All Things Come of Thee, O Lord, and of Thine Own Have We Given Thee (1 Chronicles 29:14b)

Dear Friends,

Over the years, my father used to go fishing off the coast of Rhode Island. In time, I joined him, heading out on the water with a friend of his, Lang Hemmingway, and sometimes with my friend Jeff Emes, in tow. They were one of the greatest parts of my vacations as a young man. We would leave early, make our way toward Fishers Island, and fish the waters for Bluefish, Bonita and Stripped Bass. But, every trip would end by fishing the ocean's bottoms for flounder. At that time, flounder were plentiful in the Long Island Sound and those parts of the Atlantic. Lang would guide the boat to where the sea gulls were feeding on the tiny minnows which the blues were striking, and then steer it over the rock reefs around which the flounder gathered. These fishing trips were the stuff of family lore, the flounder some of the best meals I remember, and Dad's stories live on in my memory.

Today, the flounder are depleted. There are commercial and recreational limits in place in an attempt to rebuild the population. That part of the Atlantic seaboard has drastically changed, and for many, is little more than a memory.

As we move into our Fall Stewardship Campaign, I find myself thinking about Dad's stories about the coast of Rhode Island. The Christian faith is, I think, desperately needed today - desperately needed to remind us that what we call "ownership" is not really ownership at all. Face it. We do not own the earth. We do not own the seas. Truth be told, we do not really own anything. Everything that we have and everything we are belongs to God. It is only ours on loan. What we do with it is our way of giving thanks. As Wendell Berry once said, "It is possible, I think, to say that... a Christian agriculture [is] formed upon the understanding that it is sinful for people to misuse or destroy what they did not make. The Creation is a unique, irreplaceable gift, therefore to be used with humility, respect, and skill."

I hope that this season of celebrating how Emmanuel is *Rich in Love* has given you and your family the time to reflect on how blessed we are at Emmanuel. Like my memories of fishing with my father, I hope that you have shared stories about how this parish has touched your life and

the lives of those in the world we serve. I pray that over the coming weeks you will be challenged to recommit yourselves to the mission and ministry that we share in this place - for God has given us abundant life and we have been richly blessed with love and the power of the Spirit. In the midst of all, I ask you to remember, as we serve this world in Christ's name with love, humility, respect and skill, the Holy Spirit is at work quietly among us.

Our Fall Campaign is well underway. Its theme *Rich in Love*, includes a note writing campaign that is intended to touch every household. Inquiring Minds Want to Know! By Judy Ermold

When my husband, John, suggested we sign up for Emmanuel's Inquirers' Class, my first response was less than enthusiastic. Weren't our Sundays busy enough? Wasn't our knowledge of the Episcopal Church adequate? After all, I was baptized in an Episcopal church, we have been attending services at Emmanuel for a year, plus we have our very own copies of the *Book of Common Prayer* AND the *Revised Common Lectionary*. Wasn't that enough?

Fortunately, the wishes of my inquiring husband prevailed and we joined the recent four-session program. What a great decision! Not only have we been refreshed on the basics of the faith, but we have also absorbed some interesting details and insights. Working in tandem, Dan and Martie have provided excellent presentations to their small but attentive audience. Videos, down-to-earth conversation, and hands-on reading of scripture are some of the teaching

tools they use. No topic is off-limits, and no question is dumb.

Personally, I like being reminded of the compelling qualities of the Episcopal Church. How assuring it is to know that the authority of this faith is based on Scripture, Tradition, and Reason. In our ongoing efforts to live as Christians, most of us at Emmanuel probably admit to being a "work in progress." But we are also a congregation that cares about our neighbors, focuses on scriptural guidance rather than nonessential dogma, and not only tolerates but welcomes diversity.

Yes, Inquirers' Class has been a positive experience that John and I highly recommend to old and new Episcopalians, as well as to the uncommitted in search of a spiritual home base. I must, however, express one disappointment about the class: Too few" inquirers" showed up! Exploring the faith (and eating pizza) with Dan and Martie could have been even better with greater participation.

One of the amazing things about Emmanuel is the wonderful, growing group of young families coming here regularly to love and serve the Lord. We all benefit from the energy, creativity, and vitality this group brings to our faith community. 
