“Bold in Mission”

“I hope you had a nice lunch out somewhere,” a kind parishioner said to Melanie and me as we returned to the church about 1:15 pm last Tuesday.

Oh, we did! We had just come from a two-hour dialogue and lunch at Parker AME Church with a group of sixty church and community leaders from Webster Groves, Shrewsbury and Rock Hill.

“What are barriers to good race relations? What stereotyping exists in our communities? How does white privilege impact our communities? How do we build trust among the races?”

These questions are not the usual appetizer for a nice lunch out. But discussing them in an atmosphere of respect, honesty, and prayerful openness to God’s presence seemed to give us a fine appetite for a convivial lunch served by the women of the church and a hunger for a lot more conversation. I left with renewed conviction that it is an important mission for us all.

“Mission” may be the word of the decade among “mainline” churches like ours. In the last few years, I have spent many dull and frustrating hours listening to people say things about mission. The Missional Church Task Force for the Diocese of Newark, charged to define and explain “Missional Church” to the diocese, read books, had meetings, talked, and talked and talked. We were clear that mission is more than the outreach projects or collections of goods and money, but were pressed to define exactly what we have to do to be missional. After a frustrating year, we still had not come up with a concrete answer.

Last spring, I attended a conference on The Missional Church. I enjoyed days of stimulating programs, erudite speakers, earnest discussion groups, and browsed piles of books for sale. All of these were thought provoking, but the concept of “Missional Church” remained hazy for me until one of the speakers said, “In place of the word “missional”, I prefer the word “incarnational.”

I was dumbfounded. Sometimes, something that has always been sitting there, right under your nose just suddenly becomes apparent. Oh yes, that is what I’ve always known! “Incarnational Church,” church which is the Body of Christ; the incarnation of God here and now, in our time and place;

church that is not on a program to “do” mission but a church which lives and breathes and enfleshes God’s mission in the world; church that loves the world in its entirety. It seemed so clear and so simple; simple to understand, that is; not necessarily to be.

At our lunch gathering at Parker Church last week, I sat next to the Reverend Debbie Thornton, minister of a CME Church. She said, “We need to follow the example of Jesus to show love to the world.” At first, I wondered how that was going to advance our understanding of, or commitment to a dialogue about racial misunderstandings. Then, the light came on. I said “yes!” To show love to the whole world requires us to seek out, listen to, and open our hearts to new brothers and sisters outside our often homogeneous social circles. To love people, we have to truly know them, and allow them to know us. That is what Jesus was doing with people like the Samaritan woman at the well; boldly seeking out those different from himself; knowing them, revealing himself to them, and loving them. That is how he built the Kingdom of Heaven, and now, we are his body. Reverend Debbie agreed, but allowed that it was hard to go outside of your comfort zone. Yes, I thought, to do that is quite BOLD. Bold in Mission!

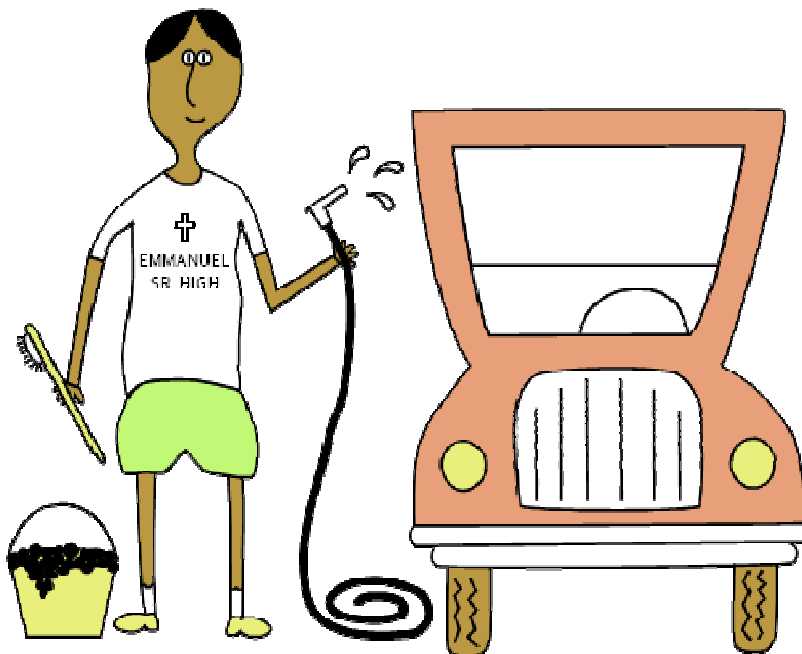

Nominating Committee Information

There’s an old joke that a **camel is a horse designed by committee**. You might say something similar about the process for electing new vestry members. In some churches, it’s as simple as having the retiring vestry members propose a slate for the next year and the parish electing them at the Annual Meeting. But at a big, diverse parish like Emmanuel . . . **NOOOOOOOOOOO**. That’s way too simple.

It might be helpful to look at the process going backwards, beginning with the election itself.

At the Annual Meeting in January, the parish elects the vestry, usually unanimously, usually as a slate.

But where does the slate come from?

In late fall, a **Nominating Committee** meets to determine candidates for the vestry, and delegates and alternates to convention.

But where does the Nominating Committee come from?

In October, the parish votes for three people from a **list of nominees** to serve on the Nominating Committee for 2 years. At the November meeting, the vestry appoints another three people to serve for one year to guarantee diversity on the committee.

But where does the list of nominees come from?

In September, the parish **nominates** people for the **Nominating Committee** (this is where it starts to sound like creating a “camel”). This becomes the list from which the three members are elected.

And that’s where we are now!

You have just received a letter asking for nominations for the Nominating Committee. These people will not (and MAY NOT) serve on the vestry, but they will choose a slate of candidates to be presented to the parish at the Annual Meeting. The Nominating Committee should be made up of people of all ages, who attend all services, and who know lots of Emmanuelites. If elected, these people serve one day this fall and one day next fall.

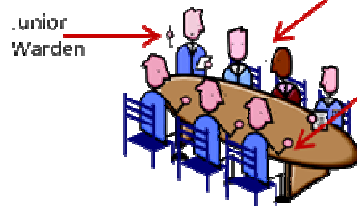
It’s best if you ask the person you’d like to nominate if they’re willing to serve, but if you don’t have a chance to check with them, note that on your form and the parish administrator will check with them. And, yes, you may nominate yourself.

The Election Process

Late September: Parish nominates candidates for the Nominating Committee



October/November: Parish *elects* 3 to Nominating Committee; vestry *appoints* 3.



November/December: Nominating Committee chooses slate for vestry, delegates and alternates



January: Parish elects vestry (*usually choosing the slate by acclamation*)

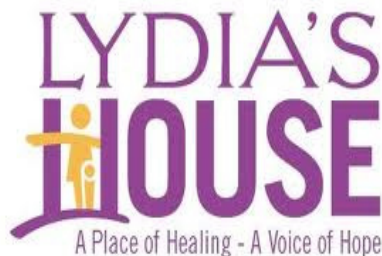

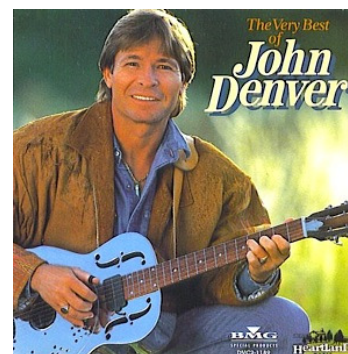

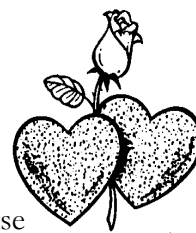
