Dear Friends,

In the next few weeks, the seasons of Epiphany and Lent meet one another on March 5<sup>th</sup>, Ash Wednesday. In the opening days of March, perhaps all of us might be challenged by this convergence and by the "balancing act" that God constantly calls us into.

In the Season of Epiphany, we are called into Mission, as all our recent Sunday readings remind us. This is the time when Jesus defines his mission and calls his disciples to get out into the world to join him in ministry. Lent is the season when we join Jesus in the wilderness of reflection – a time set aside by the Church for spiritual discipline and self-reflection. One season is a time of reaching out and the other is a time of reaching in. Someone once said that when Epiphany meets Lent, God's proclamation meet God's tears. Or put another way, their "meeting" is a time when the call to mission meets the call to listen.

Recently, I was asked to share some reflections at a dear friend's Burial. She was a woman who was passionate about both these aspects of the Christian Journey. When I first met her she was "into" the Christian mystic, Meister Eckhart (1260 - 1328). And, in the early days of our relationship we read and reflected on his approach to the Christian faith.

As I thought about our conversations together, I was reminded that Eckhart's practical communication of the mystical path to a life of Christian "holiness" inspired the people of his day and challenged the Church. His writings and his approach to faith are believed to have been formative to the publication of the anonymous 14th-century text, Theologia Germanica. In turn, that influential work, even without the "imprimatur" of the Church, shaped the history of the church for the next two centuries. Some believe that Eckhart's influence on German religious thought, and so on Martin Luther, was pivotal in provoking Luther's actions and the subsequent Protestant Reformation.

Some of the quotes (and a few more) that I shared at my friend's Burial Service, from Meister Eckhart's writings were these:

"What we plant in the soil of contemplation, we shall reap in the harvest of action."

"A just person is one who is conformed and transformed into justice."

"If the only prayer you ever say in your entire life is thank you, it will be enough."

"The eye with which I see God is the same eye with which God sees me."

"Every creature is a word of God."

"The more we have the less we own."

"God expects but one thing of you, and that is that you should come out of yourself in so far as you are a created being made and let God be God in you."

"What a man takes in by contemplation, that he pours out in love."

"Only the hand that erases can write the true thing."

"The outward work will never be puny if the inward work is great."

"You may call God love, you may call God goodness. But the best name for God is compassion."

Remembering my friend in these closing days of Epiphany and as I face the opening days of Lent, my prayer is that you will find yourselves challenged by this convergence and by the "balancing act" that God constantly calls us to engage in. Listen to Jesus as he defines his mission and calls us out into the world join to him in ministry. And, embrace this coming Lent when we are asked to join Jesus in the wilderness of reflection. Embrace the time of reaching out and the time of reaching in. Let Epiphany meet Lent in your lives. Embrace God's proclamation and meet God's tears. And, let their "meeting" be a time when the call to mission meets the call to listen.

#### The Small Group Topics Are:

# 1. Waging Racial Reconciliation Led by the Rev. Daniel Appleyard

This five part series will include presentations, short videos reflections and ample time for discussion.

The resources include videos from the Episcopal Church two-day event forum, State of Racism In America. Another "tool" will be a series of "shorts" called "Cracking the Codes – The System of Racial Inequity." We will use these, as well as passages from Scripture and the Book of Common Prayer to enhance our conversation and as we talk about the system of racial inequity in the United States.

#### 2. Saving the Cross: Reimagining the Atonement Led by The Rev. Dr. Warren Crews

Lenten and Holy Week in particular are difficult for many because of the traditional way that the doctrine of the atonement has been taught:

God sent Jesus into the world to absorb the punishment on the cross that all of us deserve for our sins against God. People ask: what father would do such a horrendous thing to his beloved son?!

Well, it turns out that is only one of four different approaches to explaining the atonement.

We will explore each of these four, critique their strengths and weaknesses, and give everyone a chance to figure out for themselves how to explain God's saving work in Jesus Christ.



# Emmanuel Women's Book Club - Monday, March 3



Join us when we will discuss "Mrs. Lincoln's Dressmaker" by Jennifer Chiaverini.

