#### Dear Friends:



From time to time, my vocation takes me to people and places that most other people seldom or never visit. Hospital bedsides, nursing home sing-a-longs, fancy fundraising galas, and sometimes even other houses of worship.

With a thankful heart for such adventures, I want to share with you all a wonderful experience I recently had at Dar ul Jalal Masjid in Hazelwood, Missouri, where I attended the 37<sup>th</sup> Annual Women's Interfaith Conference. Yes, I said 37<sup>th</sup>! This conference has been happening

every year since 1981, and I would be honored if you would consider joining me in attending next spring.

We were greeted upon arrival at the mosque with a hospitable smile and directions to the meeting room and registration tables where we all would gather. I thought to myself, "I hope there are at least a few dozen women at this gathering." But as I walked through the doors, my expectations were blown out of the water as I saw that over 250 women and even a couple of men had gathered to discuss our topic for the year *Responding Faithfully in a Changing World*. It was amazing to see women of all ages, classes, colors, and creeds gathered together with a common purpose and a common goal... to be faithful to God and to show forth God's love in this ever-changing world.

Our registration packets assigned us each to a table where we would be sure to have diversity present. It was truly a gift to sit with women of other faiths, to share a meal together, to ask questions of one another, and to learn together from our speakers and one another. When else in my life do I get opportunities like this? Many of us seldom share meals with people of other religions, other echelons of society, other experiences of life, and yet, is this not something that our Savior Christ has taught us to do?

Throughout the morning, I found myself thinking, why aren't things like this in the news? Here we are, hundreds of women gathered together for good, and yet, if we do not tell people about this amazing experience, the world will never know that these good things happen too. Our religious differences can be something to celebrate and to uphold, not something only to be spoken about when some tragedy occurs. Often our diversity is seen as a threat, but at this conference, it was made clear that our diversity was a beautiful celebration of the diversity of the image of God made present in humanity. Also, among our differences there were many similarities. Many of us there were: mothers, educators, professionals, volunteers, and faithful members of religious intuitions who are seeking daily to know God more deeply and more fully.

The conference was from 9am-2pm on a Thursday, and we heard from five amazing speakers in order of their faith tradition's "founding" going from "youngest" to "oldest" beginning with the Baha'i faith and ending with Judaism. I learned a lot from these women and would like to share a bit of what they shared with us. My hope is that this sharing will bring up other questions you might have and begin a larger conversation about religious diversity and its many benefits and challenges.

Our first speaker was Dr. Cassandra Butler of the Baha'i faith. Cassandra began her talk by raising the question, "Are we changing for the better; or for the worse?" Pointing out that often a "good change" for one is a "bad change" for another. She then went on to explain to us that one of the major components of the Baha'i faith is the idea of "Progressive Revelation" by which humanity learns about God by changing our understanding of the Divine over the course of human history, stating that "religion fits the needs of people over time." The next part of her talk was particularly interesting to me, as she attempted to reduce each of the major world religions to a single word or idea. Abraham, she said, "taught us the God is One, Moses, gave us The Law. Buddhism taught us Peace. Jesus taught us to love our neighbor. Hinduism taught us detachment. Islam taught us submission to God. And Baha'i taught us that mankind is one." Every religion, she said, has something to teach us, and that we should accept these teachings in the spirit of unity, not discord. The second part of her talk was about what Baha'i people believe about our existence or purpose as human beings. Cassandra said that we are all "Noble Spiritual Beings having a human experience. The purpose of our life is to become more and more like God." In that same spirit, Cassandra said that "This life is an assimilation game. Every person has a higher nature and a lower nature. The higher nature is in communion with God. The lower nature is the 'human garment' worn by our eternal spirit, Our lower nature is enhanced by love."

