Dear Friends,

My Journal from Episcopal Youth Event (EYE), July 10 to 14, 2017.

EYE Day 1:

For this month's Angelus article I want to share with you a sort of short journal from my trip to Oklahoma City for the Episcopal Youth Event. I joined our diocesan group this morning to make the triennial trek to EYE. We met at St. Tim's in Creve Coeur at 5:45am and drove to Oklahoma City. So, for today, I will just give a short explanation of what the event is, since we spent most of the day driving.

The Episcopal Youth Event is a gathering of 1300 or so youth from every province of the Episcopal Church. This group includes youth from Europe, Central and South America, and from all over the 50 states of the US. EYE, as it is called, happens every three years and it is open to those in high school or those who have just graduated. From the Diocese of Missouri we have brought 7 youth (one from as far as Poplar Bluff). I can tell by the energy already, and by the presence of longtime friends and friends made today, that EYE is going to be amazing.

EYE Day 2:

Today was the first full day of programming at EYE. The day began with the opening Eucharist at which Presiding Bishop Curry Preached, and the service was alternately said in English and Spanish. The rest of the day was filled with opportunities to attend different discussion sessions. There are two times set apart for the sessions and about 10 topics during each time slot to choose from ranging from the Presiding Bishop's presentation on the Jesus Movement, to Polity of the Episcopal Church, and sessions on summer camps, Ferguson, and fierce conversations.

The rest of the day during free time the kids and adults go around and meet people from all over and continue to form friendships, play games and music, or just walk around talking. I introduced our group to my friends from the Diocese of Navajoland, some of whom I've known for over 20 years. It's really neat to see our youth interact with so many different youth from the rest of the nation and from Europe, South America, and the Caribbean.

We finished the day with a plenary session that featured three speakers, who spoke about the Oklahoma City Bombing. One woman was in one of the buildings next to the Murrow Federal Building, another was a woman who had come to help in the aftermath, and the third was a fire chief who was one of the first responders. They all spoke with such emotion and truth about

about the difficulties they experienced and the trauma they endured. And, each of them in their own way spoke of the way that they had witnessed good overcoming evil. Tomorrow we will spend part of our day at the Oklahoma City Bombing Memorial, and it was a blessing to have some more perspective on the impact that this event has had and continues to have not only on Oklahoma, but also on our national discussion of terrorism and violence.

EYE Day 3:

Today was the longest day of EYE. We spent the majority of the day going around to different sites in the Oklahoma City area away from the campus of the University of Central Oklahoma, which is our host for the week. We began with a short gathering in the morning and then loaded up on chartered busses at 10am. Our group saw art exhibits, a horse show at the state fairgrounds, cars and space ships and homesteader wagons at the history museum, and a lot of art from the many indigenous tribes that were settled in Oklahoma after the Trail of Tears.

The main visit for the day, however, was our visit to the museum and memorial at the site of the Oklahoma City bombing. It was a very emotional and moving experience, which would take too long to describe in full. I'm sure that I will preach about it at some point.

Afterwards, we all gathered for an outdoor festival at the cathedral in Oklahoma City complete with food trucks, a descendant of Will Rogers doing rope tricks, Dancers from the Latino community and from the Osage Native Tribe, and a contest between the Presiding Bishop and the Bishop of Oklahoma to see if they could tell what hideous combination of food they were eating while blindfolded (Bishop Ed from Oklahoma won the tie-breaker, which was strawberry yogurt with yellow mustard mixed in).

The day concluded with a pilgrimage from the cathedral to the memorial of the Oklahoma City bombing and glow stick lit prayer service led by the youth from the Diocese of Oklahoma. It was a long, full day.

EYE Day 4:

The last day of EYE 17. The day began with a plenary session in which we heard from 3 youth from a program called Kids4Peace. This program started in Jerusalem, and the first two speakers were an Israeli Jew and a Palestinian Christian. They each told their stories about how they had overcome their prejudices and fear of the other through this interfaith program in the Holy Land. The last speaker was a young Muslim woman from Iraq, who has been living in Vermont since her family resettled as refugees 10 years ago. Kids4Peace has expanded beyond Jerusalem and now has programs in several cities in the United States. It was very powerful to hear these stories from youth the same age as our kids, who spent the whole week coming to events, playing basketball, and being normal teenagers with the rest of our kids.

We again had the opportunity in the afternoon to go to learning sessions on various topics from indigenous ministries, to refugee advocacy, and summer camp games. The rest of the afternoon was leisure, sports, and an open mic set up on a carpet outside of the dining hall. It's amazing to see so many kids gather and get to know each other and form such close bonds in so short a period of time.

We closed the day with the final Eucharist, which was absolutely insane, hard to explain, and filled with the Holy Spirit. There was a fire alarm set-off by incense, several conga lines, and inspirational words of encouragement and commission to everyone gathered to carry the spirit of EYE back home and to be peacemakers and bridge builders. And, all of that happened before Eucharist. After Eucharist we were told about the many Episcopal youth from outside of the United States who weren't able to be with us because of visa restrictions. So, the Episcopal Church has committed to putting together a gathering outside of the United States for the youth of

Province 9, which includes most of the Episcopal Churches outside of the United States. We sent the altar linens from this EYE with the 15 youth who were able to be with us, so that they could take the altar cloths to that gathering.

This experience is like nothing else I can think of. It is a celebration of being part of the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement, and I don't think there is anyone who will forget the power of seeing the young leaders of our church taking up the mantle of peace and love. It was also gratifying on a personal note to see youth from the Navajo nation attend a national youth event for the first time ever. I've known some of them since they were in diapers, and I am grateful for the way God is working on the Navajo nation, and humbled to feel a part of that.

The next EYE is in three years, in 2020. Wouldn't it be so great to have some of our Emmanuel youth there next time? We can do it Emmanuel!!!

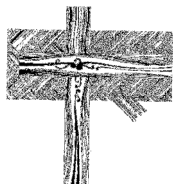

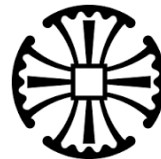
