Epiphany Reflections

The first winter I spent as a hospital chaplain was full of "firsts" for me – it was my first time to care for strangers as they received bad news, and my first time to witness the strange mystery of a human being taking her last breath. It was my first time to play with young children who had been rushed with their mother to labor with a surprisingly early baby brother. Many of these firsts were dramatic; many were scary, and I often felt sad. I had an Advent and Christmas season like none other before. How different to sit with the sick in an emergency room rather than around a tree and fire with my children and spouse. How strange to trade the sound of children singing carols for the *beep*, *beep*, *beep* of a monitor keeping the rhythm of a young man's heart.

When January of that first year rolled around, perhaps it's no surprise I had the urge to celebrate. Among colleagues one morning when we all returned from Christmas, I volunteered what to me was the most logical idea of all—to bring the Epiphany Cake. "The *what*?" they all asked. "You know, the King Cake," I said, blushing. And to my great embarrassment, none of them knew what it was. So I told the story of my family's yearly Epiphany tradition, one that my sister and I have carried on into our own families. And I did bake it and bring it to my colleagues, who were Catholic, Evangelical Presbyterian, Baptist, and Episcopalian. And we crowned a King with a silly ceremony, and videotaped our hilarity. My quirky little Anglophilic family tradition then became a source of joy for us weary chaplains. Plus, they continued to be thoroughly amused that I thought *everyone* had a King Cake every year.

It was one of those opportunities—and there have been many—to realize not everyone has the same normal that I do. A sacred tradition for one of us can be a strange and alienating ritual to another. As Episcopalians, we have some quirky rituals in common. We eat bread and wine and call it "body" and "blood." We "wash" our baptismal initiates to seal them as one of us and one with God. Some of us may take these traditions for granted, the same way I thought everyone had a cake with an acorn in it on January 6th. But most of us find these eating and washing rituals to be salvific, grounding us as children of God and beloved of one another.

But each of us also has our own quirky traditions that mark the time. Our own families, in more obvious or subtle ways, passed down to us ways of beginning and ending the seasons, the school year, the day. One way to draw these out for ourselves can be to say, "It isn't Spring until ______." One of the most life-giving things I think we can do as individuals and families is to find traditions for ourselves that bring comfort in times of stress and strangeness. If we don't like what was passed down to us, we can make new ones.

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One family I know took a walk together two Thanksgivings in a row and thereby dubbed it, "the Annual Family Thanksgiving Walk." One friend of mine lights a fire every New Year, and lets the past year's trouble "burn away" as notes written on little pieces of paper.

For me, the Epiphany cake brought some delightful familiarity in a time of strangeness and vulnerability, and luckily my friends let it spread to them. What brings you that feeling? As the Light of Christ spreads into the

world this season, I invite you to resurrect a tradition that has lit up your life. Whatever has brought warmth and comfort to you may in fact be just the thing to cheer someone else, and connect you to one another in the cold and dreary drag of the months to come.

Christ the Son be manifest to you, that your lives may be a light to the world, in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, *Amen*.

STEWARDSHIP

The Permanent Stewardship Committee was formed this year with the idea that its task would be to increase the parish's awareness of how our financial and spiritual lives interact. One of the ideas the Committee developed was to have regular articles in *The Angelus* that reflect the many, many ways in which our dollars go to work here at Emmanuel—to show, in essence, the many ways in which God's work gets done. This month's article focuses on the Altar Guild.

The Altar Guild members prepare the altar and church for every Sunday, weekday and special service, including Christmas Eve, Christmas, Holy Week and Easter. Altar Guild members are a constant, joyful presence in the church, and they make it possible for everyone to enter into our beautifully and carefully prepared sacred space to celebrate. Altar Guild members are dedicated, hard working parishioners who take pride in the care and preparation of the church for worship, and have a wonderful time doing it.

There are about 35 people who serve with the Altar Guild. Each month 5 or 6 members from the committee take responsibility for that month's services – liturgies, weddings, funerals, etc. Each member serves twice a year on a monthly committee, which includes Saturday preparatory work, assisting at a service on Sunday and help with any special services. Their normal weekly work includes silver polishing, wine and candle purchasing, linen laundry, banner displays, altar, credence tables, narthex and vestment preparation, marking the readings, as well as work after each service. For special services such as Christmas, they are responsible for decorating the inside and outside of the church and Memorial Garden with poinsettias, wreaths and bows. At Easter, the church is filled with white lilies.

In their own words, they have described their work as a wonderful way to meet and get to know others; a way of putting into action their love of God, worship and the community; and a holy, concrete way to be a laborer in the work of the Lord. While the work is "behind the scenes," it is also work that is visible during liturgical celebrations with the community. The work can provide spiritual growth, add to a person's knowledge and understanding of liturgy and traditions, and foster lasting friendships.

HOME FROM LUI

The adjustment to life back in the states was eased a little by our stop in Kampala. At the guest house we all marveled at the running water and hot showers, flush toilets, and even fans in each room! The food was lovely, and most memorable was the harrowing car rides through the tangled streets, fighting for every inch of pavement with the other cars, motorbikes, and bicycles with not one traffic light or stop sign.

Although a day and a half have passed, I am still waking and walking in a dream. The experience in Lui was so powerful and spiritual that the memories color my every moment. I find tears appearing as I share with my loved ones. The beautiful people of Lui are etched in my mind forever: their faith, love, and humbleness. We are now friends for life, and I feel so blessed to have experienced the trip.

