As many of you know, I have been a Spiritual Director for over 30 years. Spiritual Direction is a ministry of discernment, involves a unique relationship in which the director companions the directee into a closer, deeper relationship with God and others, while noticing and sharing with them observations about what barriers they face and offering support on how to find their way through them.



I halted this ministry three years ago to devote my time to my ministry here at Emmanuel and in the Diocese of Missouri. Then I realized - this was nothing new - this is how Emmanuel loves: quickly and abundantly. I experienced the same flow of love from you all from the start of my ministry here, even in the midst of your pain. I continue to see it and hear about it every time a new person or family visits us. Also, nothing could restrain your joy - not COVID, not conflict, nothing. Your joy happens almost defiantly. Maybe I should say, God's joy in you is defiantly present in all the circumstances of life at and around Emmanuel... also a rare gift.

I feel so blessed that God led me here to serve with and among you. As many of you have heard me say, this is the most inspiring, most fun parish I've ever served as a priest. Ministry with you is a joy. I also thank God for the clergy and staff at Emmanuel - a team of gifted, hard-working, faithful people. Together with your vestry - your elected servant-leaders - Emmanuel is a richly blessed community of faith ready to answer God's call.



Where we go in 2025 is our current discernment. Your Wardens and Vestry have inaugurated a process by which you are invited to DREAM about the path ahead for Emmanuel. Having been ordained to the Sacred Order of Deacons in 2014, I have been assigned by Bishop Deon Johnson to serve Emmanuel as its Deacon. I serve at Emmanuel on the first and third Sundays of every month, but I am available to you every weekday. Deacons are to help ALL congregants in living into their baptismal covenant. Specifically, we are to assist all parishioners in:

- Proclaiming by word and example the Good News of God in Christ;
- Seeking and serving Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself;
- Striving for justice and peace among all people and respecting the dignity of every human being.

This ministry at Emmanuel is primarily undertaken through Faith in Action (FIA). At the heart of Emmanuel is a commitment to serve, and our Faith in Action is evidence of that commitment. It is the largest ministry at Emmanuel and comprises many, many ways we serve our neighbors in Jesus' name. We have divided these many ministries into four Pillars: Feeding and Caring, Justice and Equity, EarthLove, and Diocesan Partnership. A report for each of these Pillars follows. Kathleen Martin and Tom Smith serve as co-chairs of Faith in Action.

Jesus is calling us to connect up our talents and passions with the needs of the world. What is Jesus calling you to do? We think you will find the answer in one of our four Pillars. If you want to address a need, but don't know how to do it, talk to your deacon. If you want to do something to help, but don't know what ministry to get involved in, talk to your deacon. And if you think that service ministry is not for you, expect to be gently nudged by your deacon. That's what we do!

Feeding and Caring

The Caring Ministries Committee of Emmanuel Episcopal Church, originally formed to oversee the needs of older adult parishioners, broadened its focus to include all members of the parish several years ago.

There are several Emmanuel members who live there. In 2024, 142 communions were received. The average attendance was 6.5 residents and 5.9 facilitators (clergy + musicians + Caring Committee members) per month. Having Susan Shillito provide music for the service each time is a delight as well as her cohort Bob Shilito.

Having Susan Shillito provide music for the service each time is a delight as well as her cohort Bob Shilito. **Martha's Meals:** provide meals for individuals and families during a difficult time under the leadership of Lisa Liss. In 2024 over 49 meals were been taken by volunteers to 11 different individuals and families. **The card ministry:** Parishioners aged 70 or older received a special birthday card from Emmanuel. Couples celebrating 50 years of marriage or more, as well as those couples celebrating their 25th anniversary received a special anniversary card. Parishioners who lost a loved one received a bereavement card. Thinking of You Cards were sent to individuals who were ill, had surgery or in need of a cheerful greeting. All cards were designed by Committee members. A total of 236 cards, prepared by Pat Wiltse and Peg Cooper, were sent out in 2024: 151 birthday cards, 19 fiftieth anniversary cards, 18 bereavement cards, 23 thinking of you cards and 25 prayer shawl cards. **Prayer Shawl Ministry** on the 2nd and 4th Monday afternoons. Twenty five shawls along with a special card were given to individuals experiencing illness, bereavement or other crisis situations. The shawls represent Emmanuel wrapping around individuals in their time of need. Fifty five spring **flowers** and 62 Christmas Poinsettias were delivered to individuals in 2024 prior to Easter and Christmas so their season would be brightened. The Caring Committee coordinated the delivery of both the spring flowers and poinsettias. **Eucharistic ministers ministry:** The Eucharistic ministers take communion after the main Sunday service to older individuals who are unable to attend. The number of Eucharistic ministers is 14 and the number receiving communion is 13. The number of visits in 2024 was 4 to 8 per month. **50+ wedding anniversary celebration:** In October, 2024 the Committee held a 50+ wedding anniversary celebration for the nineteen couples of the parish who celebrated 50 or more years of marriage in 2024. Twelve of the 19 couples and their families attended. The celebration included a renewal of marriage vows during the service and a lovely reception afterwards with wedding pictures shown with everyone guessing who the couple was.

