Some kind of example, that"!

"On that Thursday with the broken flat loaf and the last cup of red wine, bloody as Passover, bloody as a smeared door, he dips his hand in a bowl of meat and oil with the one with the damning bagful of silver under his chair who goes out into the dark. But that one, too, got a piece of the bread".

"On that Thursday in the night shade of leafy garden, where flowers and olive trees rinsed by spring rain are fragrant it's easy to sleep and get away from it all. Nobody really wants to hear lonely prayer or sobs in the throat. Eyes are so heavy".

"We wake startled like we have fallen in our dream and it smells like angels have been here. No, it's only the greasy smoking of torches. There is a swirl-sound of capes, the castanet of hidden weapons, and, anonymous as a lynching, we shuffle around—cowardly, guilty, lethal, and without names. On that Thursday, there's the kiss".

"But is' not over till the cock's crow, the tears, the morning light".

As we continue our journeys in the Season of Lent, I pray that this season will deepen your lives in Christ and lead you into the joys of Easter.

PEACE MEAL PROJECT

What is Peace Meal? Peace Meal Project began in 2006 as a free fellowship meal for all at St. John's Tower Grove. It's called Peace Meal because it is a small piece of the puzzle when it comes to addressing poverty, inequality and loneliness. "Sharing a fellowship meal together brings us closer to the Reign of God that we hope for –a community of justice, peace, and dignity for all people".

Ten various churches volunteer to help make Peace Meal happen every week. Emmanuel is one of seven Episcopal churches who support Peace Meal Project.

Volunteers are needed from Emmanuel to work at the Peace Meal at St. John's in Tower Grove.

The hours are from 2-6, or any part of this that you can do. Usually we divide it from 2-4, 4-6, or 2-6 if you can do it. We prepare and cook the food, which has already been purchased, set up the dining room and serving table, serve the food, and if possible, visit with some of the guests. The meal is open to the neighborhood and the homeless. Skills needed? If you have prepared any meal at home or at Emmanuel, you qualify.


Adult Forum March 6 & 13

LENTEN LABYRINTH WALKS

"Make me to know your ways, O God; teach me your paths." Psalm 25: 4

Donna Erickson has put together Saturday morning Lenten Labyrinth Walks. There are 8 permanent labyrinths in St Louis. They are in different parts of the city/county, in different patterns and created using a variety of materials. Walking most/all should provide a rich variety of experiences. Donna has designed a 'program' of moving from the outer circles of St Louis geography, moving toward the 'center'; almost like the loops of a labyrinth itself. There is no "right" way to walk a labyrinth. It can be used for prayer, discernment, healing, self-knowledge; some find the labyrinth especially helpful in times of loss and transition. It can helpful to do some brief journaling prior to entering the labyrinth, naming the identifying the current issues/struggles in your life and what you are seeking spiritually. One approach is to think of the walk as having a three-fold path.


THE WAY IN: Release. The way in is a time of letting go.

AT THE CENTER: Receive. Rest. Take as much time as you need. Stand, Sit, Kneel or lie down.

THE WAY OUT: Return. Follow the path back out the way you came in. This is a time of integrating whatever you received or learned, and returning to the world.

After you have completed the walk, you may want to ask "God, how can my experience here help me understand my life?" You might find it helpful to spend some time journaling your answer to that question and your experience of the walk.