Our second speaker was Thanaa Tarabishy Kuziez of the Islamic faith. Thanaa expressed her desire to see women of faith come together to make a positive difference in our community. She began by sharing with us the story of Pharaoh's wife found in the Quran. She talked about how she was a mother who "raised Moses to be everything that Pharaoh was not; a prophet. She was resolute and convicted. She stood for justice, righteousness, and truth!" "Our goals for our community," she said, "are the same. We have a lot in common. We must lead by example. We are shepherds of our flock. We can talk all we want, but people will only learn from us if we practice what we preach. We are defined by our righteousness." Thanaa went on to say that in recent years she has seen an increase in negative stereotyping of Muslim people that comes not from people who actually know, or who are friends with Muslim people, but from people that judge others based on their appearances. "We should not be defined by our appearances." God, she reminded us, "looks not at our appearances, but rather at our souls." She encouraged us to truly get to know people of other religions because, "the less we know about people, the more hatred and judgment we will have toward them, and this is not God's will for us...All creatures are dependent on God, and we are blessed when we admit this." If you would like to get to know people of the Islamic faith better, I encourage you to attend Coffee & Donuts With a Muslim, which is held at Dar ul Jalal Masjid (Mosque) (8945 Dunn Rd., Hazelwood, MO 63042) on the third Sunday of every month from 12-2pm. In Thanaa's invitation, she emphasized that all are welcome!

Our third speaker was The Rev. Karen Anderson of the African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church. Karen began her presentation with a bit of a history lesson for us all about the roots of her faith tradition. The AME Church was established in 1787 in Philadelphia out of the Free African Society, which was both a social and spiritual community. They were birthed out of oppression, and this is an important reminder for the Church even today. It is important that we "do not become that which we detest." John Wesley said, "Do all the good you can, in all the ways you can, to all the souls you can, in every place you can, at all the times you can, with all the zeal you can, as long as you can." The problem with our society, she said, is that "we want people to pay. But Christians are taught to forgive. God is with the oppressed." Karen was a compelling preacher who filled us with hope and energy as she proclaimed, "Women of faith can change this world, one person at a time! All children are our children. We must protect them from: sex-trafficking, bullying, prejudice, gun violence. We must protect their right to education, healthcare, and religious freedom. We need to find our common ground. Created in God's image. God's own creation."

Our fourth speaker was Jennifer Harris Dault of the Mennonite faith. Jennifer began by reminding us that the Mennonites are a very diverse group of people with more than 40 denominations in the United States. The "Old Order" is called Amish. They are a small fraction. The Mennonite community is highly dedicated to fair trade practices and modest frugal living. You can participate in their mission by shopping at Plowsharing Crafts in Kirkwood, MO, a store begun and maintained by Mennonites in the St. Louis area. Mennonites, she said, "are a peaceful people. We do not believe in violence. We are pacifists. Many of us purposefully live below the Federal poverty line so that we do not have to pay taxes that go toward inflicting violence on others. We try to stay away from all forms of violence including words or thoughts inside our hearts." She also pointed out that "there is a difference between pacifism and passivism…We must do things that bring about peace. Sometimes civil disobedience is necessary. In many aspects of our lives we should look to divest from violence. We need to heighten our consciousness through community dialogue."

Our fifth and final speaker was Felice Taub Joyce of the Jewish faith. Her first words were, "Change is challenging." She went on to say that "humans are challenging because we are always changing...We are both physical and ethereal, and we need to honor our Godliness in one another. We need to treat all people with dignity and respect...Our duty is that of the heart. We need to live with a Spirit of charity." Because "God is slow to anger and of great kindness,' this is the way we should be also. Acts of kindness are of paramount importance." Compassion she said, "is not giving someone what they want; but rather what they need... Disconnecting from people who differ from you is not the answer...We need to figure out how to talk to one another...Patience asks that we understand the other side of the story, but patience goes out the door in cases of injustice. In those cases we must speak up, respond, and act to enact positive change!"

The speakers at this conference gave me a lot to think about. I found myself comforted by how much we truly had in common. My hope is that this article leaves you in exactly the same place, comforted by our commonality, and ready to learn more as we work together to respond faithfully in a changing world!

# Children and Youth Participation in Education and Liturgy at Emmanuel

We have a deep tradition of providing Christian education, liturgical, and music programs for children here at Emmanuel. All these activities happen through efforts by clergy, staff, and volunteers. Below is a list of activities that will resume in <u>September</u>. We hope you and your children will participate as you are able. AND if you are so inclined, we welcome new faces to assist with any of these activities! Please let the clergy know or call the Parish Office at 314-961-2393 if you would like more details.

