the old Persian Empire.

Rumi's life story is full of intrigue and high drama mixed with intense creative outbursts. Rumi was a charming, wealthy nobleman, a genius theologian and a brilliant but sober scholar, who in his late thirties met a wandering and wild holy man by the name of Shams.

In Rumi's own words, after meeting Shams he was transformed from a bookish, sober scholar to an impassioned seeker of the truth and love."
