“Hocus Pocus”



Lions, tigers, and bears. Oh my! Often we walk through life with the same sense of fear that Dorothy and her companions did in the Wizard of Oz. As if all around us were threats and creatures that sought to destroy us on our journey. Ebola, ISIS, and civil unrest. Oh my! While our fears are legitimate and a natural part of our daily lives, the capacity they have to overpower us often comes down to our decision to see darkness instead of light. My prayer today is that the words of the Gospel will encourage you as you journey through your fear into a new place of liberation.

“The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.”—John 1:5

If you would please, take out a pen or pencil. In the margin of this newsletter, write down something that scares you, something of which you are truly afraid. Then ask yourself, “Why am I afraid of this? Why does this have power over me?” Nine times out of ten, the things that we fear most are those things of which we know very little. Very rarely will an entomologist write down spiders or a race car driver write down speed. This is largely because fear is a product of the unknown, the unstudied, the unexperienced. We fear that which we do not know.

Even one of the most common phrases that is associated with fear, and magic, and witches actually comes from something beautiful. Many of you know the phrase “Hocus Pocus.” But did you know that this phrase is actually a misunderstood pronunciation of our Eucharistic Prayer? Allow me to explain. Hundreds of years ago, when the mass was said exclusively in Latin, the priest would say, “Hoc est corpus meum” meaning “This is my body.” The wonder and unexplainable nature of transubstantiation (turning the bread and wine into the literal body and blood of Christ) led many to associate this prayer with magic. After all, something magical and transcendent was happening in that moment, something they did not fully understand. Years later, we have come to associate this phrase with witches and dark magic as misunderstanding gave way to the fear of the unknown. But

now, we who know the true meaning of this phrase know that its true meaning and intention is an act of love, not something to be feared, but something to be exalted.

As Halloween approaches, I encourage you all to embrace something that scares you. Learn about it. Know its positive counter-part. And seek to replace fear with courage.

For an example of how to do this, look to the saints who faced the unknown with a fervor for life and for the Gospel, who stood against danger and misunderstanding and said, light is greater than darkness.

Stewardship 2014

The church has been described as a place where we gather to hear the stories of God and of his relationship with all creation, especially his people. We hear how He longs for deeper relationship with us and how, when we turn away, He reaches out to us - again and again. We hear that, above all else, He desires full reconciliation with us. He desires this so much that He sent his Son, Jesus, to become one of us.

Through Jesus, we hear new stories, learning even more clearly who God is and how we are called to live. Through Jesus, we are given a new commandment “just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another.”

Sharing God’s love for others, as we’ve experienced God’s love for ourselves, means freely sharing the gifts we’ve been given - our time, talents and treasures; it means opening our hearts and seeing ‘the others’ as brothers and sisters; it means breaking down artificial barriers that prevent closeness and reaching out to the marginalized, the poor and the lonely; it means bringing light to those living in darkness; it means serving others as the Hands and Feet of Christ.

Here at Emmanuel, we strive to be faithful to those stories, to be BOLD IN MISSION - as we reach out, again and again, to those who are less fortunate. In doing so, we add our own stories - sometimes joyful, sometimes painful, always powerful - stories about being lost, then found; cast out, then gathered in; broken, but never beyond the saving grace of a loving God.

As we look around our city, our nation and our world, we see, beyond any doubt, that there is still much work to be done.

It feels overwhelming; it feels impossible to believe that the people God would chose to use are us, all of us perfectly imperfect. But He has.

We know the church’s full story hasn’t been written. There are gifts that can only be given by us; each one of us, offerings no one else could make, using our special gifts which no one else has.

There are still voices that need to be heard, others who long to be loved and brought into the conversation; others to be incorporated into the whole, claiming their rightful place at the table.

Gods story is not done and we each play our own part in the telling.

As Christians, we are called to become the stories we hear and tell; that is our Mission.

