Do you recall a time when you yearned to go home? Or when you yearned to see someone you love? There can be yearning for something that is possible, or for things that are impossible, at least in life as we know it.

Longing for another person, or time, or place is all related and might all be conjured up with the one word, "homesickness." We feel homesickness when we long for a connectedness, for the familiar and safe, for the thing that gives source and meaning to life.

Homecoming for the Heart

All of us are in one way or another seeking home. Of course, there are moments when we feel very much at home, and moments when we are so distracted, who would have time to notice? But when the comforts or distractions of life recede, when relationships are illusive, when times are anxious, we know the feeling of missing home. I think that is why many of us come to church. We know we are missing something. We are restless, we are longing for something we cannot even name, and we hope we just might find it here.

One of our Ash Wednesday readings says, "Yet even now, says the Lord, return to me with all your heart, ..." This is the message of Lent; not, 'be sad about Jesus' death', or 'be guilty about your shortcomings'; but rather, 'come home, return to the Lord with all your heart.

Whether we have strayed far like the prodigal son of the parables, or just let our hearts wander even as we dutifully go through the motions of faithfulness, God calls us back to fullness of life, back home to the place where we are perfectly connected to the one who is always there, never goes away, is never left behind. God is always calling us home, but Lent is the time the church sets aside to pay particular attention and to encourage one another to listen and heed. The scriptures remind us that our God is waiting for us with the kind of longing we know in our hearts, and is waiting for our return like the father of the prodigal son.

WH Auden says it poetically: "Seek Him in the Kingdom of Anxiety; You will come to a great city that has expected your return for years." *A city that has expected your return for years.* A friend said, "I am homesick for a place I have never been to." Whether this is for you, a return trip, or a first journey, God is calling, hoping, waiting for you.

Will this Lent be an opportunity for you to pause to reflect on your longing? A time to turn to God to meet that otherwise insatiable need for true connection? A time to surrender to God's love for you?

Beginning with Ash Wednesday services, you are invited to use this Lent as a time to join with fellow disciples and seekers here at Emmanuel, to let your heart whisper your need for God, and through worship, prayer, study, and community, let God whisper back to your heart.

## Tuesday Night Lenten Series from March 11 to April 8 at 6:00 p.m. In the Dining Room

Come for a potluck supper at 6:00 p.m. and then break into hour-long small groups for five weekly sessions. We'll conclude the evening with Compline (a brief prayer service) at 7:45 p.m. This is an opportunity to strengthen the ties of fellowship, while learning something new and contributing your own ideas and insights to the community.

## The Small Group Topics Are:

<u>1. Waging Racial Reconciliation</u> Led by the Rev. Daniel Appleyard

This five part series will include presentations, short videos reflections and ample time for discussion.

The resources include videos from the Episcopal Church two-day event forum, State of Racism In America. Another "tool" will be a series of "shorts" called "Cracking the Codes – The System of Racial Inequity." We will use these, as well as passages from Scripture and the Book of Common Prayer to enhance our conversation and as we talk about the system of racial inequity in the United States.

2. Saving the Cross: Reimagining the Atonement Led by The Rev. Dr. Warren Crews

Lenten and Holy Week in particular are difficult for many because of the traditional way that the doctrine of the atonement has been taught:

God sent Jesus into the world to absorb the punishment on the cross that all of us deserve for our sins against God. People ask: what father would do such a horrendous thing to his beloved son?!

Well, it turns out that is only one of four different approaches to explaining the atonement.

We will explore each of these four, critique their strengths and weaknesses, and give everyone a chance to figure out for themselves how to explain God's saving work in Jesus Christ.

# Parenting through Lent and Beyond

How do we parent our children given the demands of Post-modern life? Let's discuss the challenges and joys of parenting our children to grow into the Christian faith. Each week we offer an opportunity to kick back, relax and explore a topic of interest in the context of our faith and family life. These topics include:

- Healthy Families
- Managing to keep Sabbath time together
- Caring for spouses, partners and self
- Helping children understand Lent and Easter
- Creating family rituals to nurture the whole family



This letter was written by a young person in Juvenile Detention who was taking part in The Prayer Station Program that is part of the ministry of Episcopal City Mission and the chaplains we support. The Prayer Station Program is an interactive, contemplative way for the children to learn to pray by combining prayer with play. It consists of a rotation to different stations such as the Letter to God Station, the Blessing Station and the Family Station.

