Recently, my family and I traveled to a place where there is an increasing amount of noise, trouble, and hard work. Noise from bustling crowds and suicide bombs; trouble, for people do not understand one another, and the hard work of finding a better way amidst lost refugees and even more lost extremists.

be calm in your heart.

Chris and I contemplated for weeks whether or not we should follow through with our long-awaited trip to Turkey. Friends and family called asking us to re-consider. We prayed, we planned, we waited; and in the end we decided to go. I'd like to tell you that we had no fear as we set off on our adventure, but being new parents gave us a greater sense that we are not in fact invincible.

Between the jet-lag, anxiety of a new atmosphere, children clinging to me begging for food while crying, "Syria problem," and keeping constant watch for young men with large black back-packs and empty eyes, I felt physically sick. What was I thinking? Why did I bring my young son here? Our first morning in Istanbul, I was barely there. I felt terrible. I felt terrified. As we entered the Hagia Sophia I made my way to a cold marble ledge and sat down. I imagined the thousands who had worshiped there, both Christian and Muslim. I knew, that at times in the past it had been a place of peace and violence, because you could feel it. You could feel the love and pain as you touched the stone that held those memories.

My body was in a strange way bottling up all of those same feelings. Peace and prayer, terror and violence. I stared up at the beautiful ceiling littered with mosaics depicting my Lord and prayed to God that peace would prevail, both in my body and in this place. I'm sure hours went by as people swirled around me. I missed seeing most of the Hagia Sophia, but I gained a great deal of insight from being there. Peace, as the poem above reminds us, is first internal. We need to have it within us before we can spread it beyond us.

It was never easy to see so many refugees homeless on the streets, and we made sure to listen to our gut when a person or place seemed dangerous, but we



were able, as the week progressed, to let peace be the impulse of our travel, and nomad the spirit of our footsteps.

As you may have heard, there was a suicide bombing last Saturday, March 19, near Taksim Square, on one of the very streets where we walked just a few weeks ago. The thought of having been in that place made me sick all over again. How could someone do this? What can we do to show people that there is a better way?

There is no easy answer for how to end violence and extremism in our world, but together we can work to make sure that it is not fueled or fashioned by what comes forth from us. We have a long way to go in our understanding of other faiths. Heck, we have a long way to go in understanding our own. But in a nut-shell, it's about peace with God and neighbor in the midst of noise, trouble, and hard work. We must pray for peace to prevail in our hearts so that we do not add to the hatred and fear that pervades our culture.

May God give you the strength to choose the path that leads to God, and may the peace of Christ be always with you.

Office IT Update

After the departure of our IT staff member, Glenn Dunn, Emmanuel entered into a contractual agreement for Information Technologies (IT) and Audio Visual (AV) support with Webster University. Over the past few months, Dan Appleyard has been meeting with our IT Department support team from

Webster, and they have reviewed the current status our network cabling and our computer hardware and software. After completing a thorough inventory of our current system, we have received a detailed infrastructure enhancement proposal. At this time, Dan is reviewing the proposal and considering a "phased" implementation, beginning with rewiring our in-house network. Upcoming Adult Forum Programs

April 3: Sr. Carla Mae Streeter, Biblical and Theological Foundations for Refugee Ministry. Refugees are much in the news these days. Update on Emmanuel's Participation in OUR WRHM Building Project

It's not too late to make a contribution to Emmanuel's pledge for the Webster Rock Hill Ministries Building Addition Project. The building addition will cost approximately \$288,000, and as of March the donors have been very generous. The project has received two grants (one from Episcopal Presbyterian Health Trust). In addition to grants, the OUR fund-raising committee has reached out to all the religious organizations in Webster and members of those organizations.

Emmanuel committed to raising \$25,000. We are very happy to report that as of March 25 we were well over our goal! We hope to report to the 'OUR' committee our final numbers by mid-April. In the meantime, as a result of the community's generous donations, construction is about to begin. And thanks to the Cornelson Foundation, WRHM will receive an additional \$50,000 for raising \$25,000. We will keep you apprised of the progress. Webster Music Student Wins Regional Conducting Award

ST. LOUIS – Webster University senior music education major
Connor R. Scott took first place in the inaugural Student
Conducting Competition, hosted by the Southwestern division of
the American Choral Directors Association, on Wednesday, March
9, 2016. The event was held in Kansas City.

The three-round competition finished with three undergraduate

conductors leading and rehearsing two pieces with a demonstration choir from Arkansas, adjudicated by choral experts from Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, and Texas. Overall, 32 students entered the undergraduate category. Scott was awarded \$250 prize money in recognition of his prowess. Other finalists were from Bethel College (Kansas) and Texas Tech. In the graduate division, both winners were from state schools in Colorado.

I really was surprised that I won, but I have some great mentors here at Webster University, and I couldn't have done it without them," Scott said. "Webster University has helped me grow immensely over the past four years. I get a lot of personal attention from the faculty. A lot of larger schools don't provide the same experience, and I am very fortunate for that."

Scott said he first had to submit a video that demonstrated his work to be accepted into the competition. During the two-day event, Scott worked with a high school choir from Bentonville, Arkansas. While he had not met the choir prior to the competition, he knew and studied their song choices for several weeks in advance. The focus of the competition was to demonstrate conducting prowess -- gesture, ability to gain results, demonstration of musicianship -- within an 8-minute segment for each round. Scott led the choir in rehearsing two pieces of music in the semi-finals, and a different two pieces in the finals.

"I wasn't nervous," Scott said. "Instead, I just kept my head down and gave it my all."

"Kudos have poured in from around Missouri," said Webster University Professor Jeffrey Carter, who managed the competition and happens to be one of Connor's teachers at Webster University. "Connor is a mighty impressive young man. His win reflects his strengths, and is also a sign of the training and development he received here in Webster Groves. He has fans all around the area who are delighted for this recognition too."

Scott's primary teachers are Trent Patterson, Director of Choral Studies and Music Education, and Martha J. Hart, Associate Professor of Voice. Scott is a current Buder Scholar in the Department of Music, and has been a Fossett Scholar — meaning he has received the two highest musical honors in the music department. He currently carries a 4.0 grade point average. He is currently student-teaching in Lee's Summit, Missouri with Amy Krinke at Lee's Summit West High School and plans to become a music teacher after graduating.

Here's a bit about this extraordinary book written in 1965: "William Stoner is born at the end of the nineteenth century into a dirt-poor Missouri farming family. Sent to Mizzou's ag school to study agronomy, he instead falls in love with English literature and embraces a scholar's life, so different from the hardscrabble existence he has known. And yet, as the years pass, Stoner encounters a succession of disappointments: marriage into a "proper" family estranges him from his parents; his career is stymied; a transforming experience of new love ends under threat of scandal; and Stone



rediscovers the stoic silence of his forebears. John Williams' luminous and deeply moving novel is a work of quiet perfection. William Stoner emerges from it not only as an archetypal American, but as an unlikely existential hero, standing, like a figure in a painting by Edward Hopper, in stark relief against an unforgiving world."
