The night we left our St. Louis apartment, we asked Ira if he'd like to see the inside of his home one last time before we moved. At first he said no; then he said yes. As we wandered through each empty, swept-clean room, we waved and bid goodbye, conjuring simple memories and having a last laugh or two. After some initial ambivalence, it was a happy parting, and I was relieved.

Then I had just a quick errand to drop something off at Ira's school, and night had fallen. *Oh!* I thought. *We're on an accidental pilgrimage!* We stepped up to the front door to deliver our note, and I kept up the ritual of waving and smiling. But there, lit in the parking lot, Ira's laughter and waving turned to full-on tearful grief. Getting down on the ground with him, we took pictures of his favorite corners and views from the outside. He stood over the brick with his name on it; he kissed his favorite plant. He pointed out where the rainbow had once been in the sky over the building. With his memories and gestures he was building a cairn, a pile of stones to ceremonially mark an important place.

His sadness was so open; he didn't cover or deny it the way we adults might tend to do. And when I offered him some pitiful grown-up perspective – "it's hard to leave behind these things, especially looking ahead to all the new," – he said very clearly to me, "I have no room in my head for the new, Mama. I only have room for my sad." Ira's vulnerability, the ambivalence and the spontaneous ritual and the emotion, in the safety of that dark night of passage, became for me a call from God. He reminded me how God calls us to be in relationships with one another. He reminded me how to leave well.

Brief and full relationships, like our year together at Emmanuel, are a different kind of sacred from the long and winding ones. We never had much ordinary time together; we are still getting to know one another. And yet, as Ira made so clear to me, I have this incredible reverence for you all that I refuse to minimize. The hospitality, generosity, humor, and talent of your community leave a deep impression on my family; Houston will have mighty shoes to fill!

Let us practice with one another the important spiritual discipline of parting well. As St. Paul took care to bless those communities to which he wrote, I see him striving to make them feel utterly seen and known. Jesus, who wept at the loss of his friend, promised that he would be with all of us, even to the end of the age. How might we live our lives in their example, taking deliberate moments to feel our grief and extend our blessing? What cairns might we build at all the endings we encounter, so that we might deliberately mark the sacred as we wander in and through it?

You may find me tearful this last week together, or, God forbid, kissing the plants (as you know, better that I kiss them than keep them!). Thank you again for welcoming me, and for welcoming Ira, Jami, Austin and Taylor among you. Thank you for inviting me into your sacraments, your service, and your stories. You have taught me and given me so much. As we gather around our greatest cairn, Christ's altar, I will be thanking God for the blessing of being with you. And I will go on thanking, as we part.

There are many opportunities that come our way. When opportunity knocks, we all have the choice to accept the opportunity or to resist and shy away. The older I get I realize that opportunity does not always knock a second time. Opportunity is often spontaneous and almost always requires change. While change is scary it is truly a constant we can depend on.

A few years ago I decided I wanted to learn to play a “stringed” instrument. Realizing my limitations I chose a mountain dulcimer as the young man at “Music Folk” said, “ma’am, this instrument can almost play itself!” I am here to tell you the dulcimer definitely does not play itself but it is a very pleasurable instrument to work at. The dulcimer has taught me to love folk music as well as allowed me meet many amazing people. About the same time I got interested in learning to play music I had the opportunity to serve on vestry. And somehow with my involvement with vestry and scheduling folk musicians to play concerts here at church, my vestry responsibilities have surprisingly broadened my music contacts and allowed me to form many unique friendships.

One of those treasured friendships is with Aubrey Atwater and her husband Elwood Donnelly. I met Aubrey and Elwood at a music festival and instantly loved their Irish Celtic music and dance. I was thrilled to share their music with my Emmanuel family when they agreed to do a concert for us last August. As you know the Vestry has devoted much attention to incorporating same gender blessings to our altar this year. A missive from Elwood’s newest publication, “A Place At The Table”, a cookbook and collection of missives, eloquently captures the spirit of this new change for Emmanuel. It is with Elwood’s permission that this missive is reproduced.

A Place At The Table

It was a time to reflect on the day’s events, share experiences, relax and enjoy each other’s company while replenishing our bodies. If someone dropped by during dinner, we’d set another place and invite our visitor to join us; there was always enough food for one more, even if we had to divide our own servings. I’ve been told that, in some families, if someone arrived during dinner, unexpectedly, they would be asked to return later. There’s something parsimonious about that, and it’s also a metaphor for how we sometimes treat other villages in the world.

