As the flowers begin to bloom, and the birds begin to sing, and the charcoal grills put forth smoke signals that say, "Spring is here," I find myself asking the very same question that a middle-eastern lawyer asked Jesus over 2,000 years ago...

"Who is my neighbor?"

My husband Chris and I are fairly new to our very old neighborhood in the city of



St. Louis. And recently, I have noticed that we do not spend as much time with our neighbors as we would like. Since moving into our little home in July, we have managed to make friendly connections with only five households on our street. We all wave hello and exchange pleasantries in the driveway, and are just generally kind to one another. But pleasantries aside, I now realize, I don't really *know* any of my neighbors. I don't know where they grew up, or what their favorite foods are. I don't know their children's names or what they do for work. I might be willing to ask a few of them for a cup of sugar, but with Schnucks just down the street, I'm given an easy out. And now, as I sit on my front steps, or walk Teil in his stroller down the street, I wonder to myself, "who is my neighbor?"

I imagine some of you may be in the same boat. Even if you have lived in the same house for fifty years, some of your neighbors have probably changed. If you are lucky, you have made life-long friendships with even just a few of those who live around you.

But if you are like me, and you find that you don't really know your neighbors, I encourage you to join me, as the weather begins to warm, and the sun begins to set later in the day, in getting to know your neighbors. We can connect one by one, by reaching out, by way of a kind gesture or friendly words of care. Maybe you have eggs to share or fresh cut flowers that could adorn their kitchen table. Maybe you could walk your kids to school together or have a cup of coffee on the deck on a lazy Saturday morning. Whatever the venue, spend time with them, get to really know them, so that pleasantries become friendships and small-talk becomes worthwhile conversation.


After all, we can't love our neighbors if we don't even know who they are.

Let's start with the neighbors with whom we share a fence. With our neighbors who's dog barks when we go out to get the mail. Let's start with those who are very near, so that later, together, we can go beyond our street to love our neighbors far away. God's dream of unity is found in the vision of togetherness, a heavenly city where all are known and loved. May your neighborhoods be a small reflection of that heavenly city today and always.





For 21 years the Ministries has offered a camp experience to children ages 5-12 that provides meals, is within walking distance from home, that bridges the educational gap between academic years and provides experiences outside their community. 



Highlights from tonight's Vestry meeting:

If you read last month's Vestry Vibes, you may recall that at February's Vestry Retreat we agreed that one of our main objectives for the upcoming year is to look into ways to enhance communication within the Parish. A subcommittee has already met to begin the discussion. Their first meeting focused mainly on outgoing forms of communication, primarily the Angelus Newsletter and how both the online and paper versions might be improved to facilitate ease of reading. They are also considering methods to encourage input from you and how to ensure the right lay leader, clergy or staff member hears you.

Another concern that emerged at the Retreat was that of "Missing People" – you know, the lady who used to sit behind you at church but who has been absent of late. Nobody is taking attendance (thank

goodness!) but sometimes a person will "go missing" for an extended period of time. We are all guilty of noticing the empty space but perhaps not realizing that we need to take the additional step of checking on the welfare of our missing friend. To that end, another committee, independent of the Vestry, has been formed to develop the means to identify who those missing persons might be and how best to extend a hand to those who desire one.

A cleaning service, Sodexo, has been contracted to fulfill most sexton duties: Phillip is here full time, keeping our building sparkling during the week while our part time sexton, Audrey fills in on Sundays and some Saturdays as needed.
