

LENTEN SNIPPETS FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Friends,

Every Lent I receive emails, see Facebook posts, get booklets from Church publishing companies and watch programs, all of which contain words of wisdom about our Lenten journeys. Some are tossed. Others touch me and help to shape my Lenten pilgrimage to the cross and resurrection of Jesus. Here are a few that crossed my path over the last few weeks.

From the Rev. Mark Jenkins, Rector of St. James, Keene, NH, a dear friend and colleague of mine:

"Like many of us, the Irish poet John O'Donohue believed that, throughout the course of his life, Jesus gradually comes to know that he is God. His awareness of his divinity is something he grows into. O'Donohue goes on to ask the question: 'Put yourself in Jesus' shoes. On the morning you discover that you are God, what do you do with your afternoon?'

"The answer to that question can tell us a lot about what we think about the divine. What would you do if you suddenly figured out that you were the Child of God? Would you go for a walk? Would you read a book? Would you telephone a friend or family member? Would you go to the synagogue? Take a nap?

"What would you do? "Guess what... you *are* the Child of God. So what now?"

From the Rev. Peter Carman, Senior Pastor of Binkley (American) Baptist Church, Chapel Hill, NC, a friend and former classmate at Divinity School:

"From a prayer written by Thomas Merton and read in the House of Representatives, 1962:

'Save us from the compulsion to follow our adversaries in all that we most hate, confirming them in their hatred and suspicion of us. Resolve our inner contradictions, which now grow beyond belief and beyond bearing.... They are at once a torment and a blessing: for if you had not left us the light of conscience we would not have to endure them. Teach us to be long-suffering in anguish and uncertainty. Teach us to wait and trust. Grant light, grant strength and patience to all who work for peace.

To this Congress, our President, our military forces, and our adversaries - Grant us prudence in proportion to our power, Wisdom in proportion to our science, Humaneness in proportion to our wealth and might....'

Peter also wrote a Lenten Prayer of Thanksgiving:

"... God of redemption and hope: We give you thanks for the bread we have shared and for the cup you have poured out for us, a new covenant promise for humankind and for every living creature. Grant that we may continue to taste the power of your sacrifice. And grant that we may today more fully be bits and pieces of Jesus' body in the world, dipped in a new reality that is breaking in among the nations and raising up the hopes of your children. These things we pray in the name of Jesus the Christ, as we mark his footsteps and follow in his wilderness path: this pilgrimage of love. Amen."

And, finally, from a recent Colbert Report: "If this is going to be a Christian nation that doesn't help the poor, either we have to pretend that Jesus was just as selfish as we are or we've got to acknowledge that He commanded us to love the poor and serve the needy without condition and then admit that we just don't want to do it." *Stephen Colbert*

May your Lent be filled with snippets - with words of Wisdom, Grace and Love!

MARCH ADULT FORUM

<u>March 3</u> - Adult Forum will feature the missioners from Emmanuel and Christ Lutheran Church presenting highlights of the Adult Mission Trip to the Rosebud Reservation in June 2012 and plans for the 2013 trip.

<u>March 10</u> - The Alzheimer's Association of St. Louis is designing a special presentation for Emmanuel on March 10th. Tiffany Phillips, Educational Director of the Association, will speak to our Adult Forum. The topic will be "Effective Communication with the Alzheimer's Patient. "We hope to go beyond the usual descriptions of the disease to discuss strategies which will help visitors and caregivers. We expect this session to be appropriate for Eucharistic Visitors, Social visitors, Caring Committee, Emmanuel at Laclede escorts, family members and friends of more than a handful of our parishioners who are suffering from this dreaded disease. Perhaps this will be the beginning of a supportive conversation among those who have experienced and are experiencing this challenge.

WHAT IS SHOEMAN WATER PROJECTS?

Perhaps you have seen the signs at Porter Paints or Plowsharing Crafts that indicate they are drop-off points for the Shoeman. What is the Shoeman Project?