When we’re selfish, although it is sometimes necessary in order to preserve our privacy and boundaries, we separate ourselves from others and risk sacrificing moments of attachment that promote affiliation and friendship. Some believe that we are constantly in the company of angels; and for that reason, they welcome unexpected visitors, for to turn an angel away would be sinful, absurd and incongruous. To these people, a chance meeting is serendipitous rather than irksome and awkward.

Our children may choose partners outside the parameters of the model established by our peers and corporate media strangehold-with stepchildren or cultural differences, or even a same sex partner. But we, as parents will either accept their choices as the result of the teachings we’ve offered, allowing them to be free thinkers-inclusive, mindful, and compassionate, or distance ourselves from even our own children because of their choices. It is at these times, especially that we may need to shift our paradigm and simply set another place at the table.

Stewardship Committee - Jr. High Youth Group

The Stewardship Committee was formed in 2012 with the idea that its task would be to increase the parish's awareness of how our financial and spiritual lives interact. One of the ideas the Committee developed was to have regular articles in The Angelus that reflect the many, many ways in which our dollars go to work here at Emmanuel—to show, in essence, the many ways in which God's work gets done. This month's article is by Marie Holt and focuses on the Jr. High Youth Group.

There's much more to adolescence than age. It is a time chock full of changes, choices, discoveries, doubts and emotions. To provide a helpful presence, 12 years ago Emmanuel started using a youth program called Journey to Adulthood. Prior to that time, youth activities were primarily focused on fellowship. Now there is also a curriculum which is divided into two sections. One is for youth in grades six, seven and eight; (JrHi), the other for high school students.

The JrHi curriculum is called Rite 13 with categories and lessons teaching us the various ways we think of God: that we are made in His image (and what the heck does that mean); decisions; faith and trust; compassion and mercy; stereotyping; and communications. Seldom does a week go by that there isn't a news item that can be discussed in the context of one of these categories'.

When not in Rite 13, the youngsters might be making brown- bag lunches for the homeless shelter (monthly), or preparing for a fund raiser so they can go on a mission trip or adopt a family (for the

Webster Rock Hill Ministries Christmas program), or doing fall yard cleanup as part of "Make a Difference" day, helping with preparation and serving of a parish dinner (especially the Advent soup supper). Junior High kids are key in our acolyte program and what better way to experience God's teachings. Maybe they are just doing something fun together off campus. There is an annual overnight retreat where they get to know each other and the leaders.

JrHi leaders still remember when a sixth grader asked, "Did God really make the world in seven days?" After some discussion, we all agreed that "God's time and our time are not the same." Later in the year, during one of our Rite 13 discussions, the same youngster remarked, "I don't know how it all happened but I know God made the Earth." As a junior in high school, that young man spoke to the congregation on Youth Sunday and described his faith journey and what it meant to him.

On the wall of the JrHi classroom is a poster with this question from the Baptismal Covenant:

"Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers?"

We are striving for a "yes" answer.

Guatemala 2013 – A Reflection

In the months leading up to the Senior High Guatemala Mission Trip, my anticipation grew and I could not wait, not only to help those in need, but also to experience a new country. I had not left the US since I went to Mexico at five years old.

The transition into a new country is eye-opening. The overall way of life is significantly different. The laws are different, the way people drive is different, the climate is different. But what stood out the most to me is the fact that everyone was happy with what they had, and they didn't have nearly as much as all of us did.

Building houses was our main job. On our worksite we saw many children with little to nothing to play with, yet they seemed content. One night, we saw a group of young kids playing soccer. Typically, soccer is played with tennis shoes or cleats, but the majority of these kids were playing in school shoes or dress shoes, and they were all very good. They all seemed very happy. On our worksite, the father for whom we were building the house, helped every single day. I saw this selfless characteristic among many people in Guatemala, and it was very heart-warming.

Over the course of the trip, my group dug trenches, mixed concrete, nailed nails and sweated through the hot days. We also bonded together to form a close-knit group, not only with each other, but also with the God's Child Leaders. We cooperated and formed a team which had one goal: to build the family in need a new house. The work was tough, but knowing that a family is going to have a roof over their heads and a safe home that will last at least forty years makes every ounce of it worth it. The only complaint you would ever hear of was of the hot, humid weather. But not one person ever complained that the work was too hard, or that they were too tired. No matter what, we pressed on through these three days and completed the house.
