To Knot or Not?

As a Girl Scout I delighted in the challenges inherent in our Proficiency Badge requirements (also inherent in the tiny budgets) to create something new, using just what was on hand. We made sleeping bags from blankets and sheets with a complicated series of folds. We made "Buddy Burners" to cook with using a tuna can, cardboard, and old melted candle stubs. My favorite was to create various handy items by lashing together sapling trees, bushes, and fallen branches. With a piece of twine and mastery of a few simple knots, these forest products became tables, stools, benches, stands for cook pots, even a structure for a camp shower. It always amazed me to see how a few sticks, bound together, became functional treasures. For that reason, I loved learning the art and craft of knot tying.

A knot implies two entities so wrapped up in each other that, they are bound together, they are functioning as a single entity, stronger and more functional than either could be alone.

It takes some work to tie a knot that will hold. Once it is secure, a well-tied knot can be carefully and intentionally untied, but no amount of external tugging or pulling will undo it. The two pieces of twine, rope, or other stringy material are bound.

"Tying the knot" is a common metaphor for marriage. Through courtship and marriage preparation, culminating in vows and ritual, two people bind themselves together to create a new entity, a couple, that is meant to be and function together, despite the pulls and tugs of life. Together they have resources, resilience, and strength that neither has alone. What holds them together is the entanglement of their hearts. Their mutual love binds their marriage together.

Communities of faith can be like that. Emmanuel is like that. We are held together by love. But it isn't the exclusive love that focuses on one object of love as in courtship; it is the pervasive love of Christ, that seeks and embraces all. Thus bound we become Christ's Body in the world.

Have you noticed that we are singing Hymn 304 more often than usual? You'll be hearing it again, more than once. The last stanza of that hymn speaks of God's people as ***"together met, together bound."*** Our Stewardship Committee chose those words as a focus for us as we consider how Christ has met us, and bound us together as a faith community to carry our God's work here at Big Bend and Lockwood.

Being bound to the Body of Christ is an open invitation we accept every time we open our hearts in worship, service, and care for one another and God's world. The more often we do those things, the stronger our bonds become. Occasional opportunities such as the Inquirers Class, the Community Dinner on Oct. 24, and the "Non-Dinner with Hors d'oeuvres" Oct. 25, and our pledges not only symbolize, but also deepen our ties to our faith community. How might God be inviting us to deepen our ties this year?

In the Parish Dining Room a length of heavy, knotted rope, hangs on the wall. Some of us have already written our names on the ribbons and tied ourselves symbolically together in celebration of the invisible bonds we share. Like sticks lashed together by scouts or a couple bound in marriage, we are much more together than we are separately. We are the strong, resilient, Body of Christ.

The ribbons and pens are waiting for you to add your name to the big knot. For some of us, being part of this great bond of love is clearly part of our identity. Maybe, if you have not been here long, or are recently recommitting, or have come to take this bond for granted, adding your name will be a big step for you. Either way, you will be saying yes to God and to our faith community while joining the celebration of Christ's love that meets and binds us.

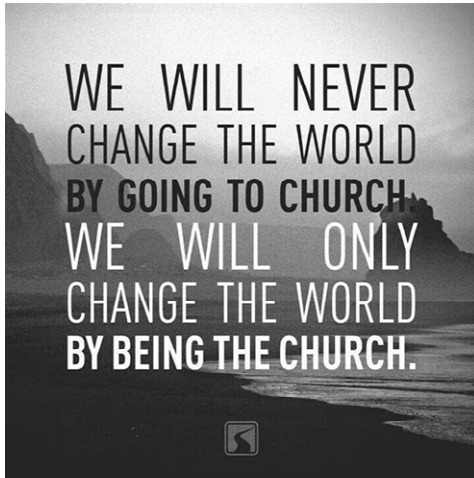

There are application forms in the church office – a simple one page form with questions to be answered to both help focus the ministry and provide information to the Missions Committee.