Food Center Annual Report

Feeding our Community

The Food Center served 1061 households in 2024 which included 892 children and 2044 adults. This is an increase of 50% or 353 households compared with last year. For comparison purposes we had served an average of 1300 clients per year from 2014-2022. It appears that the area's social workers have found us and are referring their clients to us and many times they are picking up the food for the clients with no transportation. As in previous years, most of the clients were referred by Webster-Rock Hill Ministries (WRHM) and many are coming from outside the 63119 zip code. We are seeing many more Webster University students, mostly international students with 163 this year versus 43 in 2023. The Food Center continued to extend its outreach committing \$2,400 in support to WRHM for the purchase of fresh vegetables, dairy and meat.

We are extremely grateful to our volunteers who continue to serve our Food Center. We have all had to adjust to an increase in clients as well as changing many of our procedures to better serve them and to conserve our resources as best we can, while working within the confines of the existing physical space. Gail Range continues her service as Volunteer Coordinator: developing, distributing, and posting monthly volunteer work-schedules, maintaining and changing Food Center procedures, and providing orientation of new volunteers. Christi Maginn has also continued her outreach in support of our ministry by recruiting new volunteers and organizations for food drives and monetary support. She is also my backup for inventory and sourcing of food.

We continued to get great support from our friends and neighbors who held food drives: The College School who had a record year of collecting and donating over 8000 pieces of food (average had been around 6000 pieces). PolyCon, who has a local facility in WG stepped up their game and brought in over 1000 pieces of food. Our own parishioner, John Long continues to hold virtual Facebook food drives amongst his family and friends!! Other food donations came from neighbors of our church like Holy Redeemer's St Vincent Society and many others who hear about our mission and want to help. Pam and Dale Penrose have scoured all the local Aldi's pretty much weekly to find the food we need. Many of our parishioners have stepped up to help with the monthly shopping The little red wagon that is used to bring the food donations to the altar during service has provided 1733 pieces of food this year, up from 1366 in 2023. Our parishioners were so generous in their continued donations of over 2900 food items as well as \$42,000 in monetary donations. But we fear all this won't be enough to support our expanded client base.

We will have a monetary shortfall in 2025. As happened last year, we have spent down our previous surplus and will need to find ways to either increase food items donated or monetary support. A bright spot in this picture is the \$5800 we received from the Christmas collections. We spent over \$36,000 on food items in 2024 versus \$21,000 in 2023.

Without your support throughout the year and the much needed donations the Food Center receives from the parish and the community we could not provide the requisite nourishment to improve the quality of life for many throughout the community. Through God's grace, the Food Center was the recipient of 15,000 food items donated in 2024 in addition to a number of monetary gifts provided in honor of or in memory of loved ones.

Expanded Rise Against Hunger Event Packaged 25,000 Meals By Mark Rackers

At the 2024 Rise Against Hunger event, volunteers packaged 25,000 meals! This level was achieved by expanding the effort to include two shifts in the church dining hall on Sunday, April 24th. Members of Emmanuel were joined by volunteers from St. Mark's, Church of the Advent and Holy Redeemer, together totaling over 125 participants. The Rise Against Hunger organization seeks to improve access to nutrition, clean water, quality education and agricultural training to help ensure long-term food security for families worldwide. The meals that were packaged at the 2024 event supported their mission in Africa and the Philippines. The funds required to sponsor this event, \$10,000, were provided by commitments from Emmanuel Ministries, donations from individuals and other churches, and through fundraising.

The date for the 2025 Rise Against Hunger food packaging event has been scheduled for May 4th. Mark Rackers, the chairman for the event, and the planning committee are grateful to all who participated in 2024 and look forward to another great effort this year.



Justice and Equity

In 2024 the Justice & Equity Pillar reassessed our involvement and impact on the various organizations and work we have been doing and made some changes. First we acknowledged that our work is guided by our baptismal covenant. Second, we decided to concentrate on “doing” things and finding opportunities for others to engage in justice work v. engaging in advocacy work. We acknowledge that justice asks us to repair or transform structures that inhibit equity and equity asks us to advocate for those who are underserved by and in those structures. There is nothing easy or simple about doing justice or equity work, and it's even harder to tell you how or what to do! We will continue to share opportunities for you as individuals to engage in this work and we will continue to explore ways our parish can engage in project work.

