Last night I watched my husband say vows to the Church as he was ordained to the Sacred Order of Priests in Christ’s holy catholic Church. Listening to Chris make those promises brought me, and every priest in that room I’m sure, right back to the moment when they stood in front of their bishop and promised those promises and prayed those prayers.



It was heavy and beautiful. Sometimes the business of everyday ministry distracts us priests from our true calling, which is... To proclaim by word and deed the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and to fashion our lives in accordance with its precepts. We are to love and serve the people among whom we work, caring alike for young and old, strong and weak, rich and poor. We are to preach, to declare God's forgiveness to penitent sinners, to pronounce God's blessing, to share in the administration of Holy Baptism and in the celebration of the mysteries of Christ's Body and Blood, and to perform the other ministrations entrusted to us. In all that we do, we are to nourish Christ's people from the riches of his grace, and strengthen them to glorify God in this life and in the life to come. We are to equip the saints (that’s you) for the work of ministry and for the building up of the body of Christ.

Like I said, heavy and beautiful. Heavy, because that is my “job description.” Beautiful, because that is my life. Last night as I watched my husband say vows to another, I was reminded of the true joy that is the priesthood. I was able to lay aside that everyday business, and rest in the joy that is my order. Now, not all of it is happy, but most all of it is joyful. I get to be with people in the best and worst times of their lives. I get to enter into that thin space between heaven and earth as people draw near to God. And I get to

Remember, joy is not the same thing as happiness. Happiness is fleeting, and often depends on things outside of ourselves, but joy is eternal because it is based on our relationship with Jesus Christ.

If that's too easy of a question for you to answer, try asking yourself, "Is what I am doing with my life bringing joy to others?"

It's not just priests who are called to be joyful. It is all of us. We are all called to self-sacrifice and spiritual connectedness, to inward peace, and a deep and personal relationship with God. We are all called to joy, and God knows the world could use a little more of that. So let it begin with us. Let joy and peace pervade our hearts, our thoughts, and our speech as we journey through Lent and through life.

## The Ministry of Emmanuel to the Homeless of St. Louis

For six years Emmanuel has had a ministry to the homeless of St. Louis by cooking meals to feed the homeless on bitter winter nights, and collecting blankets, jackets, shoes, socks, gloves, eating utensils, and plates. We also donated a coffee maker. The mission of City Streets is multi-dimensional, and we are grateful for the strong support of Emmanuel, the cook-in volunteers, and all those who have helped in many ways.

This year we are responding to a different need. Our partner in this process, Americorps, has teamed up with Winter Outreach and others to set up an all-winter shelter. The intent was to give 28 people a place where they can live all winter. In addition to meeting the housing needs of the homeless for three months, Winter Outreach assists the homeless in making personal applications for disability or helping them find a job so that they can get off the streets. They have been successful, and several previously homeless people are now employed or are in line to have assistance.

Building on this success, Winter Outreach decided to continue to lease the convent building in Walnut Park neighborhood beginning March 1, and to allow about half of the men to remain as a self-sustaining community. About three-quarters of the people selected to stay are able to pay rent and utilities of \$250.00 a month through Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and other means.

But there are two special guys who do not have the means to pay this monthly rate and are running out of time to be housed by Assisi House, the name of this facility for the homeless.

Michael is extremely bright and affable with no criminal background or addictions. He is a delight to have in the community, and always ready to pitch in. An accident on his previous job and domestic turmoil put him out on the streets for over a year - not so chronically homeless at this point. He has food stamps and has filled his days with numerous volunteer efforts. He has been living in a tent prior to his coming to Assisi House. He suffers situational

depression, but keeps putting one foot in front of the other. He has been offered one of the 13 rooms at Assisi because he has the capacity to get off the street with a little more time and assistance.

Jerry is an older, African American, very small in stature. He also is a great contributor to the community living. He had planned to live with his niece temporarily, but now she has lost her apartment and says that wherever she goes, she cannot take him. He is without a housing plan. Jerry is very employable with no criminal history. So hopes are high that he will find work soon, and continue to live at Assisi House.

Assisi House is working to help the homeless, particularly those who show signs that they are also willing to help themselves, but need some external assistance. The cost of housing at Assisi is \$250 per month for four months. A specific request has been made from Winter Outreach and Americorps to Emmanuel City Streets to financially help these two individuals. From the money that City Streets has already raised this year and last, it has been decided to allocate \$1,000 from City Streets, \$500 from the Rector's Discretionary Fund, and another \$500 raised from parishioners at Emmanuel. If you would like to help in this effort to help others like Michael and Jerry, make your donation to Rector's Discretionary Fund and earmark it for Assisi House. If by check, put "Assisi House" on the memo line.

Emmanuel has helped so many in so many ways, and prayers of thankfulness should be offered for its love and compassion to others. We are happy to see that this passion for others will now include Michael and Jerry.

## Very Important Measles Vaccination Information

By now, you have probably heard that we are experiencing a record number of measles cases in the United States this year. This is particularly tragic since measles was declared eliminated from the U.S. in the year 2000 thanks to the highly effective MMR vaccine. Unfortunately, since that time, an increasing number of parents have chosen to forego this vaccine and others for their kids, leaving pockets of unvaccinated communities in our country and providing a foothold for disease when an infected traveler from another country arrives.

Measles isn’t just a little rash. It can be very dangerous, especially for babies and young children. Symptoms include high fever, cough, runny nose, red watery eyes, and rash (which appears 3-5 days after the other symptoms). Approximately 1 out of 4 people who get measles will be hospitalized, 1 out of every 1,000 will develop encephalitis (serious brain inflammation and swelling, which may lead to brain damage), and 1-2 out of 1,000 people who contract measles will die (even with the best modern medical care).

While there have been no reported cases in Missouri as of the writing of this article, over 150 cases have already been reported in the U.S. in 2015, some as close as Chicago. As we come together as a community of all ages at Emmanuel for worship and social events, let’s do our best to make sure everyone in our community is safe from this potential threat (most importantly infants under one year who cannot receive the MMR vaccine and are at highest risk if exposed). Parents, talk to your pediatrician or family doctor and make sure your kids have had all their recommended vaccinations (for measles, this means a dose of MMR at age 12-15 months and a booster dose at age 4-6). Those born before 1957 who aren’t sure of their immunity to measles should discuss with their doctor and consider receiving at least one dose of the vaccine. Following this important recommendation is just another way we at Emmanuel can ensure we are being “Rich in Love.”

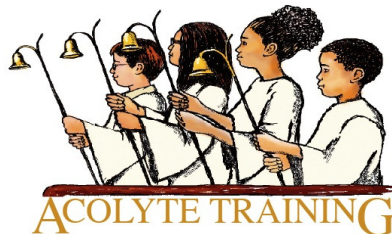
