COMMISSIONING

On February 10th, at the 5:30 service, the Rev. Dan Appleyard Commissioned Sarah Macke as a Hospital Chaplain called to serve at Mercy Hospital. To further celebrate this ministry, Dan asked Sarah to share a bit of her story with the people of Emmanuel.

"When I first came to Emmanuel about a year ago, it became apparent to me that this was a busy parish full of generous and good-hearted people. Opportunities for giving and serving abound: in every weekly bulletin, there are reminders of ways we at Emmanuel can minister to others and thus further the mission of Jesus. We are all the hands and feet of Christ as we learn to love and as we give to others less fortunate than ourselves.

One of my main attempts to further Jesus' mission is in my work as a hospital chaplain at Mercy Hospital St. Louis, where I offer emotional and spiritual support to the patients and families of ICU. I have completed five units of clinical pastoral education, four of which took place in a chaplain residency program at Barnes-Jewish Hospital. I also have a Master's degree in Pastoral Studies and a certificate in spiritual direction from Aquinas Institute of Theology, and I am working toward board certification as a chaplain.

As part of my certification process, I need to be commissioned by my local church for the ministry I do, and though I am relatively new at Emmanuel, I asked to participate in a commissioning service where I will be "sent forth" to further the ministry of the church in my work as a hospital chaplain. This commissioning service will take place at the 5:30 PM Eucharist on Sunday, February 10. I am grateful for the spiritual nourishment I receive at Emmanuel Church, and it is a joy for me to be a part of this life-giving parish.

In the Spring of 2015, I hope to help foster the faith journeys of Emmanuel parishioners by bringing about a retreat opportunity called *A Month of Guided Prayer*, also known as *A Retreat in Everyday Life*. In this retreat program, Emmanuel parishioners will be given the opportunity to deepen their prayer lives and meet with trained prayer guides. The good news is that one doesn't have to go anywhere to participate! Safe Drug Disposal

Do you have bottles of unneeded or expired medications in your home? The Environmental Stewardship Committee reminds you: Don't flush them away! They will contaminate the water supply. You can safely dispose of them by dropping them off at the Kirkwood Police Station year-round. Webster Groves and other towns sponsor occasional "Drug Take Back" days with collection bins at the Rec Center - watch the local newspaper for dates.

WHAT IS SHOEMAN WATER PROJECTS?

Perhaps you have seen the signs at Porter Paints or Plowsharing Crafts that indicate they are drop-off points for the Shoeman. What is the Shoeman Project?



Shoeman Water Projects is a ministry of Eagle Wings Ministries, a registered 501(c)(3) non-profit charity, working to alleviate as much human suffering as possible and in the process, maximize fun with a splashing good time. Shoeman Water Projects picks up donated used and new shoes year round from businesses, churches, schools, and shoe drives. Once collected, the shoes are given a second life when the Shoeman exports the donated shoes to retailers in the developing world. The resale of shoes provides jobs and

affordable footwear. Funds generated from the export of shoes provides well drilling rigs, water purification systems, and hand pump repair mirco businesses bringing clean, fresh water to those who thirst.

Since 1998, Shoeman Water Projects founder George, the Shoeman, Hutchings, has visited Kenya repeatedly, shipping a sizable quantity of supplies including 21,000 meals for orphans, \$2 million in medical supplies, dental labs, neurosurgeons for pediatric facial reconstructions. In August of 2008 George began Shoeman Water Projects to specifically focus on clean drinking water. In his decade prior travel to Kenya he had discerned that without clean water, all other aid would be a momentary stop-gap.

From August of 2008 through June of 2011 Shoeman Water Projects has collected over 1.5 million pairs of shoes that have become affordable shoes for those in need of projection from abrasions and deadly parasites as well as clean drinking water. The Sole Power of donated shoes collected by George and his team at Shoeman Water Projects has, thus far, resulted in the purchase of 4 water-well drilling rigs, more than 250 wells drilled serving more than 200,000 people, as well as water purification system installations and well pump repairs serving clinics, schools and villages across the globe.

Emmanuel will begin its' shoe ingathering on Ash Wednesday, February 13, to support the Shoeman Water Projects throughout the season of Lent. Please bring any used shoes that are no longer being worn.