These kinds of 'Moments in Time' would not happen without the presence of the three chaplains, **The Rev. Dietra Wise Baker** at County and Lakeside, **Chaplain Jeff Fabbiano** also at County and City and **The Rev. Kevin Aldridge** at City. Episcopal City Mission (ECM), with a long history in this Diocese, would not exist without the continued support of the many, many individual donors, churches and the diocese.

Emmanuel will have an opportunity to hear about this wonderful organization during Lent when Dietra will preach and the new Executive Director, **Beth Goad**, will lead Adult Forum. # Gratitude

The first thing I do when upon reaching our pew on Sunday morning it to kneel for prayer and take a moment just for the peace of it.

The linens are perfectly pressed and are draped evenly on the altar and the Gospel Book is resting on the shiny stand and faces the congregation ready so the word can be delivered to the people. Then I focus on the reredos and the regal candles and beautiful flowers in front of it. And thank God for the beauty he has given us and for the parishioners who donated the flowers.

All of this beauty and behind-the-scene organization would not be possible without thinking of the people who make it possible. The Altar Guild who, in

addition to Sundays, often give up their Saturday mornings in order to set it all up. And this does not take into account, the funerals, the weddings, the extra services during Lent and Advent. After the service, the flowers are separated into individual bouquets and delivered to people who are too ill to come to church or perhaps to celebrate a special day or maybe as a "thank you" for going just a little step further. The people who deliver these bouquets are given an opportunity to spend a short time with the recipients to tell them, "Hope you're feeling better or happy birthday or anniversary, or maybe just, good job, we appreciate all you do."

A few weeks ago, Judd and I were scheduled to deliver flowers and I was lucky to also be honored as a recipient. I wasn't aware of this, of course, when I first knelt in the pew that morning but I did think to myself that the flowers were especially lovely – big red roses and the most beautiful exotic lilies which

> had not fully opened. The bouquet lasted for more than two weeks, which was a little past Valentines Day. Judd thought the timing was wonderful.

## Stewardship - Brown Bag

The Stewardship Committee was formed in 2012 with the idea that its task would be to increase the parish's awareness of how our financial and spiritual lives interact. All of you probably know that Emmanuel has been participating in a Brown Bag lunch program for several years now. It started as a once-a-month project by the Junior Choir. At that time, the Junior Choir consisted of middle school aged kids. Now the program has grown into a three-times-a-month project consisting of Noonday Brown Bag group, the Junior High Youth Group and the Men of Emmanuel.

Sometimes when a program runs on for several years, there is a tendency to wonder if it is still worthwhile. That's the way I felt when I received the following email:

## Hi, Marie:

My daughter is a new member of your congregation. I was reading the Emmanuel Episcopal newsletter at her home this weekend, and noticed your article on Gateway180's Brown Bag lunch program.

Each day, a constant stream of people come for their lunches, and I know people walk from quite a distance for this meal. People coming for the Brown Bag Lunches have shared that this is probably the only meal they will eat that day. 

# **Vestry Vibes**

One day, not so long ago, I came home from doing something Altar Guild related: decorating for one of the big holidays perhaps, or maybe simply setting up for our normal Sunday services. Whatever, I was telling my son something funny someone had said and he stopped me and said, "You love that church, don't you?" And though I had never stopped to think about it before, I realized he was right. I DO love this church. When did that happen?

I well remember our early days here. My husband and kids quickly inserted themselves into the life of the church. Me, not so much. I am not good at small talk and I have a poor memory for names. For a long time, I would hang awkwardly on the fringes of the crowd after church while the rest of my family mingled, acting as if they had always belonged here. It was excruciating. One day, a couple years after we'd officially joined the church, I was invited to join the Altar Guild. And, after some initial resistance, I finally found "my spot". That sense of finally belonging, first to a small group and gradually to the church as a whole, somewhere along the line morphed into a surprising love for these people and this place.

The Vestry met for our annual retreat this past weekend and we talked a lot about hospitality: what first brought us to Emmanuel, what made us stay. Every story was unique with the exception of one constant: at some point, each of us had been extended a hand in greeting, pulled into a group, provided a pathway to belong. As a group, we in the Vestry are challenging ourselves to help people who want to find their perfect spot in this place and encourage others to help them too. Not an easy thing for me – I'm still lousy at small talk – but I figure I can recognize a kindred spirit when I see it.

And the next time I see someone standing on the fringes, maybe a new person or maybe someone who has been here all along, I'm going to march right up and extend my hand.