My reflections have to include music. At our nightly Compline service our team sang hymns ranging from "Amazing Grace" to "Bless the Lord" suggested by Maria, becoming our "theme" song. The music of the Lui people amazed me with their beautiful singing (with a unique tone quality) on pitch and in their high register from all ages and the intricate drumming and percussion. The songs we heard were exclusively faith-based, sung while working at tasks, in school, as well as church. My wind recorder was of great interest, and I gave it to Bishop Stephen's wife Lillian before departure. Lillian had an electric keyboard, and I had fun playing it and giving lessons to a very motivated young Lui man until the electricity went out!

I rejoice that I was blessed to meet the loving people of Lui and that God paved our way to achieve His plan for our Missouri Diocese team and Bishop Stephen's goals.

WOMEN'S BOOK CLUB

Following his award-winning *The Kite Runner*, this second story covers the tumultuous existence of two Afghani women, whose lives crossed each other over the forty years leading up to the fall of the Taliban in 2003.

Time magazine's Lev Grossman placed it at number three in the Top 10 Fiction Books of 2007, praising it as a "dense, rich, pressure-packed guide to enduring the unendurable;" and the *Washington Post's* Jonathan Yardley wrote in *Book World*: "Just in case you're wondering whether Khaled Hosseini's *A Thousand Splendid Suns* is as good as *The Kite Runner*, here's the answer: No. It's better."

AUCTION SET FOR FEBRUARY 9

"It's a fun evening that you don't want to miss!" said Margaret DeYoung, chair of the auction scheduled to raise the funds needed for the Senior High Youth Group mission to Guatemala this next summer. Any number of parishioners who attended a similar event four years ago would probably agree. "The fellowship was terrific, the meal was great, and a lot of us ended up with things that we really wanted," said Ian MacBryde. "We bought something that turned out to be one of the best vacations we ever had."

The Auction is set for Saturday, February 9, from 6 - 10:30 p.m. at the Shrewsbury City Center. Tickets are just \$25 which includes a full-course meal and drinks. All proceeds support the mission trip in June.

There are a number of vacation home stays among the items to be offered, including three in various parts of Florida. If your tastes run to the mountains, Colorado is on the list, as are a couple of spots in Missouri and a home in Oregon!

There are also items which involve the talents of Emmanuelites including paintings, photographs, quilts, and special tutoring for the ACT and in specific subjects. Phyllis Newcomb, who is in charge of gathering the gifts to be auctioned, points out that the list is not yet complete. "I think there will be a couple more big surprises," she said. Parishioners have been very generous and we are so grateful to them for sharing their talents on behalf of the Youth Group.

Tickets for the auction and also raffle tickets (the drawing will be at the auction) are available at most events where Emmanuelites gather. For information talk with Senior High Youth leaders.

The vestry met on November 19th and December 17th for its regularly scheduled meetings. The financial news from both of these meetings has been positive. The Standing Committee of the Diocese of Missouri has agreed to reduce the interest rate on the Kelton White Loan to 2.8% retroactive to January 1, 2012. We anticipate not having to make additional interest payments on our loan for the building renovation since we have continued to make payments on the loan at the higher interest rate while the Standing Committee was considering Emmanuel's request for an interest rate reduction.

Parish Treasurer, Diana Knapp, reported that the year continued to be strong from an income and expenses perspective. Pledges received through November are ahead of the figure budgeted and expenses are under budget. This is due primarily to the fact that much of money budgeted for an assistant priest in 2012 was not paid out because of the departure of Pamela Dolan in 2011 to be the Rector at Church of the Good Shepherd. Collection of prior year pledges also continues to exceed amounts budgeted.

At the December meeting, Richard Keyes reported that the results to date of the 2013 Every Member Canvas are very encouraging and on target to meet the financial goals set by the Vestry for the coming calendar year. As of December 17th, Emmanuel has received 183 pledges, 38 of which are new, and we are hopeful that additional pledges will be received. If you have not sent in your pledge card, it's not too late to drop it in the collection plate on Sunday or mail it to the office.

The Rector advised of his letter to the Parish announcing the call of The Rev. Sarah Sweeney and The Rev. Martie Metzler, who will serve as our two new Assistant Priests. As most of you probably know, Sarah has already begun her duties at Emmanuel and Martie will arrive on Ash Wednesday. To assist Martie in moving to St. Louis from New Jersey, motions were approved to provide her with moving expenses and a low interest loan to assist her in buying a home here.

Kathy Lorino and Gary Tappana reported on the activities of the AIR Committee. The Newcomers Brunch on November 4th was a success with four new families, each with two children, and two single newcomers attending.

Richard Keyes reported that the Nominating Committee met on November 18th and nominated the following people to serve on the vestry: Suzie Florent, John Liss, Mark DeYoung and Ann Marie Ruhlin. Mary Kay Horton and Cynthia Rapp have been nominated as delegates; Pam Penrose and Janet Dobbs have been nominated to serve as alternate delegates.

The Annual Meeting, which will be held on January 27, 2013, and the beginning of the new calendar year are almost upon us. There will be two Lenten series offered. The focus of one of these will be same gender blessings. Bishop Smith, following approval from the 2012 General Convention, has asked each parish in the Diocese to enter into discussions to determine if parish clergy will be authorized to perform same gender blessings. Dan urged us to keep in mind that even if Emmanuel decides to offer same gender blessings, this is only a blessing and not a sacrament because the State of Missouri does not recognize same sex marriage. The other Lenten series available will be a Trinity Institute ministry program on the topic of Radical Christian Life – equipping ourselves for social change.

A special thanks was expressed by Jodie Allen and all of the members of the Vestry for the ministry of Ann Marie Ruhlin and her tireless efforts in leading the Cherub and Junior Choirs.

Both meetings were concluded with prayers for those in need followed by the recitation of the Lord's Prayer.
