Our Presiding Bishop's Easter Message 2014

The tomb is empty, and nobody knows where the body is. Mary Magdalene tells the others about the mysterious disappearance, but they give up and go home. Mary stays behind, weeping, and then fails to recognize the risen one before her. As the days pass, each resurrected encounter begins in surprise or anonymity – the disciples fishing all night without catching, Jesus cooking breakfast on the beach, the two on their way to Emmaus. Nobody recognizes him at first sight.

Clearly the risen body is not identical to the Jesus who was crucified. People mistake him for a stranger. He enters locked rooms. He walks along the path to Emmaus for a long time without being recognized. Crucifixion, death, and resurrection result in a transformed body – with evident scars, but changed nonetheless. When he reminds others of God's banquet, meant for the whole world – when human beings are fed and watered, delivered from prison, gathered from exile across the earth, and healed and reconciled into a community of peace – his companions discover that he has once again been in their midst.

What does that resurrection reality mean for the Body of Christ of which we are part? How does the risen Body of Christ – what we often call the church – differ from the crucified one? That Body seems to be most lively when it lives closer to the reality of Good Friday and the Easter mystery. In the West, that Body has suffered a lot of dying in recent decades. It is diminished, some would say battered, increasingly punctured by apathy and taunted by cultured despisers. That body bears little resemblance to royal images of recent memory – though, like Jesus, it is being mocked. The body remembers and

grieves, like the body of Israel crying in the desert, “why did you bring us out here to die?” or the crucified body who cries, “My God, why have you forsaken me,” or “why have you abandoned us?” In other contexts the Body of Christ is quite literally dying and spilling its lifeblood – in Pakistan and Sudan, in Iraq and Egypt – and in those ancient words of Tertullian, the blood of martyrs is becoming the seed of the church.

The Body of Christ is rising today where it is growing less self-centered and inwardly focused, and living with its heart turned toward the cosmic and eternal, its attention focused intently on loving God and neighbor. This Body is rising to stand in solidarity with criminals sentenced to death, with widows and orphans, with the people of the land who slave over furrows and lettuce fields to feed the world. This Body can be found passing through walls and boundaries that have long been misused to keep the righteous “safe” and “pure.” The Body is recognized when the hungry are fed – on the lakeshore with broiled fish, on the road to Emmaus, on street corners and city parks, in food pantries and open kitchens, in feeding neighbor nations and former enemies, and as the Body gathers once again to remember its identity and origin – Christ is risen for the sake of all creation.

Where and how will we look for the Body of Christ, risen and rising? Will we share the life of that body as an Easter people, transformed by resurrection and sent to transform the world in turn?

Christ is risen, Alleluia! Alleluia, Christ is risen indeed!

SENIOR HIGH CAR WASH May 4

“The parish is enormously supportive of all we do,” said Youth Director **Kevin Williams**. “We couldn’t do mission trips without their support, spiritual and financial, for all our activities. One of those things is the spring car wash. We are having a really successful year, and that is a reflection of the hard work of the youth as well as the dedication of the parish to so many things inside and outside the Emmanuel community.”

The youth—and their leaders—will begin washing cars before the 8 o’clock service **May 4**, and will continue throughout the morning. “I’ve seen more than a few cars whose owners have obviously been waiting for this event—no names,” noted Youth Leader **Ian MacBryde**. “I think it’s very gracious of those parishioners to give us the opportunity.”

Proceeds from the car wash will help to finance the group’s summer mission trip to the Lakota Sioux Rosebud Reservation in South Dakota. The youth will design and staff a day camp for some of the children on the reservation which includes the two poorest counties in the United States, according to government statistics.

“The demographics in that area are appalling,” said leader **Jennifer Smerek**. For instance, life expectancy for males is 48. And unemployment there for people not employed by the federal government is 87%.”

This is the same area to which the annual adult mission trip has been going for many years.

In addition, the JCRC will recognize the 25 years of service of JCRC executive director, Batya Abramson-Goldstein.

God's Mission and Our Stewardship of the Whole Creation

OK—admittedly it's not a new question—What are we here for? What is the church's purpose? What is God calling God's church to be and do?

Though I've read a number of books about "mission" and "purpose," for me one of most insightful and helpful is "The Mission of God's People" by Christopher J.H. Wright.

Wright suggests the church has mistakenly done its theological reflection by beginning with Genesis 3 and ending with Revelation 20. Stripped from scripture's beginning in Genesis, chapters 1 & 2, with God creating the heavens and earth, and ignoring Revelation's ending with God "making all things new," the reductionist result is a distorted sense of mission with a singular focus on our individual sin problem along with a solution of a swipe card for heaven's door. This distortion leads us to imagine that God's only concern and therefore ours, is to save people from sin and judgment. Indeed this is at the heart of our mission, but it's not the whole story of the Bible, and it should not be the whole story of our mission (p.48).

Wright reminds us that our first mission was to care for creation—to "tend the garden" (Gen 2:15). God delegated to us God's own kingly authority over God's whole creation—an authority characterized by wisdom, power, goodness, grace, compassion, faithfulness, generosity, provision, protection, justice and love (Ps 145). This is also at the heart of our understanding of biblical stewardship. Our stewardship flows from God's mission.

The Psalms speaks intimately of creation: "Let the floods clap their hands; let the hills sing together for joy" (Ps 98). Even the writer of Jonah surprises us as God addresses Jonah—"Should I not be concerned about Nineveh...more than 120,000 persons...and also many animals?" (4:11).

Apparently God's love, compassion, and redemptive activity are not limited to human beings. The Apostle Paul shares this same awesome comprehensive scope of God's redemptive activity in Christ as he writes,

"In Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us" (2 Cor. 5:19).

The writer of Colossians continues this theme, "For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross" (Col. 1:19).

Concluding in Revelation 21 we see a vision of "a new heaven and a new earth, a holy city coming down out of heaven from God, with the promise that the home of God is among mortals, and God will dwell with them as their God."

Reading the whole biblical story begs the question—What if God's redemptive love in Christ for all of creation were the foundation and scope of any understanding of the church's mission? For example, Wright asks, "Is ecological concern & action a biblically legitimate mission concern, or merely a contemporary obsession driven by the world's agenda?" (p 27). Imagine how an awareness of God's cosmic redemption in Christ might inform our role as stewards. The people in our congregations who continually remind us that stewardship is about more than money are certainly right...and, we might add stewardship is about more than Time and Talent, too.

Though not new, the question of mission is crucial. Whose mission are we on? Whose agenda are we pursuing? What if the church had no mission of its own other than to respond to God's call to participate in God's mission in Christ to heal, bless, and make new God's whole creation?

Wright's insights may transform our notion of congregational mission. I invite you to begin thinking about the potential implications for the stewardship ministry in your congregation.

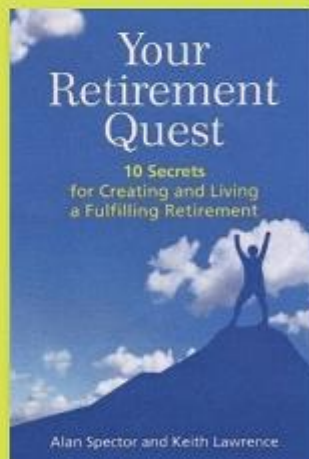