What we did in 2024

- The Black Lives Matter vigil continues at 6 pm on Fridays. At this point it is primarily supported by Churches Together for Justice. It is something we would like to encourage more people to experience and dialog around.
- We continued having a presence with Churches Together for Justice.
- In April we supported WRHM Trivia Night by purchasing a table for Emmanuelites to join.
- In June we once again participated in the Gun Violence Prevention March and Rally. This year there was much less participation by the larger community but still a great event.
- In June we donated to the WG Freestyle Swim Pass program that allows free passes to kids for the pool.
- In late June, thanks to Kathleen Martin, we contributed to Camp SunSplash in the city by renting hand-washing stations and portable potties for the kids that was closer to their camp area. Kate Gregston also provided VBS type materials to camp.
- In July Tricia Copeland agreed to replace Lee Nelsen as co-chair.
- We asked Rev. Canon Dr. Lauren Stanley from the Diocese of South Dakota to be here in November 24, 2024 and she also preached on November 26 at the community Thanksgiving service.
- We showed our commitment to the LGBTQIA+ community by contributing to three organizations by becoming members or providing financial support. Those organizations are St. Louis Queer Support and Healing (SQSH), Pride StL and PFLAG of Greater St. Louis.
- We continued as a dues paying member of Metropolitan Churches United to support their work with the School to Prison Pipeline and support for Ex-incarcerated individuals.

EarthLove

The Earth Love Pillar supports activities to make our Emmanuel grounds more sustainable and supportive of native plants and animals and to educate our parish and community on how they can bring conservation to their lives and homes. Key areas of focus for the Earth Love ministry are the ongoing maintenance and upkeep of the Emmanuel Apple Orchard, the burgeoning butterfly and pollinator gardens, and the annual fall Environmental Stewardship work day.

In 2024, we installed native pollinator gardens in front of the church and at the Jones Hall entrance. These pollinator gardens include a wide variety of plants that provide nectar and seeds for native pollinators and birds and also butterfly and moth host plants including milkweed for the imperiled Monarch Butterfly. Within the garden we installed a Bee Hotel to support our native bee populations. In April we hosted a “hands-on” Environmentally Focused formation hour with crafts and activities. This included rock painting and everyone in the parish was invited to paint a rock to express their hopes and dreams. The painted rocks were used to create a “dream river” in the Jones Garden. In August we found three large Monarch caterpillars on the milkweed we planted in spring.

In Fall, we collaborated with the Facilities team to host the annual Environmental Stewardship clean up and work day. All generations of Emmanulites gathered together in fellowship to care for the trees, clear leaves from traffic areas, perform garden maintenance, remove invasive plants, and other activities to care for and beautify our grounds.

In 2025, we will continue our work to care for our beautiful campus. Emmanuel is blessed with a large campus containing many open spaces, gardens, and beautiful mature trees. In 2025, one focus will be on developing a long-term conservation plan for the entirety of our property that takes into account caring for our current trees and opportunities to further develop other areas of the campus.

Diocesan Involvement

The Diocesan Involvement pillar is committed to supporting the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri. It primarily supports three ministries: Episcopal City Mission (ECM), United Thank Offering (UTO), and Grace Hill:

ECM is not a mission and it is not only working in the city. ECM chaplains have been serving youth in the Juvenile Justice System for 70 years, at both the city and county detention centers. We host birthday parties at each center once a year. Kathy Tate is our Parish Ambassador and can tell you more about the chaplains, you can also visit their website, ecitymission.org. There are opportunities to volunteer and to donate. ECM needs donations to fund the chaplains and their programs.

United Thank Offering (UTO) is a national ministry of thanksgiving and granting. UTO is centered around small blue boxes where you put a coin or paper money in as a thanksgiving for something that day. Those coins add up and once a year they are collected and turned into the diocese to be joined with the donations from across the diocese. Eventually all donations go to the UTO board. The board receives grant requests and they work to make the decision of which grants can be fulfilled. Since 1883 5,500 grants have been given totaling 102 million dollars.

Currently **Grace Hill** is being used by St. Patrick's to house folks that need to find permanent housing. Men of Emmanuel make snack bags and deliver them once a month. The Grace Hill Task Force is working on plans to renovate and bring in new programs.

Music and Choir

The music ministry is comprised of the Emmanuel (adult) choir, the children's choir, and the many gifts and talents from the wider congregation. The adult choir with a roster of about 20 lay and professional vocalists rehearses Wednesday evenings at 7:05 pm and sings every Sunday during the choir season, which runs from Labor Day to Memorial Day. The children's choir is under the leadership of Lauren Romano, Emmanuel's Children's Choir Director.

Building off of a particularly strong year in 2023 as I noted in last year's report, 2024 demonstrated the mainstay of the music program. The caliber and tenacity of the Emmanuel Choir are evident on Sunday mornings, yet the choir continues to improve by rising to the challenge of rendering difficult anthems. The children's choir has increased its frequency of joyfully singing in worship to about twice a month.

