Sarah's Message

Dear Emmanuel Household,

In my years as a hospital chaplain, one thing I have learned much about is preparing for the unexpected. Hospitals are full of surprises—some joyous, many not—and being a minister in that environment has taught me to be ready for anything. This did not come naturally to me, a gifted planner with major control needs. It was a healthy and necessary place for me to grow, because life happens after we stop writing in our planners!

Some of you know that my family has had a dose of the unexpected this Spring. Jami's decision to leave City Garden was a difficult one, and we did not predict the timing of it. Though we knew that my training for chaplain supervision at St. Luke's had a finite schedule, we didn't know that we would so soon be asking, *What's next for us?* Like so many of my patients, and like so many of us here at Emmanuel, I was faced with the reality that no matter how well we plan things out, we are not as in control as we would like.

It is with the sadness that I write to you that my time at Emmanuel will end much sooner than I had hoped. I have accepted an offer to be a CPE Supervisor at St. Luke's Hospital in Houston, Texas, a member institution of the Texas Medical Center. I will be working with a team of experienced supervisors there, overseeing chaplains for our own institution as well as Texas Children's Hospital. Jami has accepted an administrative position witha Montessori school he has long respected, very near the hospital, where Ira has been invited to be a student. My last Sunday with you will be August 12.

These opportunities are very exciting to us, but because they came sooner than we planned, I find a deep sadness in the way we are leaving Emmanuel and our St. Louis community. Leaving is never easy; I regret adding the prematurity to it. I do look forward to our remaining months together, deepening our faith, enriching our love, and emboldening our mission for the future! through this process, and I give thanks for what he has taught me in my time as Assistant.

You all have taught and given me more than this letter can say, but please accept my gratitude for incarnating the joy and vitality of Christian community. Emmanuel Emergency Food Center


Members of the parish have been very generous with their help to the Food Center but we are facing a difficult time. Each month of 2013 we have spent more money on groceries than we received in gifts. In April we received \$217. in gifts and spent \$787. for groceries. Children are now home from school for summer vacation and many will be having their lunch at home every day. Many of our Food Center clients have children who receive a free or reduced cost lunch during the school year and will be eating that meal at home this summer. If clients are already receiving food help, fixing lunch for two or three children five days a week is a significant increase in their need for food.

Except for one or two walk-ins a month, all of the Food Center clients come from agencies or the clergy. Most of the clients live in the 63119 zip code.

While the Emmanuel Emergency Food Center is not faced with an immediate crisis, the need is great and ongoing. Please continue to remember the Food Center especially when giving gifts in thanksgiving for or in memory of a loved one.

The Emmanuel Emergency Food Center would not survive without your help.

Operation Brown Bag - Stewardship Committee

The Stewardship Committee was formed in 2012 with the idea that its task would be to increase the parish's awareness of how our financial and spiritual lives interact. One of the ideas the Committee developed was to have regular articles in *The Angelus* that reflect the many, many ways in which our dollars go to work here at Emmanuel—to show, in essence, the many ways in which God's work gets done. This month's article is by Marie Holt and focuses on Operation Brown Bag.

Gateway Homeless Services is the largest 24-hour emergency shelter for single women and families in the state of Missouri. Located on 19th Street at Martin Luther King Drive, it has 110 beds and serves three meals a day. Sixty per cent of its clients are under age 11. In addition to emergency shelter, the services provided include training to prepare adults for transitional or permanent housing. And for children and youth the organization offers tutoring, childcare, computer-literacy training and various programs sponsored by churches, civic organizations, St. Louis Science Center and St. Louis Public School systems. But the service that caught our attention was the "Brown Bag Lunch" program which hopefully fulfills

the need for 100 lunches to homeless men and transients per day as well as the occasional need for a child staying at the center to take a lunch to school.

Three Emmanuel groups help with this project, each meeting once a month to purchase, put together and deliver 75 lunches to the shelter. Junior High Youth meet every third Sunday of the month; the Noon-Day group meets every second Thursday; and the Men of Emmanuel meet every fourth Thursday evening at 4:45. Each lunch contains two bologna and cheese sandwiches with condiments, a juice, a bag of chips and an individually wrapped snack cake or cookie. That means a total of 5400 sandwiches for 2700 lunches per year provided by these three groups. That's between five and six per cent of the annual need.



Moore, Oklahoma Tornado Relief

Tornado Watch: Tornadoes are possible in the area. Stay tuned to the radio or TV and watch the sky.

Tornado Warning: A tornado has been sighted. Take cover at once.

Do you have a plan? Your family might not be together when a tornado strikes. That's why it is important to have a plan in place. Talk about how you will reach each other.

Prepare an emergency kit. The below listed items should be part of your basic emergency kit and kept in a container that can be easily carried.

- •Water and canned or dried food families should set aside one gallon of water per person per day, to last three days, and a three-day supply of food per person. Remember to include a manual can opener.
- •Battery powered radio.
- •Flashlight
- •Extra batteries for the radio and flashlight
- •Prescription Medications
- •First-aid kit.

Pick a safe place in your home where family members can gather during a tornado. The safest place to be is underground, or as low to the ground as possible and away from all windows.

Prayers and Opportunities for Giving Support

Prayer. Diocesan members want to know how to support the people of Moore, Oklahoma, after Monday's F-5 tornado. Bishop Ed Konieczny, fifth bishop of the Diocese of Oklahoma and former police officer, asked for our prayers. "We are all aware of the devastation that has hit our communities over the last few days and our hearts are broken," wrote Bishop Ed to the diocese. "Please continue to pray for all who have been personally affected by the storms. As far as we can determine, our churches in the storm areas received only minimal if any damage. Unfortunately, some members and staff of our church have lost their homes and suffered substantial damage. We are still trying to assess the extent of that damage and the needs of those affected."

Donations. Money helps. In a disaster, advance planning kicks in and only first-responders and large agencies have access to the area. In Oklahoma, the diocese provided shelter and resources to members. You can contribute directly to the diocese using the address at the end of this article. Episcopal Relief and Development's (ER-D) emergency funding assists dioceses and congregations in reaching out to the most vulnerable members of their communities, supplying food, clothing, temporary housing, pastoral care, case management and support for unmet long-term needs.