# Children's Chapel

Children's Chapel is available on Sundays during the 9:00 a.m. (10:00 a.m. service). Children leave the service at the first reading and return during the Peace. They are shepherded upstairs to the Children's Chapel room (by Rehkopf Hall) by an acolyte and an adult. Each week the lesson is read and discussed if the children are interested. Because the children are young, the discussion can wander to topics that excite them! This year we will have copies of *God's Dream* and *Let Us Pray* in the room so children will be exposed to those books.

# **FaithQuest**

Christian education for children ages 4 through  $5^{th}$  grade. There are typically 3-4 different classrooms for pre-school,  $1^{st}$  and  $2^{nd}$  grades, and  $3^{rd}$  through  $5^{th}$  grades. The curriculum used is Holy Moly and it includes videos and activities that are outlined each week. Each classroom requires two teachers.

# Youth Groups

The <u>Junior High Youth group</u>, serving grades 6 through 8, gather for scripture study and to deepen their understanding of the role of faith in their lives. They give back to the parish and community in many ways. Rural and urban mission trips introduce Junior High youth to service in other communities and help them practice putting their faith into action.

The <u>Senior High Youth group</u>, serving youth in 9th through 12th grades, focuses on faith, service, and fellowship. They explore faith and spirituality with a special focus on the sacraments and the Book of Common Prayer. Each fall and winter, overnight retreats provide opportunities for group bonding, faith-based activities, and great memories. Mission trips (urban, rural, and international) challenge youth to live out their faith in service to others.

# Cherub Choir

For children ages 4-6. Primarily the children are learning to hear a beat, learn a tune and memorize words to songs. They sing approximately once a month at the 9:00 a.m. service. Rehearsals are on Wednesdays from 6:00-6:25 p.m.

# Junior Choir

For children 2<sup>nd</sup> through 5<sup>th</sup> grades. At this age children are reading and can also use tambourines, bells and other instruments that require rhythm. They also are able to sometimes read music and understand harmony and vocal parts. Rehearsals are on Wednesday from 6:30-7:15 p.m.

NOTE: To make it easier on families on Wednesday evening during most of the year we have Fellowship Dinners from 5:30-6:45 p.m. so families can get children to choir and be fed a healthy meal without too much hassle!

# Update on Wafaa Abu Elula

Wafaa finished her first year at Webster University this past May! Emmanuel, specifically WOE, along with three other churches in Webster has been supporting Wafaa since 2016.

WOE co-chair, **Laurie Parker** along with **Penny & Davis Allen** have been helping Wafaa navigate things like transportation, getting a phone, buying books, making trips to Target, and getting to the dentist. Below is a note from Laurie about her time with Wafaa:

"I spent part of a day with Wafaa, and each time I am with her I continue to be amazed by her determination, confidence, and ability to adapt. At least from the outside. I know inside she deeply misses her family and friends. Especially on days like yesterday when she sat in the dentist chair and I just knew when it was over all she wanted was her mom. She is having a series of dental appointments to take care of some cavities and to fix problems that occurred when she took a fall off her bike earlier in the school year. Long story short, she is a strong woman, much stronger than I can imagine I would be in her situation, and is truly an inspiration. She is SO VERY appreciative of all Emmanuel and the other church sponsors are able to do for her!!"

**For those learning about Wafaa for the first time**, the note below was written by her in 2016 just prior to her arrival in the United States of America.

"My name is Wafaa Abu Elula, I am a 21 year old Palestinian Syrian girl and I'm applying to Webster University. I chose Webster because it's an international college and accepts students from around the world, and offers the chance to study two majors at the same time. The two programs that I would like to study are Wig Making & Theater Makeup and Languages. They also offer modern dance, which I am very excited about because I have loved to dance since I could walk.

I have lived in Turkey for two years since my family fled Yarmouk, Syria and my life has changed in so many ways. I started working, for the first time in my life. I was a makeup artist and at the same time I learned Turkish. Working was very difficult in the beginning but with time I found that I enjoyed the work and the pride of being able to learn and to be able to support my parents and sisters. Since then I have worked in an office and a cafe.



Learning Turkish opened up a new culture to me and helped me to understand the people better. One of the things that I learned in the past two years is that to be able to have a better life I need to be able to study and earn a degree from University. The opportunities in Turkey are not very good especially for a Palestinian/Syrian girl. To attend University in the US is my best chance to gain knowledge and to become an educated woman. I want to do everything that I can to make this happen. I would be so grateful if you were willing to help me achieve this."