Here's a short review from *Booklist*:

Chiaverini's latest is based on the true story of Elizabeth Keckley, who bought freedom

from slavery for herself and her son and went on to become a well-known modiste in Washington. Keckley had a front-row seat to history: she dressed Washington's A-list, including Jefferson Davis' wife before they left DC, and, most intimately, Mary Todd Lincoln. Mrs. Lincoln is mercurial, scheming, extravagant, and troubled, but Elizabeth stands by her as she is lambasted in the press. Long stretches of battle history and descriptions of Lincoln's political rivals lag, while more time spent on Elizabeth's work with newly freed slaves in DC would have been welcome.

Still, Elizabeth Keckley is an admirable heroine—successful, self-made, and utterly sympathetic. Readers of the Elm Creek Quilt series who have enjoyed Chiaverini's narrative jaunts into Civil War and Underground Railroad history will be interested in Mrs. Lincoln's Dressmaker—and there is even a little

bit of quilting in the story. This is also a good choice for readers of Christian historical fiction, as both Elizabeth's and Mr. Lincoln's faiths are important elements in shaping their characters.

# A Story of Love

In December, I was at Emmanuel in a meeting with the other two kitchen witches (**Susie Feldmann** and **Mary Jane Kuhn**) and **Maureen Walsh**, presently Parish Family Life director.

I just happened to mention that I was to undergo a MOHS treatment to remove a basil cell carcinoma from my nose and the logistics were my main concern. The immediate, and almost simultaneous, response was, "Mike will take you." from Maureen and "I'll take you." from Mary Jane. I was so touched by their concern. And – even more – I knew it was sincere.

As I said, logistics were the problem. But we worked it out that **Mary Jane** could be on call from noon on – she was busy preparing for the chili supper in the morning – and she would fix **Rick's** schedule so that he could come along with her and drive our car home. And that's exactly what they did.

I was told to ice the area and remove the bandage in 24 hours. The next morning found me with eyes swollen almost shut and dried blood on the bandage, which **Judd** and I feared was stuck to the incision and that we do some damage when removing it. **Judd** called **Katherine Ziegler** and she responded immediately.

Now the **Kuhns** did not give us this help because they really had nothing else to do. And **Katherine** did not come over because she is our Parish Nurse. They came because we are all friends. We've worked together, prayed together, cried together and laughed together. We are all part of a wonderful family. That family is Emmanuel.

What a blessing!

"Rich in Love." Really, who can doubt how true that is of Emmanuel? One aspect of our loving stewardship may not be familiar to many of you, unless you are part of the team of providers or have received their

help: Martha's Meals. But for those who have been ill, had surgery, had a baby, or experienced other stressful life events, Martha's Meals have been a blessing. As a recent recipient told me: "Until now, I thought, 'oh, well, that's a nice thing to do for those people,' but now that I've had them myself, I know that they're wonderful!"

What she was talking about, and what others in the parish have experienced, is not just the help it is to have good food to eat that you don't have to prepare yourself (usually with leftovers as well)----although that is of course a good thing when you are ill---but also the joy of seeing a new face when you can't get out of the house, and perhaps of getting to know someone you haven't met or haven't talked to before. You know that you are part of the family of Emmanuel, and that your family is taking care of you.

And taking part in Martha's Meals is also a blessing for those who provide the food that is delivered, whether by cooking it themselves or purchasing it. It is a joy to see how pleased the recipients are, as well as to talk with them and get to know them, or get to know them better than before.

So both the givers and the receivers of Martha's Meals are blessed, leaving both "rich in love."

# SR HI PLANS RETREAT, VISIT TO LACLEDE

"We will be visiting some of the residents who are not as functional as they once were, either mentally or physically," said **JoAn MacBryde**, senior high leader, who has been instrumental in planning the visit. "I think it is a great event for everyone, the youth and those whom we visit."

Later that afternoon, the senior high youth will prepare a dinner for a volunteer group from Ohio Wesleyan University, who will be staying at Emmanuel while working at the St. Louis Crisis Nursery on their spring break. Said **Sarah Aiello**, one of the most active of the Emmanuel group, "I'm always enthusiastic about helping out, and it will be interesting serving people around the same age as me. I also hope I can learn from them what it is like to volunteer in college, since that is something I look forward to doing next year."