New in 2024 was the formation of a quartet vocal group drawn from the adult choir. The quartet prepares and sings an additional choral anthem in worship, primarily during communion from the rear balcony. I thank the following choir members who have sung in the quartet for their additional time and offering of their refined talents: Alison Dunn, Jen Dunn, Shari Kelts, Lauren Romano, and Patrick Zelaya.

Over the summer, we celebrated Lauren Romano for her 10 year anniversary as Emmanuel's Children Choir Director, a position she has held and blessed Emmanuel with her teaching vocation since 2015. Lauren concurrently serves as an alto section leader in the adult choir and lends her rich mezzo-soprano voice as well as her shining heart and character. Patrick Zelaya, Emmanuel's tenor section leader now in his 2nd year, brings a singing voice that is experienced, resonant, and vivid in tonality. In addition to singing, Patrick is a talented pianist and organist. Now with several successful service playing experiences at Emmanuel under his belt, Patrick is on my short list for subs to be entrusted to carry out the organist's duties whenever I'm away on Sundays.

Some noteworthy events in 2024:

- On October 13, Emmanuel hosted a 50th wedding anniversary celebration service in honor of couples celebrating 50 years or more together. Couples were invited to submit music requests from their own wedding ceremonies to be played during the service. I had the distinct joy of playing covers by Al Green, The Carpenters, and Elton John during a church service.
- At the Bishop's Visitation on November 10, the Emmanuel Choir sang from memory "Walk Together, Children," a traditional spiritual arrangement by Moses Hogan. Their rendition was well received with a boisterous applause.
- The Community Thanksgiving Service on November 26 invited choir members from neighboring churches and hosted a community chorus of 40-50 singers. Congregational hymn singing that evening was exceptional.
- At Advent 4 on December 22, the children, youth, and music ministry of Emmanuel presented "What Are We Waiting For?," an Advent play about hope and waiting, including from a Native American perspective. Written and directed by Ann Marie Ruhlin, the play was last performed at Emmanuel in 2013, and it was dusted off the shelves for 2024's successful liturgical production.

Music in worship in 2024 would not have been possible without the time, talent, and commitment from each and every member of the Emmanuel Choir whom I have the utmost honor, privilege, and joy of directing. Since 1949, Emmanuel Preschool has been proudly providing three-, four- and five-year-old children in our community with a caring and creative early childhood education. We operate a half-day program (9-11:45 a.m.) with opportunities for children to stay for extended days until 2:30 p.m.

Our preschool will be celebrating its 76th year in 2025! This is a testament to the wonderful educators that have shared their time and talent to make Emmanuel Preschool a recognized name for excellent early-childhood care and education in the Webster Groves community. Emmanuel Center for the Young Years began as a business venture by Charlotte Goode in 1949. In 1972, we organized as a non-profit organization under the directorship of Liz Burst who dedicated herself to educating children for many joyful years. In 1983, Rita Rundquist became director, after helping in the office since 1974, and continued the good reputation of the preschool for 36 years! JoAn MacBryde taught and helped in the office from 1982-2008 and was co-director from 2008-2010. In 2010, Mrs. Rundquist and Mrs. MacBryde retired, and Angie MacBryde became director. After 5 years our second Mrs. MacBryde took another position and passed the position on to Rachael Ludwig.

Preschool families come from across the area including Webster Groves, Kirkwood, Shrewsbury, Maplewood and St. Louis. Emmanuel Preschool is a community preschool, of the 55 families we serve, only 3 are members of Emmanuel Parish.

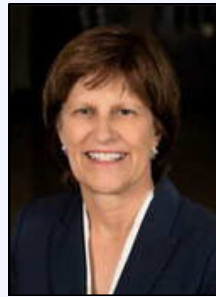

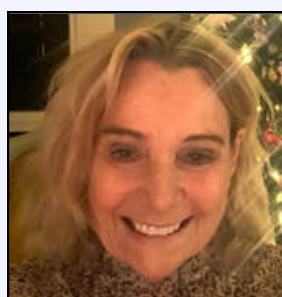

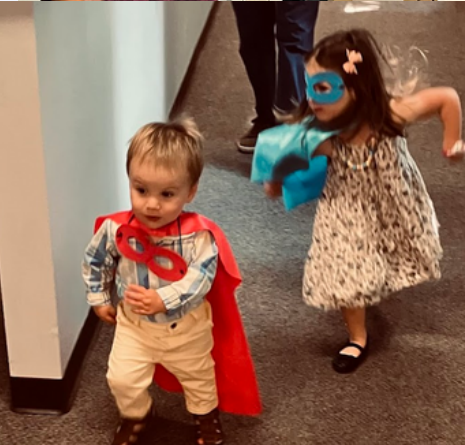
