The Rector's Message

Dear Friends,

One of the themes of Epiphany, is to share the light and hope of God with all of humanity. In one of the readings that appears on Sundays, Isaiah 49, there is a repetition of Isaiah's sense that the Lord called him even before he was born to share hope and light with <u>all people</u>. In the womb God named him and formed him to be God's servant. God's calling is so intrinsic to



Isaiah's being that people can't really dispute when God says through the prophet, "I'm not only for the 'insiders" (the tribes of Jacob and the survivors of Israel). The Lord says instead, "I will give you as a light to the nations that my salvation may reach to the end of the earth." In other words, you are not only for your own but for the whole earth. This vision is of the Peaceable Kingdom. Isaiah points to the eschatological state, the fulfillment of God's vision for humanity - is a vision of a world made whole and freed from its self-centeredness.

A while back, I came across a rather grim poem that punctuates humanity's selfishness, prejudice, and our failing to work with others for the common good. Written by the poet James Patrick Kinney in the 1960's "The Cold Within" was submitted to various publications, including the Saturday Evening Post, and was rejected for being too harsh and divisive, and yes, controversial. And, it is controversial! It is also said that Kinney based his poem on Rudyard Kipling's poem, "If." When it was finally shared at an ecumenical gathering, the religious leaders in attendance requested copies of it. Before long, "The Cold Within" was shared by congregations around the country.

Six humans trapped by happenstance In bleak and bitter cold. Each one possessed a stick of wood Or so the story's told.

Their dying fire in need of logs The first mn held his back For of the faces round the fire He noticed one was black.

The next man looking 'cross the way Saw one not of his church And couldn't bring himself to give The fire his stick of birch.

The third one sat in tattered clothes. He gave his coat a hitch. Why should his log be put to use To warm the idle rich?

The rich man just sat back and thought Of the wealth he had in store And how to keep what he had earned From the lazy shiftless poor.

The black man's face bespoke revenge As the fire passed from his sight. For all he saw in his stick of wood Was a chance to spite the white. The last man of this forlorn group Did nought except for gain. Giving only to those who gave Was how he played the game.

Their logs held tight in death's still hands Was proof of human sin.
They didn't die from the cold without They died from the cold within.

Isaiah has a challenging word for any person, congregation or community that might be focusing exclusively on its own survival, its own "warmth." It is easy to fall into that pattern when we are scattered, when we are suffering, when we are threatened from without or fall into survival mode huddled around our fires. As the prophet also relates in another of his prophesies, God says, "It is too light a thing that you should be my servant to raise up the tribes of Jacob and to restore the survivors of Israel; I will give you as a light to the nations, that my salvation may reach to the end of the earth." In other words, we are chosen and precious to God - but not just for our own sake. Too often, our thinking is too small if our vision is just to take care of our own. No, God calls the people of God to reflect God's light out into our neighborhoods, our communities, and then out beyond even our country's borders. God is not content until all people have had the opportunity to

experience a new way of seeing, of being and made whole and warm.

Epiphany is a season of mission to reach out to all and to strengthen the bonds that tie us together as a human family. As our Fall Campaign recalled to us, at Emmanuel we are called to be Bold in Mission. As we go forth from our Annual Meeting, Isaiah reminds us is to serve the world, to reach out and be shaped by those we encounter to create a Peaceable Kingdom.

In the past, she has served as Convention Alternate and Delegate, as Senior Warden, and as chair of the Standing Committee of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri. She was a member of the search committee that called the Right Rev. George Wayne Smith as Bishop. She traveled with the Bishop to our companion diocese of Lui in South Sudan in 2006.

Ida has served in several roles since 1982 at Washington University. She is now Secretary to the Board of Trustees. She has been an active community volunteer and was recognized for her leadership by the 2014 Women of Achievement award. She and her

On January11 Mitch brought into Rite 13, large pieces of posterboard. He then set out boxes of pastels, crayons, markers, and other craftsy items and charged the kids with the chore of decorating them in such a way as to indicate who they were. Working together to get an outline of their head and shoulders on the paper, they proceeded to decorate with

pictures, shapes or words that would say, "This is who I am and what I believe in and what I like to do." The finished products ranged from very simple with maybe just a couple of stick figures or a couple of words, to elaborate cutouts and pictures of music notes, piano keys, flowers, crosses, baseballs and more. One was decorated with only vivid streaks of color.

Mitch closed the session with a prayer that went something like this: "Thank you for giving us this time together. We know you made us in your image and gave us gifts for living and for sharing. We also know that you love us in good times and times that are not so good and that you will take care of us always."


Emmanuel Book Club - January 26 at 7:00 p.m.
