Dear Friends,

I remember listening to a National Public Radio interview, sometime ago, where Archbishop Desmond Tutu claimed that God transforms human beings for a special purpose. That purpose is founded in God's "dream" of a transfigured world. To put it another way: God has made, and is making, us part of the Easter mystery that is Jesus' resurrection. Just as Jesus was made a new creation in the resurrection, so we too are being made new. And the world in which we live is changed by the very fact that we are being transformed.

Skeptics telephoned NPR to challenge Tutu. He might be a good man, but surely he was a dreamer. How can those who suffered under apartheid really forgive their former oppressors? How long will it take before they can forgive - if ever? "They have forgiven," Tutu answered, laughing. Yes, he laughed, as if he could not understand the callers' naiveté, their unwillingness to trust in the power of God's forgiveness working through human beings.

How many of us would challenge Archbishop Tutu in the same way as those callers did? When will peace come to Syria or South Sudan? When will Palestinians be able to forgive Israel's Jewish community and vice versa? When will people of color in this country be able to forgive whites? When will children be able to forgive their parents? When will former friends be able to forgive one another? When will we be able to forgive ourselves for our actions, for things done and left undone?

Easter comes to remind us that we are a new people. Like Lazarus, healed and brought to life by Jesus (John 11:17-44), we are called forth from the tomb, from all of the places in our lives that speak of sin and suffering and death. We are called forth into the light of day to stand before God and one another. As the cloths that bound Lazarus in death were removed after his healing, so all that binds us is released so that as a people we are set free to be Christ's hands and arms in this world. We are transformed, made new.

This season may you experience the power of God's gift of hope and new life - of resurrection. May we all raise our voices loud and clear to respond to that gift: "Alleluia! Alleluia!"

# **Vestry Vibes**

Since joining Vestry at the beginning of the year, I have been energized by the level of conversations around hospitality, inclusivity, belonging, and community. I care deeply about our parish for many reasons...high among those is the sense of belonging and community my family and I have experienced at Emmanuel for the past twelve years. Our Vestry conversations, and my reflections on my own journey at Emmanuel, have made me stop and think with intentionality about the role of hospitality. When have we felt lonely and disconnected, and someone has helped us reconnect? When have we felt as if we didn't belong...and then someone showed us that we did? When have we discovered -- or re-discovered -gifts that we have to offer others because someone invited us to do so? When have we experienced God's unconditional love through another's actions? Isn't this what Jesus models for us time and again?

I had the privilege of taking our FaithQuest children on their mini-mission trip recently. We visited Gateway 180, bringing lunch and toys for the moms and children who lived there. We encouraged the Emmanuel children to get to know the other children...to spend time playing...to learn names...in essence, to connect, be inclusive, and share a sense of hospitality. On the way home, I had five children in my minivan. Each of the children knew the name of another child with whom they had connected, and had positive stories to share. They had taken us up on our challenge to connect and be hospitable -- and it had a great impact on them.

I love our parish, our commitment to mission, our sense of faith...imagine how much deeper that becomes as we continue to deepen our hospitality, our sense of belong, and our sense of community.




# **Fellowship Dinners Continue**

The "special" Junior High lunch/brunch on May 4 proved to be quite a surprise to the young people. They were asked to first meet in another room. There they discussed the plight of hungry people in the second- and third-world countries.

When they went to their classroom they found quite an array of good food but also found that, by the luck of the draw, many of them were unable to afford to purchase it with the play money they had been given. As statistics prove, the small percentage of wealthy were able to afford anything they wanted while the third-world people had to start figuring out how to obtain food.

We pointed out that this situation exists even in the first-world where we live and, indeed, even for the people living in the prestigious zip code of 63119. When asked how their neighbors coped, some mentioned the Emmanuel Food Center and Webster Rock Hill Ministries; they approached the wealthy one percent, who happened to be very generous and gave them all their money.

This exercise is a great precursor to their upcoming mission trip where they will see first-hand the people struggling to get food. On May 11, seven children reaching the age of 13 during the program year were welcomed and acknowledged during the Rite 13 Ceremony at the 9:00 service. At this time, we celebrated their transition from childhood to manhood and womanhood.

After the service, the class once set aside childish ways to prepare brown-bag lunches for the homeless shelter.




# **Emmanuel Book Club - June 2**

years old to study at USC. After returning home ten years later, she founded the first Iranian school of social work, spending the next 20 years fighting poverty and disease. Despite her years devoted to serving the poor, she was threatened with execution as a "counter-revolutionary" when Ayatollah Khomeini took over. This remarkable autobiography provides dramatic insight into 20th Century Iran.

We hope the new schedule will make it possible for you to join us for this exciting exploration of the New Testament. "The first document in this chronological New Testament is Paul's letter to a Christ-community in Thessalonica, the capital city of Macedonia, a province in northern Greece. It was written around the year 50 C.E., possibly a year or two earlier. Somewhat surprisingly, given the movement's origin among Jews in the Jewish homeland, the earliest Christian document is written to a community in Europe, which is largely Gentile."

The Church of the Good Shepherd: Provides equipment for a technology enabled meeting space for up to 235 people which assists the parish with evangelism and outreach. It will allow sessions with their companion diocese of Lui and missioners on trips to Sudan and Nicaragua.

Outside our Diocese, UTO money has gone to build a weather-proof school in Haiti, a mobile shower facility for the homeless in San Diego and a reservoir to save water during the rainy season in Tanzania.

# Ida H. Early (Volunteer Leadership)



Ida Early wears many hats. Secretary to Washington University's board of trustees and its 12 committees, she also worked at Olin School of Business. She coordinates university commencement ceremonies and the 600-member volunteer Women's Society of Washington University.

She was the first African-American elected president of the Junior League of St. Louis in 1996. This led to her role in 2004 to help complete the Pierce Report, a regional assessment intended to elevate the city. "I interviewed heads of businesses and took field trips throughout the region to identify our resources," she explains.

Junior League led her to volunteer with Epworth Children & Family Services, Care and Counseling, Childhaven, Dance St. Louis, Fair St. Louis, Girls Inc., Forest Park Forever, St. Louis Symphony and the Regional Arts Commission.


