Dear Friends,

Over the years, my activities in interfaith dialogues have helped me to understand the many things that we Christians share in common with our brothers and sisters from such religious traditions as Bahai'i, Sikh, Islam and Judaism. Yet, as should be the case, these activities have also helped me recognize Christianity's unique view of God and creation, as well. Nowhere is this uniqueness more noticeable than in our doctrines of the Trinity and the ongoing revealing presence of God in the Holy Spirit.

I thought a lot about those two characteristics over the last few days, as I prepared for this article - for the Feast of Pentecost and Trinity Sunday are coming up on the 19<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> of May. Through the lens of these two feast days, we look at God and the world in a crazy way. I mean, how is it that we can believe in one God and a Trinity? Or, if God is perpetually being revealed in our lives through the workings of the Holy Spirit, how the heck can we discern it? And, perhaps most importantly, if we are a monotheistic faith, what good reason is there for having such a crazy and complex system of belief? Well, the one word that sums it up for me and that has been part of our traditions since the founding of our faith is "relationship!"

The earliest Christian theologians saw relationship as the essence of what is expressed in the notion of Father, Son and Holy Spirit. There is a constant interaction between these aspects of the Divine's character. Relationship is what the Creator and the Redeemer and the One who Sustains are all about: creating us to relate, redeeming us to relate and sustaining us to relate more completely to God and each other. So, relationship is at the very root of the nature of God and God's bond with creation.

The more I live and learn of life, the more I find this understanding of God powerfully compelling because it so beautifully reflects the reality of the life we live. Anyone who has had to face a crisis knows how essential human relationships are. In addition, our new

understandings of ecological systems point to the fact that when one part of nature is changed, there is a cascading effect through other parts of nature. It seems that every aspect of nature is bound up in relationship. Or, have any of you ever heard of the E.P.R. Paradox? It goes like this: if we split an electron into two parts and those two parts go spinning off across the universe in opposite directions; and if we change the direction of the spin of one of those pieces, according to the laws of physics, the other piece (now, billions of light years away on the other side of the universe) will change directions in response. Physicists call it the E.P.R. Paradox, naming it for the three scientists who first postulated it: Einstein, Pedowski and Rosen.


But, long before anyone understood reality in these ways, Jesus proclaimed to his followers that the human family is bonded together in love. What effects one part of the human family affects all. Like the created order of which we are a part or the particles that go together to make up the basic components of reality - whatever happens to one of us, happens to all of us. So, we are responsible for the well being of one another.

Imagine what our lives might be like if we lived out the implications of that interrelatedness. Imagine what the church would be like if we saw

ourselves as truly a part of one another, truly connected to one another; deeply, inseparably connected. Imagine what the world would be like if we all truly lived that way! Nothing could separate us and nothing could alienate us from one another. No divisions of race or class or gender or ideology could divide us. If one of us was ill, all of us would consider ourselves ill. If one of us was joyful, all of us would rejoice. If one was poor, all would share what they had. If one of us was treated unjustly, all of us would suffer that indignity.

The Christian concept of community and our interrelatedness to God, nature and each other is a compelling vision of reality. It challenges us to see all our interactions in this life as filled with sacred possibilities. It proclaims that the very nature of God and the fabric of all creation is built upon relationship. It holds out the dream of what the world could be like if humanity could but reach out and acknowledge that no matter what our faith is or how distant we are ultimately, we are all a part of one another. May that dream be our dream. And, may we share that dream with all that we encounter!

### Prayer Shawl Ministry - Stewardship Committee

The Stewardship Committee was formed in 2012 with the idea that its task would be to increase the parish’s awareness of how our financial and spiritual lives interact. One of the ideas the Committee developed was to have regular articles in *The Angelus* that reflect the many, many ways in which our dollars go to work here at Emmanuel—to show, in essence, the many ways in which God’s work gets done. This month’s article is by Peg Cooper and focuses on the Prayer Shawl Ministry.

**The Prayer Shawl Ministry** at Emmanuel had its beginning in 2005 when several individuals who enjoyed knitting sat down together to make shawls for those in the parish that were experiencing illness, a death in the family or some sort of crisis situation. The idea was to make and give **shawls that would be Emmanuel wrapping around an individual in their time of need.** To date over 160 shawls along with a special card have been given away. In 2007 the group decided to expand and make blankets to be given to all

those that are baptized, mainly babies, at Emmanuel. Over 90 babies have received a brightly knitted or crocheted blanket along with a specially made card. The group also has made numerous other items including hats, scarves, lap robes and blankets for the Redbud Indian Reservation; hats and headbands for the military; caps and blankets for Nurses for Newborns; blankets for the Garden of Innocents; caps for Save the Newborns; hats and scarves for the homeless through the Diocese; lap robes for St. Andrews; blankets for Lydia’s House and most recently hats, scarves and doll hats and scarves for the Board of Religious Organizations for distribution to needy children.

**Prayer Shawl Ministries** meets the first, third and fifth Thursdays evenings from 7:00 – 8:00. We knit and crochet and have wonderful fellowship together. We welcome anyone who knits, crochets or wants to learn to come join us. We have fun and enjoy what we do!

## Being a Good Neighbor

Perhaps you have toured or know someone who lives at the new residence for seniors, Provision for Living. It is located on Lockwood, opposite the City Hall at Elm.

