Dear Friends,

Who doesn’t love to be loved?

I remember my grandmother’s beaming face and open arms when after an 8- or 9-hour drive, my family piled into her kitchen late at night for a Christmas visit. “Well, here you are, and I have some fresh fudge brownies I just made while I was waiting for you!” I probably had not seen my grandmother since last year’s visit and had done nothing to earn her welcome. Arriving at her door, along with suitcases and pillow, sleepy and mussed, I simply presented my young self to her and she embraced me just because she claimed me as her grandchild. That might have been the best moment of Christmas; undeserved, unconditional love realized in my little world.

When I grew older, I went away to a distant part of the country, returning less than annually to visit my grandmother. For a few years, I brought my children to visit her and she would be beaming and embracing, and opening her canister of brownies with a layer of fudge on top for them. My children, too, experienced the grace of Grandmother’s love, not because they had done anything to earn it, but because she claimed them as her beloved grandchildren. .

In the parable of the Prodigal Son, Jesus tells the story of a father waiting, watching, and longing for his errant son to return from a distant land. At long last, seeing him approach the house at some distance, he runs to greet him with a full embrace and lavishes love upon him with garments, jewelry and a feast. Certainly, the son had done nothing to deserve that love. On the contrary, he had squandered the family inheritance and engaged in all sorts of abominations. Yet the love for the son, like God’s love for us, was unconditional.



Jesus teaches us that in returning home to God we will experience the same lavish love, not because we have earned it with our lackadaisical ways, but because God claims us as his beloved children, just as my Grandmother claimed her grandchildren. Knowing the joy of that love, what could ever keep us away? Yet at times, we find ourselves drifting.

The prophet Joel implores us, “*Return to the lord with all your heart...*”

Lent is a time to think about what we are missing, and what keeps us from running into God’s loving embrace. Is it that we know we haven’t earned it and don’t deserve it? Or that we don’t believe that the love will be there for us? That we have forgotten how to pray? Or perhaps that we just fill our lives so full of other activities, work, sports, games, TV, food and drink, that we don’t notice the empty place inside that might come back to life if it were touched by God?

Lent is the time to re-experience the joy of a loving homecoming. Take a minute, take an hour; find a labyrinth or quiet corner, come to Eucharist a few minutes early to pray. Present yourself to God. God will do the rest.

The tip jars alone collected over \$600. When all the expenses are in we'll let you know the final contribution amount.

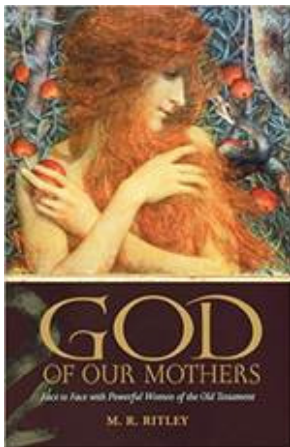

Emmanuel Parking Lot Facts!

“When Armageddon takes place, parking is going to be a major problem.” Parking can be serious stuff in this small corner of St. Louis County!

- Fact #1:** The Bompart lot has 63 spaces and they are all numbered. That's for a reason!
- Fact #2:** Emmanuel leases 32 parking spaces to Nerinx High School students during the school year. M-F students park in spaces D1-13; C1-14; B14-15 and A19-21. It's a great arrangement, and we work well with them.
- Fact #3:** Monday thru Friday we have teachers and parents here for Pre-School or Parents Day Out. Around 9:00 a.m., 11:30 to noon or 2:30 p.m. spaces are tight due to drop-off or pick-up. And M-W-Th seem to be the busiest days!
- Fact #4:** Contrary to what it may seem like we don't have a huge issue with Webster University students. We do have several parishioners who teach at Webster U, and they park there there days they teach. On occasion it may seem crowded, but it's a rare day when there is absolutely no parking for you!
- Fact #5:** Food Center volunteers monitor the parking lot to ensure spaces are open for building use and for Nerinx students. Maybe you've gotten one of those gold colored pieces of paper?!
- Fact #6:** To avoid getting a notice from us you can put an Emmanuel sticker on your driver side front window. There is an envelope of stickers on the bulletin board outside the Food Center, and a layout of the parking!
- Fact #7:** There are 2 permanent accessible spaces closest to the Big Bend doors. Those are definitely for handicap hang tags. The other driveway spaces can be used during the week, but on Sundays, please keep the driveway spots open for those less able.
- Finally, on Sundays, if you can't find a place to park, you can park in Webster University's lot, they're happy for us to do that!

Episcopal City Mission

Episcopal City Mission (ECM) has been ministering to the young people in the city and county detention centers since 1954. It is a very unique ministry. ECM provides chaplains to be at the centers when the children are not in school and can have time to get to know these children and help them to understand that they are loved by God and not forgotten about.

During the course of 2015 the chaplains had contact – *“moments of presence”* with 12,188 young souls. The chart below shows the different types of interactions that take place.

For the most part, ECM is a fundraising board. We raise the funds to pay for the chaplains to be in the centers ministering to the children. There are two main fund raising events, Summer Celebration in June and Moment in Time in the fall. As information about those becomes available I will share it with Emmanuel.

Each month at the city and county detention centers different churches volunteer to host the birthday party for any child that has a birthday during that month. Emmanuel just hosted the birthday party at city on February 5th and a special thank you to those who helped with it: Nancy Moore, Peg Cooper, Laura Jones, and Holly and Steve Dellinger. Emmanuel will be hosting the **county birthday party in March – the 11th** to be exact. We need volunteers again to help!

We will meet at church on **March 11th at 5:15** and carpool to the County Detention Center on Brentwood Blvd, just south of Shaw Park. The party begins at 6pm and lasts 55 minutes. LENTEN LABYRINTH WALKS

“Make me to know your ways, O God; teach me your paths.” Psalm 25: 4

Donna Erickson has put together Saturday morning Lenten Labyrinth Walks. Donna is aware of 8 permanent labyrinths in St Louis. They are in different parts of the city/county, in different patterns and created using a variety of materials. Walking most/all should provide a rich variety of experiences.

Donna has designed a ‘program’ of moving from the outer circles of St Louis geography, moving toward the ‘center’; almost like the loops of a labyrinth itself. She will be walking at 9AM, on Saturdays. Rain or shine. If you’d like to join her-or create an experience that works for you– contact the office or Donna at

Just remember:

There is no “right” way to walk a labyrinth. It can be used for prayer, discernment, healing, self-knowledge; some find the labyrinth especially helpful in times of loss and transition. It can be helpful to do some brief journaling prior to entering the labyrinth, naming the identifying the current issues/struggles in your life and what you are seeking spiritually.

One approach is to think of the walk as having a three-fold path.

THE WAY IN: Release. The way in is a time of letting go.

AT THE CENTER: Receive. Rest. Take as much time as you need. Stand, Sit, Kneel or lie down.

THE WAY OUT: Return. Follow the path back out the way you came in. This is a time of integrating whatever you received or learned, and returning to the world.

After you have completed the walk, you may want to ask “God, how can my experience here help me understand my life?” You might find it helpful to spend some time journaling your answer to that question and your experience of the walk.

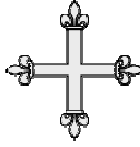
