The Interim Rector's Ramblings
Grace, Gratitude and Generosity

Dear Friends:

A few years ago I attended a conference in Indianapolis put on by the Episcopal Network for Stewardship. The title of the conference was, "Grace, Gratitude and Generosity." Over 200 Episcopalians from around the country and around the world came to hear stories about how others, individually and corporately, made the shift from living in an environment and mindset of scarcity and anxiety to one of abundance and generosity.

The keynote speaker was the Reverend Dr. Walter Bruggemann, the foremost Old Testament scholar in the world today. Dr. Bruggemann spoke about returning to covenant fidelity, of returning to God's promise to us. To live in covenant means living in such a way that our lives are guided by that covenant. When we decide to live by God's covenant we decide to live in the trust that God really will do what God has promised. When we decide to live in that covenant we are making the choice to live in faith and not fear.

Generosity is both a spiritual virtue as well as spiritual practice. Generosity is learned as it is modeled, not in some big flamboyant way, but in small humble ways. I learned more from my father about sacrificial giving than from any announcement made on radio or TV. about some huge philanthropic gift made by some millionaire or billionaire. I saw my parents struggle to pay the bills as well as give what was owed to God. I saw my parents give not only what they had, but more than they had, in thankfulness to God. I hope and pray that David and I are modeling the same spirit of generosity and sacrificial giving to our boys. In this culture of consumerism and looking out for number one, a new example needs to be shown, and a new story needs to be told.

The amazing part of living a generous life is that it is that same generosity that frees us from living in fear of there not being enough. Living a generous life means living in the belief that giving is an act that can and will transform the world. David and I made a commitment several years ago to tithe as a minimum and to do so before taxes. We give out of gratitude for all God has given us, not because it benefits us in the tax code. The change in our spiritual life, the change in our living more truly in the covenant promise of God's care for us, has been transformative to our lives as husband and wife, parents, and citizens. We give generously not because God needs the money, but because we need to give as part of our spiritual discipline and part of our gratitude to God.

I invite you to join me on this journey of generosity. Together we can transform not only the world, but through God's grace we will be transformed ourselves.

It doesn't take the Apostle John long to bring the Baptist into the story – he's arrived by verse 5; in verse 14 he has recognized Jesus as the word made flesh; he announces Jesus' arrival in verse 15; and then in 16 John the Baptist says:

From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ.

....And then, wherever you are on your stewardship journey, join us on **November 13th** to recognize and celebrate the Amazing Grace of God in our life.

What do you know about Domestic Violence?



Are you aware that someone in your neighborhood, bridge group, yoga class, or book club may be or may have been a victim of domestic violence? According to the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence (NCADV):

In the United States, an average of 20 people are physically abused by intimate partners every minute.

1 in 3 women and 1 in 4 men have been physically abused by an intimate partner.

1 in 5 women and 1 in 7 men have been severely physically abused by an intimate partner.

On a typical day, domestic violence hotlines nationwide receive approximate 20,800 calls.

Domestic violence accounts for 15% of all violent crime.

Domestic violence is most common among women between the ages of 18-24.

These are just a few of the statistics on the NCADV website. If you or someone you know is experiencing domestic violence, call The National Domestic Violence Hotline at 1-800-799-SAFE (7233). You may also help women and their children who are recovering from domestic abuse by donating to the October Ingathering for Lydia's House, a place working in faith to end domestic violence by being a place of healing and a voice of hope for abused women and their children.