Shoeman Water Projects is a ministry of Eagle Wings Ministries, a registered 501(c)(3) non-profit charity, working to alleviate as much human suffering as possible and in the process, maximize fun with a splashing good time. Shoeman Water Projects picks up donated used and new shoes year round from businesses, churches, schools, and shoe drives. Once collected, the shoes are given a second life when the Shoeman exports the donated shoes to retailers in the developing world. The resale of shoes provides jobs and

affordable footwear. Funds generated from the export of shoes provides well drilling rigs, water purification systems, and hand pump repair mirco businesses bringing clean, fresh water to those who thirst.

In August 2008, Shoeman Water Projects founder George Hutchings, began Shoeman Water Projects to specifically focus on clean drinking water. In his decade prior travel to Kenya he had discerned that without clean water, all other aid would be a momentary stop-gap. From August of 2008 through June of 2011 Shoeman Water Projects has collected over 1.5 million pairs of shoes that have become affordable shoes for those in need of projection from abrasions and deadly parasites as well as clean drinking water. The Sole Power of donated shoes collected by George and his team at Shoeman Water Projects has, thus far, resulted in the purchase of 4 water-well drilling rigs, more than 250 wells drilled serving more than 200,000 people, as well as water purification system installations and well pump repairs serving clinics, schools and villages across the globe.

Emmanuel ingathering to support the Shoeman Water Projects continues throughout the season of Lent. Please bring any used shoes that are no longer being worn and place in the dining room.

What a successful year for City Streets! We have fed and clothed the hungry with the help of many - from the cooks, to the bakers, to all who have contributed with monetary gifts and to the clothing drive. Without you, this mission work would not be possible.

Where do we go from here? Next winter will be our fourth season working with AmeriCorps. We will need to do fund-raising in the late summer/early fall time frame to help fund the cook-ins. As in the past, it cost between \$450 and \$500 per weekend to serve our guests. This supplies Friday, Saturday and Sunday dinner and Saturday, Sunday and Monday breakfast for up to 75 people.

We want to say a huge **THANK YOU** to Emmanuel for sharing in this ministry and helping to make it a great 2012-2013 season.


The Outreach project for this Province V Episcopal Church Women meeting is Episcopal City Mission.

There will be interesting seminars on Saturday and Saturday evening's Keynote speaker is The Rev. Gay Jennings, President of the House of Deputies.



AUCTION A HUGE SUCCESS — GUATEMALA TRIP ASSURED !!

The leaders of the fund-raising effort in support of the Senior High trip to Guatemala were ecstatic after the recent parish auction.

"I simply want to say THANK YOU to the Parish," said co-chair Margaret DeYoung. "We asked and they delivered. They hand crafted, hand knitted, hand painted, hand quilted, photographed, crocheted, needlepointed, cooked, donated services, donated tickets, donated parties, and donated homes."

"Emmanuel walks the walk and talks the talk. The out-pouring of love and community confimed Emmanuel's mission of being 'DEEP IN FAITH, RICH IN LOVE, BOLD IN MISSION.' What a wonderful community."

The auction--and the fund-raising effort in general--brought together scores of parishioners in support of the mission trip, not to mention the contributions of many people outside the community. The auction itself generated just under \$30,000 for the items which were sold. "And a significant part of that money also came from outside the community," said co-chair Phyllis Newcomb who worked tirelessly with a number of other people to obtain the items which were on sale. The donations to the auction of more than \$12,000 and ticket sales of over \$5,000 pushed the total auction receipts to more than \$56,000 before expenses.

"The overall fund-raising effort was broken into several components," said co-chair Clark Hotaling who spearheaded raffle ticket sales and corporate and individual donations. "Raffle tickets raised more than \$15,000 and actual donations to the trip were in excess of \$20,000. Due to the overwhelming outpouring of support for these young people, each component surpassed its goal, and we ended up with between \$90,000 and \$95,000 before expenses. Since it costs approximately \$75,000 to send the missioners on this trip there will be some seed money to leave for the next trip four years out."

As many as 30 youth and seven or eight leaders will be going to Guatemala in June.