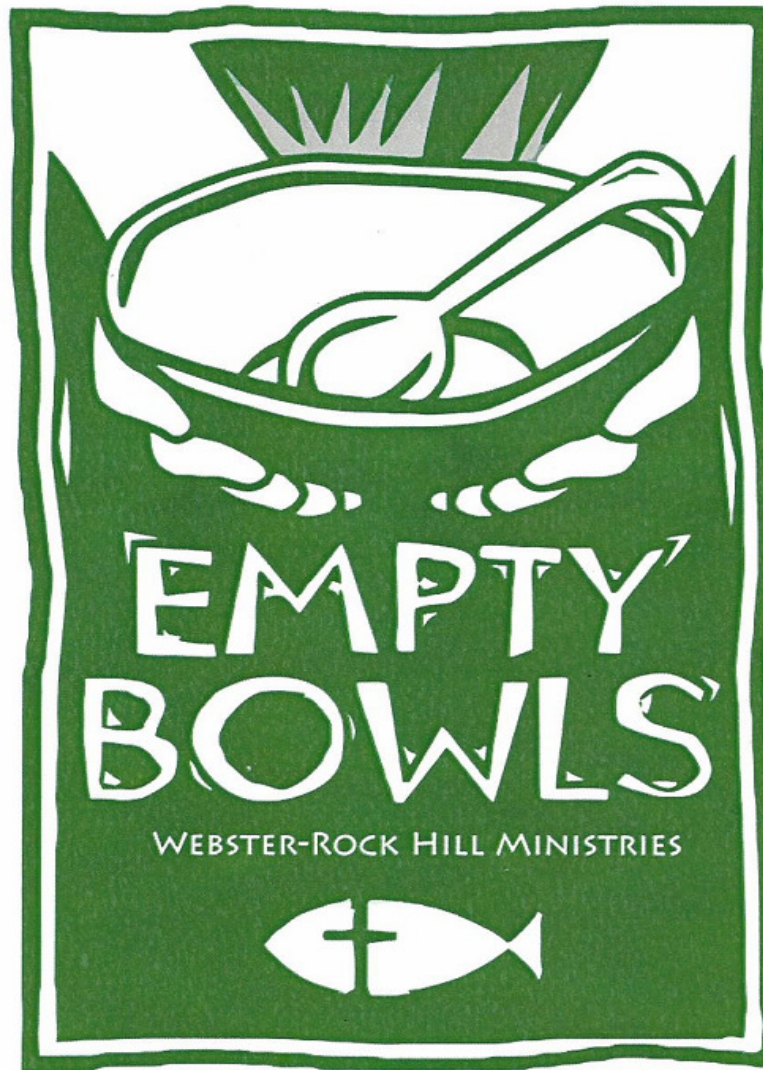

ADULT FORUMS OCTOBER 18 & 25

October 18—Stewardship Kickoff! Together Met, Together Bound.

Does thinking about budgets and spreadsheets make you feel drowsy? Prepare to be awakened as Al Ludwig, Stewardship campaign co-chair, presents Emmanuel's budget in a graphical and narrative approach. This perspective allows you to "see" our financials while considering the all-important human element that is oftentimes omitted and overlooked in traditional discussions.

October 25—The Midwest Innocence Project

Presenter David Everson is a partner at Stinson Morris Hecker law firm and a member of the board of The Midwest Innocence Project.

The Midwest Innocence Project is dedicated to the investigation, litigation and exoneration of wrongfully convicted men and women in our five-state region. Recent independent studies conservatively estimate that between 2% and 5% of all inmates in America were falsely convicted, with some estimates reaching up to 7%. This means that somewhere between 2,000 and 7,000 moms, dads, sons and daughters in Missouri, Kansas, Iowa, Nebraska, and Arkansas are locked behind bars this very moment for crimes they did not commit.

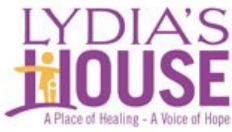

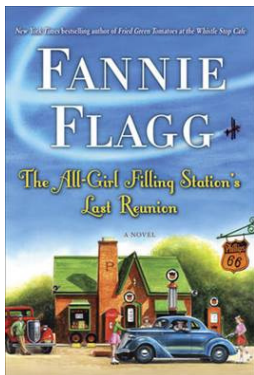


The Caring Ministries Blood Drive