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GUATEMALA UPDATE

"The response of the parish has been amazing," said Senior High Youth Group leader Eric Dunn, "and we haven't even had the auction yet."

With the proceeds from the auction still to come at this writing, Emmanuel has responded magnificently to the call for support for the Senior High Mission trip to Guatemala this summer. Raffle tickets have been sold and requests for help from family and friends have resulted in contribution from all over the United States and from Canada. "We must be doing something right," said leader JoAn MacBryde.

Financing for the trip seems secure, but as Clark Hotaling has often said, "Guatemala is not any different from the other missions of the youth group, it's just more expensive." Which means that the work of the Senior High group goes on, with focus on learning and service. "Service projects are on the calendar and J2A will focus, not only on the mission trip and learning about what we will be doing in Guatemala, but also on preparing for adulthood as Episcopalians.," said Ian MacBryde, whose duties include J2A, which is the Youth Group's educational function. "It's tough being a teen-ager," said MacBryde," it always has been, and our charge is to help the youth make transitions while building their understanding of the faith. The support of the parish for all of our functions is inspiring."



LEADING THEOLOGICALLY: CHURCH LEADERSHIP FOR OUR TIME

One-day Workshop on Saturday, February 16, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Emmanuel Episcopal Church

Registration due by Friday, Feb 8 (week before). Lutheran School of Theology, Episcopal School for Ministry and the Giddings-Lovejoy Presbytery will cosponsor a conference "Living Theologically: Leadership for our times." This conference will serve as the Annual Leadership Conference for the Diocese of Missouri. The conference is designed to help Vestries, Bishop's Committees, Sessions and Councils to think theologically about the business of the Church.

The morning sessions will focus on two "test cases" most congregations deal with—the stewardship drive and youth ministry. Three panelists, one from each denomination, will discuss the case studies from the perspective of the theological resources of each tradition, and how those resources might be brought to bear in the life of a congregation. The conference will also provide opportunity for sharing of ideas and resources among participants.

After lunch, each denomination will have its own break-out session. For Episcopalians, Episcopal School for Ministry and Bishop Smith will lead a conversation about structuring the life of the diocese and of congregations around the five marks of mission being used by The Episcopal Church to name its priorities. We will also have an opportunity to discuss the upcoming restructuring of the national church around those priorities and how congregations might do the same. Panelists are: the Rev. Dr. Daniel Anderson-Little, most recently pastor of Trinity Presbyterian Church in University City for 14 years; the Rev. Dr. Daniel Handschy, rector of Advent Episcopal Church in Crestwood and Dean of the Episcopal School for Ministry; and the Rev. Karen Scherer, pastor of Unity Lutheran Church in Bel-Nor.

ADULT FORUM

Who is Jane Doe?

If you were not able to attend the Adult Forum on January 20th, you may not be aware of a new non-profit agency in our area. The Jane Doe Advocacy Center is providing legal service to middle class women who may not qualify for public assistance, but who are experiencing temporary financial problems. They cannot pay the private attorney they would like to have. Because the Advocacy Center charges by a sliding scale with provision for flexible payment plans, women can obtain the legal services at the time they most need them.

What needs? Jane Doe represents most often women who are the victims of sexual violence, in need of orders of protection, involved in domestic disputes, unable to get access to their money due to divorce or separation or issues of child custody. Attorney Rachna Goel, Director and Founder of this new service told Adult Forum that a long term commitment to women's legal needs is required to assure the justice, dignity and compassion which they uphold. The Center differs from other services, such as Lydia's House, in that it provides legal services and not a range of social services. Additional information is available in the deacon's office if you would to refer someone to this new resource.

"How to Make a Deacon"

We will hear from Kevin McGrane and Jerre Birdsong, postulants for the Diaconate and our deacon, Burnell Esbenshade, as they tell their personal stories and describe the process of discernment by which, as a lay diaconal minister, they became/are becoming a deacon. Kevin will show us the many requirements and talk about Clinical Pastoral Education. Jerre will explain the difference between doing a lay diaconal ministry and being a deacon, as well as pointing us to our baptismal covenant. Burnell will tell us her discernment story and share what she has learned in five years as Emmanuel's deacon. Didn't know we had three of these folks? Come get to know them all better.