Adult Forum Session Title: **Gabriel Fauré’s Requiem:** **“A very human feeling of faith in eternal rest”**

During the All Saints’ Day 9 a.m. service (November 2, observed), Dr. Trent Patterson will lead the Emmanuel Choir in several movements of the *Requiem* by Gabriel Fauré. Fauré described his composition: "Everything I managed to entertain by way of religious illusion I put into my Requiem, which moreover is dominated from beginning to end by a very human feeling of faith in eternal rest." He told an interviewer, "It has been said that my Requiem does not express the fear of death and someone has called it a [lullaby](#) of death. But it is thus that I see death: as a happy deliverance, an aspiration towards happiness above..." During Adult Forum, **Jen Dunn** will sing the “Pie Jesu” and Trent will present additional information on the *Requiem* to enhance our understanding of this beautiful music on a day when the Communion of Saints is so intensely felt.

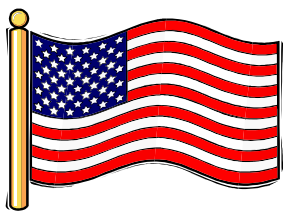

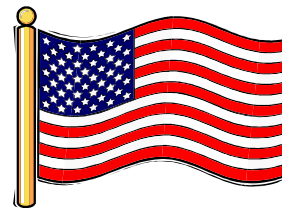

Christmas Play News!

It's that time of year again! The annual parish Christmas Play is less than 2 months away. The three Emmanuel choirs will provide the foundation of the music in the play, but ALL are welcome to participate. In addition to singing, there are speaking parts for adults and children.

The play will be performed during the **10 am service on December 14** and there will be a full rehearsal on **Saturday, December 13, from 10 am – Noon**. If you are not currently a member of one of the choirs, please see the rehearsal times below:



Adults (Grade 7 and older) – If you read or learn music quickly, you may attend only the Saturday morning rehearsal. You are also welcome to attend the Emmanuel Choir rehearsals on Wednesdays, December 3 and 10, 7:30-9:00 pm; the music for the play will be rehearsed at the end.

Grade School aged children (2nd grade – 6th grade) – Join the Junior Choir rehearsals on Wednesdays, December 3 and 10, 6:30 – 7:15 pm, and attend the Saturday morning rehearsal.

“Cherub” aged children (age 4 – 1st grade) – Join the Cherub Choir rehearsals on Wednesdays, December 3 and 10, 6:00-6:25 pm and attend the Saturday morning rehearsal **from 11:15 am – Noon only**.

Junior Choir and Cherub Choir aged children who can't attend on Wednesdays are welcome to be in the play, but are not likely to learn enough of the music on Saturday morning to fully participate. They are welcome to be there on Sunday morning, stand with the chorus and participate as they are able.

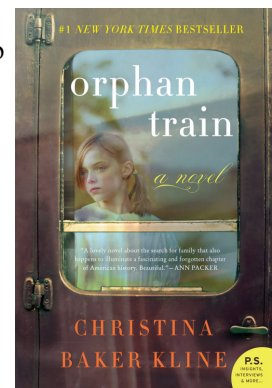
Emmanuel Book Club - December 1 at 7:00 p.m.

In order to avoid Thanksgiving weekend complications, our next meeting is on **December 1**, when we will discuss Christina Baker Kline's fascinating novel, *Orphan Train*. The Orphan Train Movement was a supervised welfare program that transported orphaned and homeless children from several crowded East-coast cities to foster homes throughout the rural Midwest. New York's Children's Aid Society began the program that operated from 1853 to 1929, and it was later joined by the New York Foundling Hospital. Before the advent of state-run foster care, these two institutions developed a comprehensive plan to relocate some 250,000 children, who were carried to their new homes on "orphan trains" or "baby trains." There have been a number of non-fiction books written about these children, but this novel presents a totally different twist to the saga of one fictitious child.

Here is some of what "GoodReads" says about it: **The author of *Bird in Hand* and *The Way Life Should Be* delivers her most ambitious and powerful novel to date: a captivating story of two very different women who build an unexpected**

friendship: a 91-year-old woman with a hidden past as an orphan-train rider and the teenage girl whose own troubled adolescence leads her to seek answers to questions no one has ever thought to ask....Rich in detail and epic in scope, *Orphan Train* is a powerful novel of upheaval and resilience, of second chances, of unexpected friendship, and of the secrets we carry that keep us from finding out who we are.