Because they are not affiliated with a religious denomination, they have no chaplain. Residents were asking for regular worship services. Deacon Burnell consulted with the Activity Directors and helped them to make a plan which includes a rotation of churches from the community. Emmanuel did the first such service on Easter II. There were about 20 in attendance. We will take our turn on the first Sunday of the month at 1:30 in the afternoon. Churches affiliated with the WRH Clergy Alliance for Racial Equality will conduct these services as well.

Unlike Emmanuel at Laclede, where we have a number of our parishioners, we have only two at Provision. We are doing this, not to serve ourselves, but to serve the community. Eucharistic Visitors will be sent forth from our altar rail and conduct a prepared service appropriate for lay persons to lead. Our coordinator, at this time, is Postulant Kevin McGrane.

## Episcopal Church 101 - Inquirers' Class Continues on September 15

### Join us for Four More Weeks of Learning and Fellowship

“Give them an inquiring and discerning heart, the courage to will and to persevere, a spirit to know and to love you, and the gift of joy and wonder in all your works.” —*Book of Common Prayer*, page 308.

These words form part of the prayer said over newly baptized Christians. They remind us that, in a sense, we are all inquirers, regardless of how long we have been Christians or members of a particular church. There is always more to learn, and many of us find that at different stages of our life the same story or piece of information will strike us in a new way, leading to new insights and discoveries.

With that understanding of “inquirer” in mind, please consider yourself invited to our Inquirers' Class, begun on Sunday, May 12. We will meet at 11:30 for about an hour and a half; lunch and child care will be provided, if requested. You will not have to buy any books or do any homework, just bring yourself, your questions and concerns, and an open mind (and maybe even a discerning heart!).

Whether you are new to Emmanuel, new to the Episcopal Church, new to Christianity—or none of the above!—your questions and your perspective will be welcomed and honored. In this class we will all strive to learn from one another, while covering

the basic core beliefs held by the Episcopal Church on topics such as the nature of God, the role of Scripture, the sacraments, and more.

When the Bishop visits in October 13, he will be offering confirmation, reception, and reaffirmation to eligible adults. This class will serve as necessary preparation for those rites (your clergy are happy to discuss eligibility), but is not restricted to those individuals who wish to participate in them. You can come to the class just to explore; there will be no pressure to be confirmed, received, or anything else! (And yes, we'll even explain all those terms during the class).

Please **sign up for the class** on the sheet in the entry area inside the main entrance or the church or in the Dining Hall and let us know if you'll need child care. ## PREPS FOR GUATEMALA, SERVICE PROJECTS FOR YOUTH



**The Senior High Youth Group** is busy completing final preparations for the mission trip to Guatemala, in a flurry of paperwork and planning for work assignments and success.

31 youth and eight leaders will leave St. Louis for Antigua Sunday, June 2, and return June 9. While in Central America, the group will construct homes and work with the disadvantaged, including malnourished children. Preparations include a session on personal security led by Sara Edgar, a youth leader who has spent a lot of time in Latin America, primarily with the Peace Corps. Depending on the availability of internet connections, the group plans to keep the parish up to date on activities in Guatemala through posts on Facebook.

Meanwhile, the young people are continuing their service projects with a highly successful visit to Laclede Groves Retirement Communities. “It was very worthwhile for all of us, youth and adults alike,” said JoAn MacBryde, a youth group leader. “Laclede said they would be delighted to have us back.” The young people talked with residents, played games, and fetched ice cream. A number of the youth said they were very pleased to have been a part of the visit.

The youth—both senior and junior high—will also be involved in setting up, serving, and cleaning up at the Pentecost Picnic May 19.

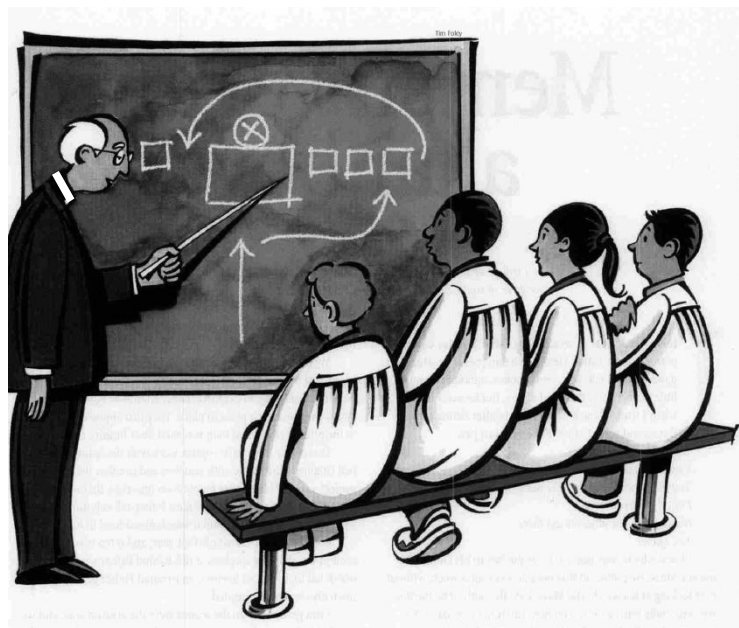
