Together in the Household of God

For some of us, this time between All Saints and Thanksgiving is difficult, as the culture begins to anticipate the joy and merriment of the holidays and we remember those whom we miss.

The Octave (week plus one day) of All Saints has been memorable for Emmanuel this year. Even as we were reading our necrology, or lighting candles in memory of our loved ones at our All Saints Eucharists on Sunday, more loved



ones were beginning their new chapter of life with God. Our ranks diminished as the Great Company of Heaven grew by two more of our beloved members, and the father of another. These losses remind us of other losses, new and longstanding. As I write this, we anticipate our Veterans Day Service in which we recall those who have served in the armed forces of our country, and particularly recall the names of those who gave their lives doing that.

The Baptismal candle stands strong at the font, at the front of the church, reminding us that the indwelling Christ is theirs from their baptism, and therefore, nothing can ever separate them from the love of God. Yet, we deeply feel the pain of our separation from them.

It is not only death that causes this kind of separation from loved ones. Sometimes, those sitting next to us in the pews are bearing the pain of seeing the ones they love slip away into disease or disability of body, mind, or spirit. Sometimes, as the holidays approach, we are just missing loved ones who live far away. As the days grow darker and the chill of autumn signals the holidays coming, how do we find a path of life in the face of our losses? There are myriad suggestions, and we will be printing some in weeks to come, but the first is this: together; together in the household of God.

At times of loss, we need God and one another more than ever. We need our faith community because it is one of the few places in the world that will allow us to be sad when we are sad, or even fearful when that is appropriate, but who will then scoop us up in a Thanksgiving Feast where we can experience the joy of hope in the midst of our grief.

God tells us and we recognize that our sadness or brokenness does not devalue who we are as children of God, or our roles as members of the Body of Christ. If a part of our body is sprained or broken, we take extra special care of it; we splint it, support it, nourish it for healing, and tenderly give it gentle exercise for strength. We do the same for one another. All are welcome here and welcome to be simultaneously, or in turn, broken and blessed.

In a paraphrase of Isaiah 55, "Ho, everyone who thirsts, come to the waters; and all who are empty, let them come to the Lord. Without money, without price, come and buy wine and milk."

Come and be blessed. If you are on top of the world, and everything in your life is exactly as you would wish, Come. If you are feeling down, alone, or unable to celebrate, Come. Whether it is our Emmanuel Thanksgiving Eucharist, the shared turkey dinner feast later in the day, or a regular Sunday Eucharist, Come. As you are. Grief shared is grief divided; joy shared is joy multiplied. Come, with your sadness, with your joy, and let us together be blessed by the love of God we share.



Science and Religion Adult Forum Series

Presenters are Warren Crews, Matt Keefer, Matt Schunke and Diana Beckman

November 16: Science and our Social and Religious Nature

In this second of three sessions we will first explore scientific evidence that suggests the ascendency of human beings on our planet is due to our inherently social nature and our talent for collective learning. We will then further consider our pro-social and altruistic tendencies and their relation to world religions and religious faith. Stay tuned for The Relation between Science and Religion – Personal Stories on Nov 30. These three sessions were developed by Matt Keefer, Matt Schunke, and Warren Crews.

November 23: Thanksgiving Myths and Truths

Professor Lorri Glover will reveal some of the unsettling truths behind the national myths we tell ourselves each Thanksgiving. In the place of peaceful "Pilgrims" and Indians sharing a common meal, you will learn about the failures of the radical Separatists who founded Plymouth Colony, the confusion and conflicts that divided newcomers and natives in seventeenth-century New England, and the most deadly war in early American history.

Lorri Glover is the John Francis Bannon, SJ, Endowed Chair in the Department of History at Saint Louis University, where she teaches courses in the American Revolution and colonial America. She

has written about early American history from the seventeenth century to the nineteenth. Her most recent book is Founders as Fathers: The Private Lives and Politics of the American Revolutionaries (Yale, 2014).

November 30: The Relation between Science and Religion – Personal Stories

In the third session we will explore our own thoughts on how we personally have experienced the intersection of science and religion, both positively and negatively. We will solicit the views of those attending, as well as those who have prepared this series.



Emmanuel Book Club - December 1 at 7:00 p.m.

In order to avoid Thanksgiving weekend complications, our next meeting is on December 1, when we will discuss Christina Baker Kline's fascinating novel, Orphan Train. The Orphan Train Movement was a supervised welfare program that transported orphaned and homeless children from several crowded East-coast cities to foster homes throughout the rural Midwest. New York's Children's Aid Society began the program that operated from 1853 to 1929, and it was later joined by the New York Foundling Hospital. Before the advent of staterun foster care, these two institutions developed a comprehensive plan to relocate some 250,000 children, who were carried to their new homes on "orphan trains" or "baby trains." There have been a number of non-fiction books written about these children, but this novel presents a totally different twist to the saga of one fictitious child.

Here is some of what "GoodReads" says about it: The author of Bird in Hand and The Way Life Should Be delivers her most ambitious and powerful novel to date: a captivating story of two very different women who build an unexpected

friendship: a 91-year-old woman with a hidden past as an orphan-train rider and the teenage girl whose own troubled adolescence leads her to seek answers to questions no one has ever thought to ask....Rich in detail and epic in scope, Orphan Train is a powerful novel of upheaval and resilience, of second chances, of unexpected friendship, and of the secrets we carry that keep us from finding out who we are.

The Emmanuel Foundation – What's in it for you?

As we approach another year-end we can consider giving thanks for our blessings and taking advantage of potential tax deductions! The Emmanuel Foundation affords you the opportunity to do both.

In 1972, we established The Emmanuel Foundation Endowment Fund to capture and make permanent the spirit of The Lockwood Legacy.

What is the purpose of the Endowment Fund?

The Endowment Fund provides the means for people to express special gratitude to God for blessings they have received. The principal is held permanently and only the earnings are used to fund Emmanuel's ministry. As a result, a gift to the Endowment Fund endures forever.

What is Endowment Fund Income Used For?

The Endowment's income is used, in conjunction with annual pledges, to fund the operation, ministry and outreach of Emmanuel.

Who Gives to the Endowment Fund?
