Crunch, crunch, crunch. It's hard to journey through autumn and not be completely wrapped up in the beauty of the trees. As the leaves crunch under our feet and the soft wind turns them into colorful mist that falls from on high, we are mesmerized by the strength and beauty of the trees as they handle change with such grace.

Yesterday they were fresh and green, and now they settle in for the harsh winter ahead.

Trees are central to life. They provide oxygen and food, materials for our homes and educations, they hold the ground in place and provide homes for many of God's most beautiful creatures.

Recently, I realized that the trees have much to teach us about our own selves, about our humanity, about the changes and chances of this life, and our ability to withstand the harsh realities that may come our way.

"They are like trees planted by streams of water, bearing fruit in due season, with leaves that do not wither; everything they do shall prosper." –Psalm 1, v3

A former seminary professor once described the strength of the trees in a sermon he preached about the The Bio-Sphere 2 project of Arizona that was established in 1991. The Bio-Sphere 2 is an Earth systems science research facility which serves as a center for research, outreach, teaching, and lifelong learning about Earth, its living systems, and its place in the universe. Basically, it is a huge dome-like structure, which simulates the Earth's eco-system, allowing scientists to research what affects certain human processes have on our environment.

One of the greatest learnings from this project, Dr. Gortner pointed out, came from a big mistake. After the dome was completed and the plants and trees were put in, everything began to grow as expected, but a few months later, the scientists realized that something odd was happening.

The trees were all beginning to grow with a light bend toward the middle of the dome, some were beginning to grow so hunched over that the soil underneath could not hold their weight and they were ripped from the ground. The scientist went through a series of tests and trials to find out why the trees were so limp and droopy, and what they found was quite amazing.

They had forgotten a very important factor in the Earth's natural biosphere... Wind.

"In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters." -Genesis 1:1-2

Without the wind, the trees were not able to grow strong. They were not able to stand on their own without any sort of opposing force to strengthen them.

And so it is with us. The winds of our lives, the changes and chances, the harsh realities which press upon us can be what strengthens us. We can be like the trees, which grow in the face of opposition and handle change with the grace apparent in autumn. We can be like the trees if we welcome the wind.

#### Emmanuel's Support of African Seminarians.....

At the September 20<sup>th</sup> Mission Committee meeting Jim Groetsch submitted a proposal for \$2,000 to fund a ministry with *African Anglican/Episcopal priests in the International Student Program at Eden Seminary*. The Committee approved the proposal.

African Anglican/Episcopal seminarians enrolled in master of theological studies program at Eden Seminary usually arrive in St. Louis lacking adequate financial resources to get them through their programs. This proposal requests funds to help them meet these needs. The initial funding for the seminarian project was funded by the Men of Emanuel, and these funds have subsequently been folded into the Mission Committee. The requested funds would be administered by the Reverend Warren Crews in consultation with Rector Daniel Appleyard. *The uniqueness of this proposal is that we will be assisting in the world wide ministry of Christ in a direct and meaningful way.* 

Over the past **six years**, beginning with <u>Reverend Stephen Dokolo</u>, followed by the <u>Revs. Isaiah Cham-</u> <u>bala, Agripa Ndaltilo</u>, <u>Fred Chingwaba</u>, <u>Timothy Chiboti</u>, and now <u>Bethuel Mlula</u> and <u>Anderson Madimilo</u>, several of us have the privilege of knowing these seminarians first hand and their immediate needs.

At times, seminarians have participated in the liturgy of the church, made presentations for the Adult Forum, and have been an integral part of the MOE Bible Studies on Thursday mornings. The fruits of our assistance can already be seen: two have become bishops, one is dean of a cathedral, and another is the head of a theological college!

## Our Newest Seminarian is **The Rev. Canon Anderson Robert Madimilo** from Tanzania. **Anderson recently shared with us the following introducing himself:**

My name is Anderson Robert Madimilo from Tanzania, which is in East Africa. I am married to Mary, and God has blessed us with three children. The first born is a girl, her name is Elizabeth (24). The second born is called Robert (22) and our last born is David. Elizabeth completed her nursing training last year, and she is waiting for employment from the Government where she has applied. Robert is still in college and David is also still in High school. My wife is a nurse employed by the Government.


I came to have personal experience with Jesus in 1982. Although I was born and raised in a Christian home, I had never encountered a personal experience with God. Since that year I came to realize that God wanted me to do more in His ministry, and at that time I joined our Bible school in order to have a deeper understanding of His word.

In 1998 I officially started working in the church as a Church Army officer. From that time I have been working in different places including attending different levels of theology studies. From 1997-2000 I attended three years of Diploma Studies at St. Phillip's theological college. In 2008-2011, I completed my BA in Theology at St John's University of Tanzania.

Since 2011, I have been working as a Dean at All Saints Cathedral. I thank God that since He has called me, I have experienced many spiritual and physical blessings. One thing which excited me is the future hope of eternal life which will be given to all who have sacrificed their lives for his sake. I am very happy to be here at Eden Seminary where God has brought us and made us one, regardless of our background differences. We feel very much loved and cared for. Thank you much for how you are making us feel more at home, especially for the studying, learning, and meditating o the word of God together on Thursday morning. That has been great.


#### ALTAR GUILD LINENS......a special opportunity!

The Altar Guild held their annual meeting on October 5. We have been very aware for some time that we were in need of new linens (purificators and corporals) which are used at every Eucharist. A suggestion was made that many members of the Altar Guild would like to donate for linens in memory of those we have lost this year, including Karen James, who was a member of the Altar Guild, and her husband Tom and for also Eleanor Fletcher.

Katherine Ziegler had already done the footwork for identifying alternate places to purchase these linens instead of the "big linen" companies. It was decided that we would purchase these linens from a woman in Chicago (Susanna Taylor) who started a co-op business 10 years ago for 6 women in Haiti who learned their embroidery skills in schools run by the French colonials. Each cross is hand embroidered on the linen. The name of her fair trade business is Living Threads (www.livingthreadshaiti.com and the e-mail address is threadsalive@gmail.com). The women are paid a portion for each piece sold which allows them to make extra money in addition to their regular jobs.

The cost of the linens that we ordered is just under \$700 and we are half-way to our goal. If anyone has an interest in donating to this fund, it is a designated fund for the Altar Guild. These linens will be blessed at an upcoming service and placed into service at our Eucharist's.

This Commission will be offering their two day training at Emmanuel on January 16 and 17th. The training is free and childcare will be provided. This is the first time the Commission has offered this training on Saturday and Sunday and we expect many people from all over the Diocese to be here.

Their presentation will be an introduction to discussing and "developing a common language for discussions about race." We will watch a short video and discuss it in the context of a shared understanding.

November 8-Municipal Courts. Steve Jianakoplos (Rev. Melanie Slane's dad) was born and raised in Alton, Illinois. After graduating from Trinity College (Hartford, CT) and St. Louis University School of Law, he has engaged in the private practice of law in St. Louis for the last 40 years. He is a partner of the law firm Pulos, Blankenship, & Jianakoplos, P.C. with offices in Crestwood. Steve has also served part time as the prosecuting attorney for the City of Rock Hill for the last 32 years.

Steve will lead an adult forum discussion focusing on the purpose and structure of municipal courts, how they differ from state and federal courts, how fines and punishments are assessed and enforced, and recent changes in some procedures of municipal courts in Missouri.

#### Vestry Vibes October 2015


